The Week in California Politics and Deaths Top News For Week; Bar Meeting Ends

The death of Marilyn Monroe and the execution of three persons in the San Quentin gas chamber topped the news from California last week.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Republicans: California Republicans closed ranks behind Richard M. Nixon and said "the feel of victory is in the air." Nixon spoke to a convention of the Republican State Central committee in Sacramento. The GOP candidate for governor and the entire Republican ticket won public endorsement from Assemblyman Joseph C. Nihell, who lost to Nixon in the June primary.

Coaches: The sports world mourned the death of two of America's greatest track coaches, Dean B. Cromwell and Robert Lyman (Dink) Templeton. Last rites were held in Los Angeles for Cromwell, famed University of Southern California mentor and on the same day Templeton, the one-time "Boy Coach" of Stanford, died in Palo Alto. Both succumbed from heart attacks. Cromwell was 82 and Templeton 65.

Cromwell coached at USC from 1908 until 1949 and built the Trojans into one of the nation's top track powers. He coached the 1948 U.S. Olympic track team and tutored such great athletes as sprinter Mel Patton. Templeton coached the Indians for 19 years, directing the Tribe to three NCAA championships. As an athlete, he also starred in football and rugby.

Cantor: Mrs. Ida Cantor, known to millions through her famous husband Eddie Cantor's theme song "Ida," died of a heart attack in Los Angeles. She was 70. The couple had celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary only June 9. She had been confined to a bed since February due to a previous heart attack.

Aerospace: Negotiators continued trying to iron out a dispute involving five aerospace firms in California. Unions involved were the United Auto Workers and the International Association of Machinists. Their contracts had expired with North American Aviation, Lockheed, Convair of General Dynamics, Ryan Aviation and Aerojet General.

Garners: A judge denied a

request by a San Quentin death row inmate for a "final moment of personal contact" with his wife before he is executed Sept. 4. Condemned murderer Lawrence C. Garner, 30, had asked that he be allowed to be with his wife with no guard or matron present. But Marin County Superior Judge N. Charles Brunsford commented the request was understandable, but also "unrealistic, improper and il-

legal." The wife, Sondra, 26, is serving a life term at Corona State prison. They were sentenced for the 1950 slaying of a couple in San Bernardino county.

ABA: The American Bar association held its annual convention in San Francisco. During the week-long affair, ABA President John C. Satterfield and U. S. Attorney General Robert Kennedy presented sharply divergent views regarding expansion of government powers; a committee of the ABA criticized President Kennedy for the quality and partisanship of federal judge appointments; and Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.), said labor unions have become too big for the best interests of the nation.

Theater Groups To Meet in Eugene

Eugene—Gov. Mark O. Hatfield will welcome some 700 members of the American Educational Theater Association, Inc. to Oregon Aug. 20 at the first general session of the association's national convention at the University of Oregon.

Delivering the keynote address at that same meeting will be Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, president of the university.

The three day convention will meet in Erb Memorial union on the Eugene campus.

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Home Business Request Is Approved

One request for permission to operate a home occupation was approved by the Medford planning commission Thursday night, but a second applicant was advised to seek neighborhood reaction to her proposal.

An application from Dwaine Smith, operator of Classic Studios, to operate a photographic studio as a home occupation in a multiple-family zone at 1306 West Main st. was approved by the commission after Smith agreed to abide by certain sign restrictions.

Smith's studio was formerly located at 1115 West Main st., but a move was necessitated when the property was purchased to make room for a new Safeway store at Hamilton and West Main sts.

A request from Mrs. E. G. Hawkins, 508 Garfield st., to operate a ceramics school in her residence as a home occupation was continued by the commission until its next regular meeting on Sept. 13 to give Mrs. Hawkins an opportunity to determine if any of her neighbors would object to the operation of her business.

In other action, the commission voted to:

—Approve a request for a variance to the side yard setback requirements in a multiple-family zone for property at 28 Myrtle st.

—Grant tentative approval of Blossom Hill Terrace, Unit No. 3.

—Approve a request to vacate a portion of Grand ave. east of Yucca st. in Blossom Terrace, Unit No. 2.

—Grant tentative approval

of Sakiyon Village subdivision.

—Approve a request for annexation of property east of Murphy rd. and south of the Rogue Valley Country club.

—Schedule a public hearing for Sept. 13 on a request for a change of zone from single-family to limited commercial for property on the east side of Biddle rd. opposite the freeway interchange.

—Schedule a public hearing for a variance to the rear yard setback requirements in a multiple-family zone for four lots in Block 13 of the Laurelhurst Addition.

Three commission members were absent at the meeting, which was presided over by Commission Chairman Charles Cray.

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
