

Crater Cubs Defeat Eugene In Oregon Junior Tourney

Blue River — Gary Frohreich doubled home Wayne Clay in the bottom of the seventh inning here Friday night to earn the Central Point Crater Cubs a 5 to 4 nod over Eugene in the opening round of the Oregon Junior Baseball association state tournament.

In other Friday encounters Master Service of Salem knocked out McKenzie 1 to 0. Albany Rees trimmed Bend 6 to 2 and Molalla Dickens rallied over Thurston 8 to 3.

Yesterday evening's semifinals matched Crater against toulon favorite Molalla and Salem against Albany. Finals are this evening.

Friday losers contended in Saturday afternoon consolation scraps.

Two Hits Each
Hitting of Gary Frohreich, John Rhodes, Darryl Summerfield and Bob Stroh, along with some luck brought the

CP team through Friday. They each singled and doubled to have all the Crater hits among them. Cub pitcher Wayne Clay allowed just five hits but permitted eight bases on balls. Crater was charged with seven miscues.

The Central Point club scored in three of the innings after two were out.

Crater went into the seventh inning with a 4 to 3 lead. Tires in the top that canto, however, collected a tying marker on a walk, sacrifice by Bob Conant, two errors and a single by Gary Ross.

With two out in the bottom of the seventh Clay was safe on an error which allowed him to go to second base. Frohreich then smacked the ball into deep right field.

First Inning Run

Eugene responded with two in the top of the second frame on singles by Gary Ross, a fly Dewey Johnson and two errors. Tires took advantage of two Crater misplays for a third inning tally. In the bottom of the same inning Crater put over a run for its 4 to 3 margin. Frohreich walked. Summerfield singled but was picked off at first base with Frohreich getting to third. Stroh doubled Frohreich home.

Ross had two hits for Eugene.

Clay fanned five batters. Ross walked two and whiffed 11.

Miner Predicts State Leadership

Portland — Dr. Leon P. Miner, Oregon superintendent of public instruction, said Friday that the state is on the threshold of taking national leadership in teacher education.

He spoke before the City Club.

Miner said major changes will be made in theory courses for prospective teachers and added that their whole liberal arts program will be bolstered.

He said that better educated teachers could do a better job educating Oregon's children.

Miner said that Oregon had lagged behind California and Washington at the elementary level but has always been on an equal basis at the secondary level of education.

He said Oregon is the only state where various departments and school districts were working together collectively for better teacher training and better education. He said some new practices were being tried.

Miner alluded to the Oregon Program of teacher improvement under the \$3.5 million Ford Foundation grant in saying that the state would move far ahead in this respect.

Wenatchee, Wash. (UPI) — Salem downed Wenatchee 10-4 Saturday night holding most of the action for the ninth inning.

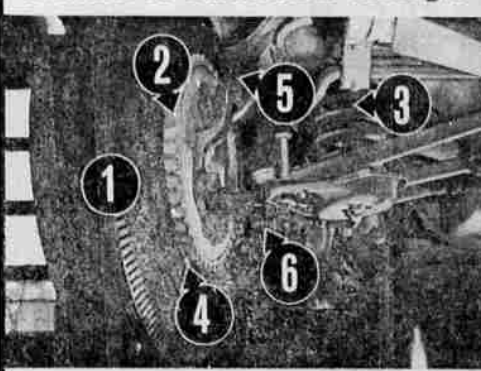
