The door of opportunity swung wide open for one former college star trying to make the grade as a pro T. quarterback but it may be closing for the last time on another.

Dean Look, former Michigan State star, is the fellow getting the opportunity while Lee Grosscup, former University of Utah ace, is the chap on whom time may be running out.

Look was acquired by the New York Titans of the American league in a trade which sent 260-pound tackle Sid Youngman to the Buffalo Bills. The New York Giants of the National league, meanwhile, asked waivers on Grosscup, who during three seasons with the team has been overshadowed by veteran Taces Charlie Conerly and Y. A. Tittle.

How Did He Win Bout?

Manila - (UPI) - It won't be long before lightweight champion Carlos Ortiz is nicknamed "Mr. Questionmark."

Why? Because after each of his two most recent victories the fans who saw him asked, "How did he do it?"

That's the question they asked after Ortiz won the title from Joe Brown at Las Vegas, Nev., last April 21 and that's the question they were asking here today after his 10-round decision over 30-year-old Arthur Persley in Wednesday night's non-title match.

The officials scored it for Ortiz unanimously - two by 40-35 and one by 47-45 - but the crowd of 30,000 booed the result. Ortiz clipped Persley several times during the bout with swift left jabs and punishing body blows but appeared to absorb more punishment over the 10-round distance.

Davis Suffers Blood Disorder

Chicago - (UPI) - Ernie Davis, 1961 Heisman Trophy winner and one of the most prized players ever to come out of college football, has been stricken with a blood disorder and his professional career was in doubt today.

Cleveland had been counting on Davis to join this season with another three-time Syracuse university All-American, Jim Brown, to give the Browns one of the hardest running tandems in professional football.

Davis was hospitalized in suburban Evanston where he had been working out with the College All-Stars in preparation for their game Friday with the National Football league champions Green Bay Packers.

In Last Drill

Chicago - (UPI) - The 1962 College All Stars were scheduled for a loosening up session today in their final drill before Friday's showdown scrap with the National Football league champion Green Bay Packers.

The All Stars worked out on Wednesday night under the lights of Soldier Field, site of Friday's game, and head coach Otto Graham stressed passing and punting simply to accustom his players to the illumination. The Packers were slated for a similar drill in the arena tonight.

Graham, whose team was a three-touchdown underdog, said he hoped to get every All Star into the game, and suggested he might substitute his offensive backfield men by units.

He was unhappy about the loss of Syracuse halfback Ernie Davis, the Heisman Trophy winner last year, because of illness, but said he had moved Baylor's Ron Bull from the flanker back spot to the inside halfback post to replace Davis.

Clay Picked As Fighter Of Month

New York - (UPI) - Unbeaten Cassius Clay, the brash young heavyweight contender who not only defeats all of his opponents but picks the round of the knockout, was named "Fighter of the Month" by The Ring magazine.

Former Olympic champion Clay was awarded the fighter-of-month designation because of his 15th consecutive professional victory on July 20 on a fifth-round knockout over ex-contender Alejandro Lavarante of Argentina.

Twenty-year-old Clay of Louisville, Ky., said, "I'll knock him out in the fifth round," and did it. It was his 12th kayo in his 15 starts.

The Ring also boosted contender Cassius from ninth to seventh in its ratings.

Big Mike DeJohn of Miami Beach and Syracuse, N.Y., returned to the ratings at No. 10 by virtue of his upset win over Robert Cleroux, heavyweight champion of Canada. Cleroux sank from sixth to ninth.

Eddie Machen of Portland, Ore., kept his No. 2 heavyweight rating although held to a surprise draw by Cleveland Williams of Houston, Tex. Williams rose from eighth to sixth.

Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach, who has been No. 10 among the heavies, was shifted to the light heavyweight division at No. 6. Apparently he can do better as a 175-pounder. The long inactive Erich Schoepner of Germany was dropped out of the light heavies.

In the middleweight class Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., climbed from seventh to fifth because of his impressive victory over welterweight contender Teddy Wright of Detroit.

