Prison Inmate Says OCI Needs More Counselors

Salem — A 21-year-old man under sentence to die in the Oregon State penitentiary gas chamber thinks there is a need for more counselors in the Oregon Correctional Institution and more parole officers who would give closer supervision.

The views of Larry West Shipley, convicted of the murder of a 16-year-old girl on the Oregon Coast last year, appeared in a copyrighted story in the Salem Capital Journal.

The paper submitted a list of questions to Shipley in the penitentiary's death row.

Shipley said, "I don't believe the officials at OCI (Oregon Correctional Institution) could have done any more for me than they did."

Load Too Heavy

But he said that counselors at the institution have too heavy a load of inmates to do a complete job.

Shipley also said the Oregon Board of Parole and Probation "did as much for me as they would for any other parolee."

The young man said he believed his parents tried to understand his problems but were unable to do so because they could not be sure what they were and couldn't get his cooperation.

Shipley said that he thought at the time he could take care of himself and rebelled against the parent's guidance and authority.

Abby Green Dies At Local Hospital

Mark Abner (Abby) Green, valley musician, died this morning at a local hospital following a long illness.

Green, 54, who lived at 1118 East Main st., was employed as musical director at the Rogue Valley Country Club until his retirement about a year ago. He came to the valley in about 1946.

TAKES WAR SECRETARY POSITION

Buenos Aires — Defense Minister Jose L. Cantilo doubled temporarily today as war secretary in place of Gen. Juan B. Losa, who resigned Wednesday night under pressure from a group of "rebel" generals.

SOVIET UNION REJECTS U.S. OFFER

Geneva — The United States today offered to conclude a nuclear test ban treaty based on a world-wide network of internationally supervised national monitoring posts if Russia would accept the principle of on-site inspection.

The Soviet Union rejected the offer in what a Western spokesman called a "rough, rugged and bitterly disappointing" statement.

NATIONAL SECURITY RISK SEEN

Albany, N.Y. — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller said Wednesday the Kennedy administration may be risking national security by weaker proposals for a nuclear test ban.

Government Issues New Regulations Aimed At Preventing Tragedies in Testing of Drugs

60 Days Given For Proposal of Possible Changes

Advance Approval Would Be Required

Washington — (UPI) — The government today issued new drug testing regulations aimed at preventing tragedies in this country such as thalidomide caused among newborn infants in Europe.

The proposed regulations, which would tighten government control in testing programs involving humans, were announced by Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Anthony J. Celebrezze.

He said the drug industry, doctors and other interested parties will have 60 days to propose possible changes before the regulations take effect.

Advance Approval

The regulations provide for the first time that a manufacturer would be required to obtain advance approval from the Food and Drug Administration for testing a new drug on humans.

Frequent, detailed reports would be required on the progress of these tests. Failure to furnish such reports would result in automatic halting of experimental programs, Celebrezze said.

The regulations deal primarily with drug manufacturers and would not alter present rules which do not require a doctor to tell a patient when he gives him an experimental drug.

However, doctors who participate in testing programs would be required to be thoroughly familiar with results of prior laboratory tests and experiments on animals before administering a drug.

Must Keep Records

A doctor also would be required to keep full records on patients to whom he gives an experimental drug and to make such records available to the government on request, as well as making full reports to the manufacturer.

The principal sections of the stiffer regulations are these requirements:

— Notification to the Food and Drug Administration and full details when a company begins testing a new drug by distribution to doctor-investigators.

— Clinical investigation must be based on adequate pre-clinical studies, including animal experiments, to assure safety.

— Proper planning and execution of drug trial with full reports on progress of the tests to the FDA.

Present regulations do not require that the FDA be notified of new drug testing nor reports on their use.

Billboard-Free Area Discussed

Gold Beach — More witnesses testified today before the Oregon Scenic Area Commission on a proposed 117-mile billboard-free area along the state's coast.

The commission opened two days of hearings at Newport Wednesday. The proposal would bring about abolishment of billboards during a seven-year period in sections from Depoe Bay to Brookings.

The proposal ran into stiff opposition from the Oregon Coast Association at Newport.

Dan Ayers of Newport, manager of the association, said "billboards are an economic necessity to the tourism industry." He said "tourism would shrink without them."

Ayers pointed out that one-third of the 360-mile Oregon coast is in public ownership and does not have billboards.

