

Students Research Park Grizzly Bears

Yellowstone Park, Wyo. — Last summer two scholarly brothers succeeded in the ticklish task of attaching radio transmitters to the necks of two fierce 700-pound grizzly bears.

This year, Montana State university biologists John and Frank Craighead are hoping for a scientific payoff to their little game of "bugging the bear."

Purpose of the research is to trace the unknown habits of the grizzly, which is dangerously close to extinction. Civilization has reduced the grizzly population to about 1,000, excluding Alaska. An estimated 170 live in Yellowstone park.

By "bugging" the bears, the Craigheads listen on radio receivers to "beeps," thereby plotting the movements, feeding and mating of the huge animals. But the brothers say their information may have more widespread importance.

Space scientists are interested in the deep winter slumber of bears in hibernation. A study of the blood chemistry of grizzlies may shed some light on hardening of the arteries in humans.

The Craigheads believe this should be a productive year for statistics. The past three years of their project have been devoted mainly to finding a workable method of handling the animals.

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A Physician Looks at Automobile Accidents

I recently read in the Statistical Bulletin of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company that each year now automobile accidents take some 38,000 lives and inflict disabling injuries on an additional 1,400,000 persons. A fourth of these deaths occur to men in their prime of life between the ages of 20 and 40 years.

Of late, the psychologists studying the persons who are prone to have automobile accidents have learned that at anyone who has been arrested several times for traffic violations, or who has social maladjustments, or has some unfortunate trait of personality, is the one most likely to have trouble.

The first thought that comes to a physician is that the man who has auto accidents probably has a poor muscular coordination or slow reaction time, or poor vision, but studies do not indicate that these defects are the important ones. Also, it has been found that "repeaters" (with a record of previous wrecks) account for only a small percentage of the automobile accidents. In Connecticut this number is only 3 to 4 per cent.

It is the person who is inclined to disregard traffic regulations who is most likely to have a traffic accident. Persons who never have been given a ticket rarely have a bad accident. In a certain study it was found that the number of accidents per driver shot up from 0.167 for those who never had a ticket to 1.001 for drivers who had had five tickets.

Several studies have shown that persons who are maladjusted and hostile and unwilling to accept regulations are likely to have auto accidents; also the 16-year-old boy is decidedly accident-prone. This is particularly true if the boy often is truant from school, and has a record of one or more court offenses.

A study in Iowa also showed that anyone who has two or three traffic violations noted on his record is likely some day to have a bad auto accident. "Speeding" has the highest association with accidents; next comes "improper passing" and "failure to observe stop signs." Several times in my life I have narrowly missed death when a man drove rapidly out of a side road without stopping as he should have done before entering a main highway. He and I both had a very narrow escape.

Varicose Vein Surgery
Hundreds of women ask whether they should have an operation on their varicose veins—not because the veins are causing pain or swelling of the ankles, but because they look ugly. Usually I cannot hazard an answer because the woman fails to tell me whether she is talking about the big, worm-like veins under the skin of her legs, or is talking about the little "spider" dark-blue veins under the skin on the outer side of her thighs.

The big veins when trouble-

some should be removed by a surgeon, with the "stripping operation," but if they are not causing any trouble it may be that for a while they can be left alone. An expert on diseases of veins may say that it would be better to get them out before the system of valves is destroyed—the valves that help to keep the blood running up the leg and thigh.

The little spider veins are hard to treat, and probably had better be left alone. When a woman goes swimming, she might hide them from sight with a water-proof covering preparation which can be found at many beauty counters and drug stores. It is the covering preparation that can completely hide a "port wine" birth mark on the face or arm.
