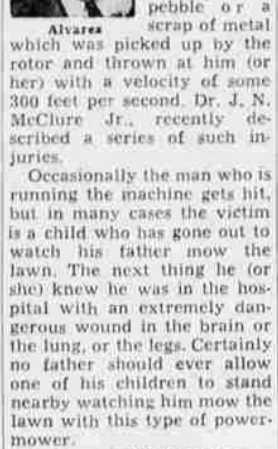
Dangers From Power Lawn-Mowers

Again I must call attention to the fact that in medical literature cases are being reported in which someone, while watching a man using a power lawn-mower of rotor type, was seriously injured by a pebble or a scrap of metal which was picked up by the rotor and thrown at him (or her) with a velocity of some 300 feet per second.

Occasionally the man who is running the machine gets hit, but in many cases the victim is a child who has gone out to watch his father mow the lawn. The next thing he (or she) knows he was in the hospital with an extremely dangerous wound in the brain or the lung, or the legs. Certainly no father should ever allow one of his children to stand nearby watching him mow the lawn with this type of power-mower.

A violent death, and there was little sign of malnutrition. The men were stocky and broadshouldered. Childbirth would seem to have been hard in those days because only half as many women as men reached the forties. Survival of persons of either sex beyond the age of 50 seems to have been rare. The commonest disease revealed in the skeletons was arthritis of several types—sometimes severe. At least 50 of the persons had suffered from osteo-arthritis of the spine. Tuberculosis was apparently as yet non-existent. The appearance of some of the bones suggests syphilis, but the disease could have been the related yaws, which still is common in Africa.

Interestingly is the fact that the teeth of these people were much better formed and spaced than are ours today; and out of 5,000 teeth examined, only some 200 showed any signs of decay. As happens with many primitive people, their teeth were ground almost flat, due probably to the presence of hard grit (from rough grindstones) in the flour from which their bread was made. The average height of the men was 5 feet, 7, and the women 5 feet, 1 inch.

Rain Disrupts Telephone Service

Telephone service to approximately 60 residents in Medford and the Applegate area was temporarily disrupted earlier this week due to small cable trouble. Jack H. Greager, district manager for Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone company, said Tuesday that as many as 20 telephones in various parts of Medford and another 30 in the Applegate area were affected. He explained that the first rains of the season always reveal trouble spots in the small cables which have occurred during dry weather. The water causes short circuits in the lines.

Main trunk lines are protected by air pressure, the spokesman pointed out. When a cable is damaged, the loss in air pressure is noted and the lines are repaired. In the Medford area, several telephones were out of order Monday afternoon and evening and Tuesday morning reportedly because of short-circuits. The trouble was pinpointed to the 1,100-pair cable at the intersection of Jackson st. and Crater Lake ave.

Greager said cable trouble affecting small numbers of telephones has to be expected with the first rains. Main lines, however, are usually repaired before it affects individual patrons, he added.