The Oregon Roadside Council supported the proposal. David Charlton of Portland, a past president of the council, spoke for the motion.

Jackie, Caroline Dodge Protection

Ravenna, Italy — Jacqueline Kennedy today slipped away from a police-protected private beach with daughter, Caroline, 4.

Italian bathers, mostly mothers and their children, were delighted.

The first lady and her daughter went swimming at a rented beachhouse on Conca Dei Marini but soon joined the other bathers at the adjoining public beach where about 30 Italians and vacationers were swimming and sunbathing.



MRS. IDA CANTOR End Came Suddenly

Eddie Cantor's Wife Succumbs To Heart Attack

Beverly Hills, Calif. — Mrs. Ida Cantor, 70, known to millions through her famous husband Eddie Cantor's theme song "Ida," died Wednesday of a heart attack.

Cantor, who also has a heart condition, collapsed when he learned of his wife's death. He was placed under sedation at his home with a nurse at his bedside.

They celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary June 9.

Mrs. Cantor, who had a long history of heart trouble, had been confined to bed since February when she suffered a heart attack. She had at least four in the past seven years, the physician said.

"She passed away suddenly and peacefully in bed," he said. "Despite her recent condition, her husband still was overwhelmed and went into a state of shock."

Cantor, also 70, was hospitalized for several weeks in September of 1960 after a heart attack. When Al Jolson died, friends did not tell him for several days for fear the shock might kill him.

The popular banjo-eyed comedian also suffered a serious heart attack in 1953. He has been in semi-retirement since.

McGrew Sawmill To Move to Ashland

McGrew Brothers Sawmill, Inc., is tentatively planning a move to an Ashland site next year, according to E. E. McGrew.

The property lease on the present site, located on Barnett rd., will expire early in 1963, and will not be renewed. The company may move to land adjacent to the Mistletoe plant in the Bellview area of Ashland.

McGrew said plans call for construction of a completely new modern mill. However, some of the present machinery will be transferred to the new operation. At the present time the mill is using the facilities of the Mistletoe planing mill and dry kilns. The move would place the company much nearer to these facilities.

Ashland city council indicated this week that it would favor such a move when it reviewed a letter from the firm requesting a lease on the 15 city-owned acres formerly used as a log deck by Fir Milling company.

About 75 persons are employed by the mill. The company obtains its logs from the Forest service and O and C sales.

Ashland Discusses Fluoridation Issue

Ashland — An ordinance was passed by the Ashland city council this week to allow circulation of an initiative petition calling for fluoridation of the Ashland city water supply.

Fluoridation was an issue in the city several years ago, and the proposal was defeated at the polls.

An emergency was declared by the council in order to pass the ordinance. It requires that petitions have legal signatures totaling 15 per cent of the number of voters for mayor in the last election. In addition, a \$200 deposit must be made with the city, which will be returned if the initiative proposal should win.

Under the ordinance the petition must be filed within 70 days, and have about 800 signatures. If the initiative fulfills the terms of the ordinance, it will be placed on the November ballot.

Diluted Wilderness Bill Gets Approval

Large Areas Would Be Kept In Natural State

Proposal Allows Greater Access

Washington — (UPI) — A House Interior subcommittee today approved a wilderness bill designed to preserve millions of acres of public lands in their natural state.

But one subcommittee source said the legislation was a much weaker conservation measure than the bill already passed by the Senate.

The source said the bill meant a 50 per cent reduction in the acreage which could be declared a wilderness area. He also said that the subcommittee proposal would give miners, cattlemen and lumbermen an even greater access to areas to be preserved than they now enjoy. Rep. John P. Saylor (R-Pa.), a chief supporter of the administration-backed plan, refused comment on the subcommittee's action.

The Interior committee was unable to provide newsmen with copies of the new proposal approved by the public lands subcommittee.

The legislation approved by the Senate would have given the President authority to declare large tracts of public land controlled by both the Agriculture department and the Interior department — as wilderness areas. As such, their use would be severely restricted.

Under the Senate bill, mining, grazing and lumbering would have been greatly curtailed and activities such as road building and the establishment of commercial enterprises would have been forbidden.

The House measure, according to the committee's press release, would only apply to those lands controlled by the agriculture secretary.

