

Reception Last Evening Opens Show at Gallery

Gordon Onslow-Ford, an artist who believes that "Painting is concerned with a way of seeing the world" and his wife were honored at a reception held last night at Rogue gallery, 220 West Main street. The event was sponsored by Rogue Valley Art association and marked the opening of a showing of the artist's work at the gallery.

The show will remain at the gallery for three weeks and the public is invited to view it.

Mr. Onslow-Ford, who makes his home in Inverness, Calif., works mainly in black and white using a paint which he and a chemist have developed in recent years. Of himself and his painting, the artist has said:

"Painting is concerned with a way of seeing the world. Modern painting has just been through a period of

working from the known towards the unknown (evolution). The time has come to make a beginning from the unknown, and to discover our own way (evolution)."

"In a beginning, nothing is hidden behind anything else and all is visible; hence the importance of lines and dots. Lines and dots tend towards black and white."

"With the straight line, the circle, the dot a correspondence can be found to any combination of free lines and marks. With these three basic elements, the place of potential can be visited from which the world can re-create itself."

Some believe that the work of this Bay area artist is part of the beginning of a new and important trend in art. The starkness and drama of the black and white dots, circles, lines and curves have an arresting effect on the viewer. Although Mr. Onslow-Ford also uses color, and some of these works are in the conversation of those at the reception in favor of the emphatic black and white and white on black pieces.

The artist says, and most will agree, that this type of art is a product of the atomic age and could not have been possible at an earlier time.

Although they've been around for a long time, sweatshirts have only recently come out of the gym and into the fashion spotlight, reports the National Cotton council.

New styling and colors, carefully keyed to reflect current sportswear trends, have made the fleece-lined cotton sweatshirt a staple item for well-dressed undergraduates.

According to one survey, it's not uncommon for a student to own as many as six or eight sweatshirts — all differing in designs or colors.

By and large, the majority go in for sweatshirts emblazoned with their college name, mascot, fraternity or sorority crest. On many campuses, novelty designed sweatshirts are popular. These represent some facet of campus life — serious, ribald, or slightly risqué.

Replace Pin

Aside from its obvious advantage of identifying the student with the college of his choice, the sweatshirt has in many instances replaced the fraternity pin as a symbol of togetherness. It has become popular, too, as a gift item for younger brothers or sisters.
