Americans Hike Insurance Costs For Automobiles

New York — (UPI) — American motorists, buying cars this year at a boom rate, upped their spending for insurance premiums by nearly 58 percent in a 10-year span to \$5.9 billion, Insurance Information Institute figures showed today.

The Institute in its 1962 booklet, also was ready to tell why insurance rates have changed and even how some motorists can reduce their spending on premiums.

Three Categories

In its report on premiums written for 1961, the institute divided spending into three categories: automobile liability insurance, \$2.8 billion on bodily injury policies, \$1.16 billion on property damage; and \$1.95 billion on physical damage.

The total, just over \$5.9 billion compares with approximately \$1.27 billion, \$64 billion and \$1.5 billion in the same classifications for 1952, or a total of more than \$3.4 billion in premiums.

If you are one of the millions of Americans who has recently paid up your insurance so that you can drive with some peace of mind, you may have asked your agent what keeps the price of insurance up.

Principal Factors

According to the institute, there are three principal factors for changes in rates. They are: The frequency of traffic accidents, the costs of repairing "both vehicles and people" after accidents and the costs of claim settlements and court awards.

A traffic accident figure is climbing year after year on streets and highways, said the institute, at times reaching a frequency of one every three seconds.

Man Wanted Here Arrested in Texas

A man, wanted by Medford city police on several bad check charges, has been arrested by authorities in Beaumont, Texas.

According to information received here, Tommy Jerry Bumstead, 26, was taken into custody Friday on the warrant issued by Medford city police.

Bumstead's bail was set at \$1,500. Officers said he will be returned to Medford shortly to face prosecution on the check charges.

Two Women Notify Police of Attacks

Two Medford women have told city police they were molested by an early-morning attacker — possibly the same man — during the last three days.

A 30-year-old woman who lives alone told off-ers that when she answered a knock on her door about 3 a.m. Saturday, a man pushed his way into her Maple st. residence.

A similar incident was reported Monday. A young housewife on Edwards st. told officers she was awakened about 3:40 a.m. by a man standing by her bed, and touching her.

She said the man threatened to harm her children if she cried out. But he fled, the housewife said, when she told him she was going to scream if he didn't leave.

Both women gave similar descriptions of the man. He was described as being a male Caucasian about six feet tall and weighing about 180 pounds.

Officers today are continuing an investigation of both incidents.

Japanese Official Visiting in Oregon

Salem — (UPI) — Tadashi Saito, vice governor of the state of Hokkaido, Japan, was to visit with Gov. Mark Hatfield today.

The Japanese official is touring this country to study dairy and agricultural operations for information for a 10-year agricultural plan for his own country.

Saito also planned to stop at Corvallis to talk with farming experts at Oregon State University before continuing to other states.

Saito arrived Monday in Portland. He told Mayor Terry Schunk Oregon and Hokkaido have striking similarities in "climate and spirit."

A native of Portland's sister city of Sapporo, Saito said he considered farming interests one source of mutual good will.

Truckers Fined For ICC Violations

Portland — (UPI) — Four Northwest truckers were fined a total of \$1,100 in Federal Court Monday for violating Interstate Commerce Commission rules.

The heaviest fine, \$500, was levied against Nic-L-Silver Battery Co. of Sherwood for failing to keep proper driver's logs.

Fines also were levied against Rogue Trailer Convoy of Grants Pass, Vancouver Fast Freight of Vancouver, Wash., and Magee Truck Service of Klickitat, Wash.

Unions May Sue For Member's Pay

Portland — (UPI) — Circuit Judge Arno Denecke ruled Monday that a labor union can bring suit for one of its members who has been awarded back pay but never collected it.

The case involves a suit brought by Office Employees Local 11 against Carpenters' Local 226. An adjustment board said the carpenters' local should pay back salary to an office worker.

The carpenters did not pay. Then they contended a suit by the office workers' local to collect the money was illegal.

Judge Denecke's ruling means the case can go to trial.