Various commercial interests in the western states are strongly opposed to the Senate's wilderness bill.

Rep. Gracie Post (D-Idaho), said in a statement that the legislation approved today by her subcommittee would guarantee the preservation of large areas in their natural state while at the same time assuring "limited use for other purposes including the discovery and development of any minerals that may be present there."

The bill would also permit limited hunting, fishing and grazing.

Planning Group To Meet Tonight

The Medford planning commission will consider adoption of a statement of land use and zoning policy for the city at its regular meeting at 7:30 o'clock tonight in city hall.

The statement, if adopted, would be passed on to the city council as a recommendation from the commission as to the future development of the property along both sides of Biddle rd.

Biddle rd. lies parallel to a section of the Interstate 5 freeway. The commission has received a number of requests in the past few months to rezone certain parcels of property which front on the road.

Also on the commission agenda is a public hearing on a request for a variance to the side yard setback requirements in a multiple-family zone for a piece of property at 28 Myrtle st.

Planning commission meetings are held in council chambers and are open to the public.

County Court Gets \$2,414,741 Check From O and C Funds

County Judge Earl Miller received a check for \$2,414,741.28 Wednesday from the bureau of land management representing Jackson county's share in the revenues from O and C grant lands during the last fiscal year. Robert Hostetter and John A. Carnegie, assistant district managers for the BLM here, presented the check in ceremonies yesterday afternoon in the courthouse.

The check was one of 18 totaling \$15,400,135.69 sent to western Oregon counties. They represent 50 per cent of the gross revenues from O and C timber sales of \$30.8 million last year. The payment, which came earlier this year than usual, was more than last year's check to Jackson county — \$2,266,492.66.

County Treasurer Karl Janouch said the county had budgeted \$2,620,571.10 to be received from O and C monies this year, including the balance from last year. Although the check was more than last year, the county expected to receive about that amount.

Janouch said \$1,430,000 of the total will be invested.

Kennedy Ready To Act in Rail Strike

Chicago — (UPI) — The chief negotiator for the nation's railroads said today the Kennedy administration stands ready to use every resource in its power to head off a nationwide rail strike.

Rail spokesman J. E. Wolfe testified in a federal court where five on-train rail unions are fighting to keep the railroads from imposing drastic anti-labor embargoes work rules changes.

The changes, scheduled to go into effect next Thursday, could result in the elimination of jobs for 41,000 railroad firemen. The rail brotherhoods, representing more than 200,000 employees, have threatened to go on strike if the changes are imposed. Strike instructions went out to the rail brotherhood locals Wednesday.

Dean of Artists Dies in Portland

Portland — (UPI) — Clyde Leon Keller Sr., known as the "Dean of Oregon artists," died Tuesday following a long illness. He was 90.

He had made his home at Cannon Beach for the past two years.

County Planning Group Approves Zoning Ordinance

A weary Jackson county planning commission held last evening, what they hope to be, the last public discussion on the proposed Southwest Phoenix zoning ordinance before submitting it to the county court.

The county court must consider the ordinance prior to Aug. 28, the date the present interim zoning ordinance in the area expires.

The commission, in a session that continued until nearly 11:30 p.m., approved the final changes in the ordinance during their monthly meeting and requested that the referral letter to the court recommend that the court call an election in the zoned area.

Legal Requirements

It was pointed out by the commissioners that due to the legal requirements prior to holding such an election, several months would elapse before it could be held after the court receives the ordinance.

This was the second meeting this week on the ordinance. An informal discussion session was held Monday, which continued until nearly 11 p.m. Less than a dozen residents attended Wednesday night's meeting.

Several residents expressed interest in having their property within the zoned area changed from residential-farm to farm so they would be able to take advantage of the state tax relief for zoned farm land.

Seattle World's Fair Sets Attendance Mark

Seattle — (UPI) — The Seattle World's Fair established a new one-day attendance mark Wednesday when 78,100 persons visited the fairgrounds.

The previous high was 76,117 set on July 7. Wednesday's attendance brought the total for the space age fair to date to 5,541,001.

60 Hawthorne ave., Monday, Aug. 13, from 2 to 6 p.m. and Tuesday, Aug. 14, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The quota for the visit is 350 pints for which 400 donors are needed. In addition to the regular quota, an additional 28 pints will be collected for open heart surgery in Portland.
