Salem—Gov. Mark Hatfield Tuesday announced the formation of an Oregon-Hokkaido rural cooperation society.

The Oregon governor told of the formation of the group when he met with Tadashi Saito, vice governor of the Japanese state.

Oregon and Hokkaido are considering a sister-state relationship. Sapporo, Hokkaido's largest city is a sister city of Portland.

Mutual Advantage Hatfield said purpose of the new organization is to provide closer ties with one of the foremost customers of our agricultural products and to give opportunities for the two states to study the similarities of climate and soil for mutual advantage.

Saito visited Oregon at the direction of Hokkaido Gov. Kingo Machimura.

He met with Hatfield and Joe Saito, Ontario, a member of the State Board of Agriculture, as well as other state government officials.

Hatfield will serve as chairman of the new committee and Portland Mayor Terry Schunk will be an honorary board member.