Luis Rodriguez of Cuba replaced Ralph Dupas of New Orleans as top welterweight contender. Dupas dropped to No. 2 because of his defeat by champion Emile Griffith in their title fight.

Southpaw Kenny Lane of Muskegon, Mich., took over the top contender's post among junior welterweights by virtue of his surprise victory over Carlos Hernandez of Venezuela, high-ranking lightweight.

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Emeralds, Dodgers Clash Tonight In NW League Mix at White City

Eugene Emeralds, riding on a four-game winning skid, will seek their fourth triumph in a row over the Salem Dodgers this evening when the two baseball aggregations face off for the second time this season at Memorial field White City.

The game is set for 8 p.m. Eugene and Salem are members of the Class B professional Northwest league. This will be a regular league fracas.

Either Matt Gayeski (11-7) or Frank Linzy (6-6) is expected to take to the hill this evening for the Emeralds. They have the top win-loss marks this season for the Eugene contingent. Salem's flinger may be Bill Boehlert (5-3).

The Ems tipped the Dodgers 4 to 2 last night after taking a twinnbill from the Salem club on Tuesday. Tonight's game finishes a four-game series with the Eugene team as host. Actually, however, it will mark the halfway point of an eight-game slate. The clubs, after meeting here, will mix four times at Salem.

Salem Leader

Salem is the leader in the second half NWL race. Eugene was the doormat at the end of the first half and was in that position in the current half at the start of this week. The Ems wins over the Dodgers have boosted them into fourth spot in the six team league.

Eugene started the week 7 1/2 games back of Salem and has cut the difference to 4 1/2. Dodger losses to the Ems have reduced the Salem margin to two games over the second spot Tri-City Braves.

Last night's outcome brought the Emeralds even with the Dodgers in games between the two clubs this season. Each has defeated the other nine times.

Right now there appears something to the theory that it's the bottom of the ladder clubs that prove spoilers to the leaders.

Reinforced

Sudden surge of the Ems quite possibly is due to the reinforcements they have received this week. These include Damaso Blanco, third baseman, Bill Dixon, outfielder, and Jack Simmons, pitcher, from Springfield of the Eastern league. Blanco and Julio Linarez, brought a short time ago from El Paso of

the Texas loop, particularly fortify the Eugene outfield.

There's another factor possibly in the rise of the Emeralds. They may have been reading the Oregon Statesman of Salem. Sports Editor Al Lightner remarked that Eugene "can be called worst in the league without making too many folks unhappy."

At the same time Lightner is puzzled that Salem should be leading the circuit. He doesn't feel that Salem actually is the best club in the loop. A Eugene writer has attributed Dodger success to fine defense, speed, timely hitting and stellar pitching.

Eugene is a farm club of the San Francisco Giants and Salem is tied to the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Pitched No-Hitter

Gayeski is a 6-3, 20-year-old lefty who earlier in the season tossed the Northwest loops first nine-inning no-hitter in history. He was with Quincy in the Midwest league last year. His earned run average is 3.93. Linzy, who has been bothered by shoulder trouble, started the season with Springfield. The 21-year-old player has a 3.37 ERA. He has seen pinchhitting duty.

Boehlert joined Salem in mid-June after being with Greenville of the Sally league.

He was with Salem all of last year. The 5-11 lefty has yielded 42 earned runs in 79 1/3 innings.

Possible starters for Eugene include Dick Dietz or Arley Kangas, catcher; Jose Calero, first base; Julio Linarez, second base; Don Pope, shortstop; Damaso Blanco, third base; Bill Dixon or Joe McLaughlin, left field; Carlos Dore, center field, and Wally Cockrell, right field.

In the lineup for Salem could be Wade Arnold or Bill Kelso, catcher; Dick McLaughlin, first base; Lou Erle, second base; Ralph Plumlee, shortstop; Bobby Cox, third base; Dick Bogard, left field; Vic Pagel, center field, and Tom Richards, right field.

The game is being played here to give the Rogue valley a sample of pro ball and to test interest of sports fans in this area in the circuit. Medford Lions club is sponsor of this game and will use its net from the proceeds for its sight and blind fund. The Lions must meet a sizable guarantee.
