Philadelphia—UPI—Prejudice is largely responsible for the increasing incidence of juvenile delinquency, Dr. Nathan W. Ackerman reported at the annual convention of the Boys' Clubs of America. The clinical professor of psychiatry at Columbia University cautioned that "unless prejudice is controlled, it may erupt with incredible ferocity as a vast, worldwide and devastating epidemic."

Work of Foreign Artists Exhibited at Ashland Y

Asland — An unusual art show is being held in Ashland at the YMCA during the Shakespearean festival. It features work from a number of overseas countries where the YMCA is active; many of the pictures were done expressly for the exhibit here.

A member of a prominent Indian family and a renowned artist did four original paintings on handmade paper. The paintings are of Indian gods and goddesses; they are subtle in implication and lovely in color and rhythmic design.

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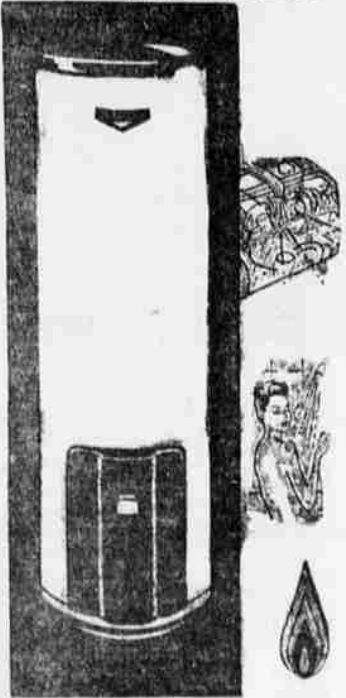
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Women's Fellowship Announces Brunch
