

## Are Popular Music Camps

Chicago—More than 45,000 youngsters are piping hotter than Pan at music camps and schools across the United States this summer.

A survey by the American Music Conference (AMC) showed summer music study enrollment now is 350 per cent greater than in 1950. More than two-thirds of the nation's 150 summer music camps were organized after 1950.

Marion Egbert, educational consultant for AMC, said the main reason for expansion in summer music study is the growth of instrumental music programs in school systems. School-age musicians have increased more than 300 per cent since 1947.

Most summer music students are teen-agers, the survey showed, with 82 per cent of total enrollment in the 14 to 18 age bracket. Twenty-one per cent of summer music camps depend on out-of-state students for more than half their enrollments. Sixty per cent of the camps carry out-of-state students on their rolls.

One of the most important reasons for growth AMC said, is the combination of self-made music and outdoor recreation, offered by 95 per cent of summer music camps.

## Teen-Age Boys Eat Most of Food Supply

Washington — (UPI) — Teen-age boys gobble more of the weekly food supply than any other member of the family.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's research service estimated a cost of a week's food supply for one growing lad, age 16 to 19, at \$8.20. This was on a low-cost plan.

If the family followed a "moderate" cost plan, the teen-ager's food bill would be \$11.20 a week. On a liberal plan, say eating high off the hog, the weekly tab is \$12.60.

## Freezers Overloaded Often During Summer

Urbana, Ill. — (UPI) — You may be tempted to overload your freezer during the summer when fruits and vegetables are so plentiful.

If you don't know the freezer capacity, check the instruction book. It will list the load and also give directions that should be followed.

Frances Van Duyn, University of Illinois director of foods research, said overloading slows down freezing and may endanger the quality of foods by raising the freezer temperature.

## Foreign Girl Aids Peace Corps

Miss Karin Zollikofer of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, who has been a graduate student at the University of Oregon, Eugene, the past year on a Pan - American fellowship from the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, is now in Oklahoma teaching Portuguese to Peace Corps candidates, a Federation release states. She left Eugene July 22 for the University of Oklahoma at Norman where she will be an instructor until September 15.

Miss Zollikofer came to the United States last August and spent a month in the home of a family in Pleasantville, N.Y., under the Putney Experiment in International Living, before coming to Eugene for her year of study.

A graduate of the University of Brazil, she was registered in the school of journalism at the University of Oregon with special interest in radio and television. She hopes by this means to reach more isolated areas of her large country which are still lacking in adequate school facilities.

**Fellowship Used**  
In the 16 years since the Pan American Fellowship Fund was established by the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, 16 South American women have accepted the fellowship and studied in the colleges of Oregon, and six Oregon women have been able to study in South American colleges through the help of this fund.

Mrs. Hildred M. Zell, Wasco, chairman of the board of trustees of the scholarship loan and fellowship fund, said, "We are proud that the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs was foresighted enough to perceive the value of this investment in the cause of Western Hemisphere solidarity, and in friendship and understanding."

Of the six Oregon women who had studied under the fellowship grant, two have remained in South American countries. Miss Jacqueline Saylor, Salem, accepted a fellowship in 1958 to study in Mendoza, Argentina, and has remained to teach in a bilingual education center in Santiago, Chile.

An international romance has kept another recipient, Marjorie Elaine Taube, (Mrs. J. Antonio Rivero) formerly of Portland, in Peru. She was in 1951 the first Oregon woman to apply for a fellowship to study in South America under the Pan-American plan, and now lives on an estate near Lima with her husband and four children.
