

Upland Bird Hunt Regulations Set

Portland - UPI - The state game commission Tuesday set upland game bird season regulations after a public hearing here.

The Chukar partridge season in Eastern Oregon only will extend from Sept. 8 through Dec. 2. Hungarian partridge also are included in this season due to difficulty in distinguishing between the two species.

Bag limit for these birds was set for 6 daily and 12 in possession. Quail hunters in Eastern Oregon were given a season extending from 8 a.m. Oct. 13 through Dec. 2. In Western Oregon the quail season will end Nov. 18. The season includes mountain, valley and bobwhite with an aggregate bag limit of 10 daily, 20 in possession. Last year there were separate bag limits in mountain and valley quail.

Similar to 1951. Pheasant hunters were given a season similar to last year extending from 8 a.m. Oct. 13 through Nov. 18. The entire state will be open with a bag limit of three cocks daily, 12 in possession.

An eight-day sage grouse season will run from Sept. 8 through Sept. 16 with bag limit of 2 daily, 4 in possession. Area open to sage grouse hunting included Lake, Harney and that part of Malheur county south of Highway 30. A split season was ordered for blue and ruffed grouse hunters with a seven-day season for Western Oregon hunters starting Sept. 1. This coincides with the band-tailed pigeon season and allows hunters to seek both species.

A two-week season is set for Eastern Oregon hunters, Sept. 8-23. Bag limit on blue and ruffed grouse was set for 3 birds daily, 6 in possession in the aggregate.

Ellis Hurls No-Hit Win for San Diego

By RAYMOND L. ANDREWS, United Press International. Sam Ellis of San Diego was in top form the last time he pitched but he was even sharper in Tuesday night's Pacific Coast league play with a 4-0, no-hit, no-run victory against Tacoma.

Ellis, a 21-year-old right-hander down from Cincinnati, fanned seven and allowed six walks in registering his tenth victory of the season.

Salt Lake City topped Spokane 6-3, Portland took Vancouver 5-3 and Seattle blanked Hawaii 2-0 in other games.

Ellis, a former Mississippi State star, had pitched a four-hitter and fanned 12 his last time out before coming up with his no-hitter.

San Diego, which still leads the top by 11 games, got all it needed when Jim Pisoni hit his 14th homer in the third. The Padres got another in the fourth when Ron Samford's sacrifice scored Tommy Harper from third and added single runs in the fifth and ninth.

Tacoma has now gone 30 long innings without scoring a run.

Seattle's Pete Smith wasn't far behind Ellis with a three-hitter over Hawaii. Smith fanned three and walked three for his eighth victory.

Seattle got both its markers in the third on a single by Ted Schreiber, a walk, an error, a sacrifice fly and a single by Jim Rivera.

Hal Jones banged a two-run homer in the seventh to carry Salt Lake City to its win. Dave Tyrivier picked up

And millions more, headed by President Kennedy, will pause to consider the contributions Mr. Stagg has made in the world of sports and physical fitness.

Mr. Stagg will be at home in Stockton, Calif., where with his wife, Stella, he has lived for the past 30 years. It is probable that their little home on a tree-shaded street will be flooded with letters and telegrams of congratulations.

The old football coach is used to receiving them. Down through the years he has been remembered daily, weekly or yearly by thousands of his former players, coaches and friends.

"I took an oath when I was a young man that I would help young people," he recalls. "And that has been my whole life."

Americans Fare Well In Meets
United Press International. Touring American track stars fared well in two track meets in Finland Tuesday. At Lahti, an American Athletic union team won three events and in an international meet at Kouvola, Willie Atterbury and Paul Drayton each scored victories.

Ulis Williams of the Southern California Striders won the 400-meter run in 47.9 seconds at Lahti; Bob Hayes of Florida A&M took the 200-meters in 22 seconds flat; and Bill Dotson won the 3,000-meter run in 8 minutes, 32.4 seconds.
