Committee Suggests \$10 Million for Research Center

Portland — (UPI) — A special governor's advisory committee Tuesday recommended a research and graduate center, located near Portland, and launched with "not less than \$10 million."
The committee said the \$10 million would cover an organizing period of a little over a year plus three to four years of actual operation.
The committee said an initial committee of the governor, educators, and business and labor representatives should name a board of trustees to develop the center.
When the center is created, the committee said, the trustees should pick "an unusually capable science-administrator" as executive director to run it.
The 35-page report on an Oregon Cooperative Center for Graduate Education and Advanced Research was prepared by a special committee headed by Richard H. Sullivan.
Hatfield Praises Report
Gov. Mark Hatfield, who requested the report, said a center could create new jobs, new products, and keep important brain power in Oregon.
"In addition it can attract new money for our state," he said in accepting the report.
The committee said the center should be operated as a "non-profit, tax-exempt corporation" on a state-wide "cooperative basis, drawing participation and strength from existing institutions."

Two Persons Hurt In 3 Accidents

Two persons were slightly injured in separate vehicle accidents in Medford Monday, according to city police reports.

Patricia Kaye Pratt, 44, Portland, a passenger in a car driven by Roy Alexander Rodgers, 46, Ashland, received minor injuries, police said, when the Rodgers vehicle collided with a car driven by David Clifford Tisch, 17, Hayward, Calif., about 5:15 p.m. at Maple and Pine sts. Rodgers was cited for failure to yield the right of way.

Timothy Garnet O'Mara, 17, of 2424 Edgemont st., received abrasions and bruises, officers said, when the car which he was driving struck a concrete guard rail on Barnett rd. between South Riverside and Stewart aves. The accident occurred about 5:45 a.m.

In a third accident Monday a car operated by Virginia Ruth Ellis, 37, Central Point, struck a parked car registered to Lynne Alice McClurg, 1310 East 10th st., about 5:11 p.m. in front of 1109 Court st. Miss McClurg was cited for improper parking. No injuries were reported, police said.

Winter Recession Expected by Meany

Chicago — (UPI) — President George Meany, of the AFL-CIO, has forecast a winter economic recession in the United States and called for a shorter work week and a tax cut to combat it.
The demands were made at the federation's summer executive council meeting, which will continue through Friday. The 27-member council voted to press for a 35-hour work week with double pay for overtime.

Meany also proposed a long-range, across-the-board tax cut coupled with revision of tax laws to close loopholes and place a withholding provision on dividends and interest.

Meany said the drive for a 35-hour week would be carried out both at the bargaining table and in the halls of Congress. "We are having more success with the employers than with Congress but we intend to fight."

The council named a committee to draft proposed 35-hour work week legislation for presentation to Congress at the next session. It also established a task force to provide an "immediate tax
