

Reds Win Ninth Straight; Still Are Pennant Contender

Frank Robinson is on the loose—and that means the Cincinnati Reds must still be reckoned with in the National League race.

The Reds are 6½ games behind the first-place Los Angeles Dodgers and four behind the second-place San Francisco Giants but they've reeled off nine straight victories and have a four-game series coming up with the Dodgers this week end.

And the way Robinson is going they can't yet be counted out of the race.

Won Award
Robinson, who won the league's Most Valuable Player award in 1961, could very well join Ernie Banks as the only NL players to take it two consecutive years. He's batting .343, has knocked in 102 runs and has hit 27 homers and 42 doubles.

Robinson and Jim O'Toole, another of the Reds' pennant-winning heroes of 1961 teamed Monday night to lead the Reds to a 10-3 triumph over the Milwaukee Braves in the only NL game. Robinson drove in five runs with his second grand slam homer of the season and a double while O'Toole struck out a career high 12 batters and pitched a six-hitter.

O'Toole, a 10-game winner last season, edged over 500 (13-12) for the first time this season. He retired the first 18 batters he faced and didn't walk a batter in pitching the fifth straight complete game by the Cincinnati staff.

Angels Win
The Los Angeles Angels and Minnesota Twins, meanwhile, don't seem to realize that just about everyone has awarded the American league pennant to the New York Yankees.

The Angels moved to within 4½ games of the Yankees

when they beat the Boston Red Sox, 5-1, Monday night while the Twins delighted a record crowd of 41,386 in Minneapolis-St. Paul with a 6-4 victory over New York. The Washington Senators swept a doubleheader from the Cleveland Indians 11-2 and 3-2, in other AL action.

Ted Bowsfield, who hadn't pitched a complete game since last Sept. 25, hurled 4 2/3 perfect innings and went on to notch a five-hit triumph at Los Angeles. The Angels scored single runs in the first and third innings and clinched the game with a three-run seventh-inning rally in which Lee Thomas hit a two-run single. The loss snapped a five-game Red Sox winning streak.

Five RBI's
Harmon Killebrew drove in five runs with three singles and a double to lead a 12-hit Minnesota attack. Killebrew, whose 85 RBI's lead the AL, doubled with the bases filled in the eighth inning to overcome a 4-3 Yankee lead. Tom Tresh hit his 13th homer for the Yankees. Ray Moore gained his eighth win for the Twins in relief.

Three-run homers by Harry Bright proved decisive in both games for the Senators. Bright gave the Senators a 3-0 lead with a homer off Dick Donovan in the first game and then connected in the ninth inning of the nightcap. Don Lock also hit a three-run homer for the Senators in the first game.

2 World Champs Slated For Fights This Week

New York — OPI — Two world champions are slated for action on this week's boxing schedule.

Featherweight ruler Davey Moore of Columbus, Ohio, defends his 126-pound title against unranked Olli Maeki of Finland at Helsinki, Finland, Friday night in Scandinavia's first world title fight.

On Saturday night welterweight champion Emile Griffith of New York meets middleweight contender Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., in a nationally televised non-title 10-rounder at Tacoma, Wash. In two previous bouts each won a decision.

Moore, 28, will be making the fifth defense of the feather crown he won from Hogan Kid Bassey in 1959. He defended against Bassey, Kazuo Takayama, Danny Valdez and Takayama again, 1st Nov. 13.

Moore's 15-round fight with speedy but light-hitting Maeki will be staged at the Helsinki Stadium, built for the Olympic games in 1952. Promoter Elis Ask hopes for a crowd of more than 25,000 and a gate of more than \$150,000. Moore's guarantee is at least \$30,000.

Challenger Maeki, former European amateur champion, has had but 10 bouts since he turned professional in 1960. He won eight, lost one and drew in one but never scored a knockout.

Saturday night's television fight at Tacoma is staged there in conjunction with the National Boxing Association's annual convention, which opens in that city the following day.

It will be the second fight for champion Griffith since his fatal title victory over the late Benny Kid Paret on March 24. He beat Ralph Dupas in a title fight on July 13.

Griffith will be favored at about 8-5 over Moyer because of his punch. Each is an excellent boxer.

Emil and Denny had their two fights in 1960. Griffith won the first at New York, March 11; but Moyer took an avenging decision in their return bout at Portland, Ore., April 26.
