ACBL Charity Game Results Announced

Minneapolis—Competing against some 3,000 top-ranked bridge players in the United States and Canada in the summer national contract bridge championships at the Leamington here, Rogue valley players have done well.

In the Loring Park pairs, a single session championship with an entry of 258 pairs, J. D. Shortridge, 728 West Fourth street, Medford, and Walter Enaminger, Grants Pass, won top score in their section.

The tournament, biggest of the area in contract bridge, continues through Sunday, August 5. Six major and a score of lesser national championship titles are to be decided.

The national charity game of the American Contract Bridge league in the Grants Pass Elks club July 28, with Medford and Grants Pass bridge players taking part, raised \$170 from card fees for the league's philanthropic fund raising program, those in charge announced this week.

From the start of the league's charity program in 1950 to spring this year a million dollars has been raised for national philanthropic projects, and nearly as much for those at local levels, by means of games arranged by bridge clubs in communities throughout the country.

In Saturday's game, hands had been dealt a month ago, then printed and distributed to local clubs under seals. In this way the Medford and Grants Pass players, who united in the fund raising effort, were playing the same hands as those at the National tournament in Minneapolis, Minn., being conducted at that time.

Director Claims People Do Not Worry Straight

New York—UPI-Safety messages pour at us from all sides, but one of the most unusual of these comes from Marjorie May.

Miss May is the home education director of the greater New York City Safety Council and in a look at year-round safety she has concluded that "in this complicated age, people don't even worry straight."

For instance, she says, "we worry about the Russians then invite an unknown hitchhiker to ride with us."

Her regular newsletter points up these other "crooked" worries:

"We worry about H-bombs, then buy our kids fireworks, light the barbecue fire with gasoline and leave firearms about."

"We worry about children running out in front of cars, then drag them across the

street on a red light.

"We worry about overweight—the struggle through fad diets and use the car to go two blocks to pick up a newspaper."

Give Examples "We worry about cancer, then drink and drive."

"We worry about paying off the mortgage, then smoke in bed."

"We worry about juvenile delinquency—then give junior some perfect examples of disrespect for the law by illegal parking, jaywalking, buying fireworks, passing remarks about the police, lawmakers or teachers, and even neglecting to vote."

"We worry about retirement—then do everything we can to keep from lasting that long."
