Chico Ruiz of San Diego was a rather busy man in Thursday night's Pacific Coast league play.

He collected four hits, stole two bases, scored two runs and drove in the winning run in the Padres' 3-2 victory over the Tacoma Giants.

In other games, Vancouver topped Portland 3-2 in 12 innings, Spokane defeated Salt Lake City 5-3 and Seattle won a pair from Hawaii, 1-0 and 6-2.

Tacoma was tied with San Diego 2-2 in the eighth following a two-run pinch hit homer by Dusty Rhodes.

However, in the bottom half of the inning, Jim Pisoni got aboard on a fielder's choice, advanced to second on a bunt and crossed on a double by Ruiz.

Ruiz stole his 29th and 30th bases of the season in the first when he singled and then swiped second and third and scored on Jesse Gonder's single.

Vancouver's overtime win over Portland came when Jay Ward singled with the bases loaded in the 12th. Al Schroll was the winner in relief. Ward also had a double in the Mounties' 10-hit attack.

Moyer All Set For Griffith

Tacoma-UPB-Portland's Denny Moyer was ready today for his non-title scrap here Saturday night against welterweight King Emile Griffith.

The 10-round fight will be telecast nationally. Moyer and Griffith have traded decisions in the past. Although an underdog, Moyer expressed confidence, saying, "both of our other fights were close and I won the last one. I think I can win this time."

Helsinki, Finland-UPB-Edie Cotton, top-ranked light heavyweight from Seattle, and Pekka Hokkonen of Helsinki were to go at it over the 10-round distance for the second time this summer when they meet in Olympic Stadium here today.

Musial Night At New York

New York-UPB-Stan (The Man) Musial says he'll "be back next year," and 30,000 fans will inform him how happy they are with that decision at the Polo Grounds tonight.

The 41-year-old St. Louis Cardinals' star, who has scrapped all plans for retiring after this season, will be honored by New York baseball fans prior to a game between the Mets and the Cardinals.

Musial's "night" will be unique in that he will not be presented with a new automobile and other personal gifts, with the exception of some token presents from close friends.

All cash donations will be endowed in a scholarship at Columbia University pursuant to Musial's wishes.

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These restrictions were put in effect, in the first place, at the insistence of Shrine coaches and had been in force since the first A-1 Shrine game in Portland for both State-Metro and East-West games. Coaches had felt that, with the limited time available, it was asking too much to prepare to meet different defenses and so in turn had to limit or restrict the offense.

Woodward said that he and his staff agreed first with West Head Coach Bob Peterson, Myrtle Point, and his staff to take away the restrictions. They, then found the game officials "real happy" about it since they feel it will open up the game more and make it more exciting.

The Phoenix mentor pointed out, just the same, that East coaches may be the ones to suffer because of the fact that "Coach Peterson uses more formations than Heinz has pickles." Added Woodward, "Really, I would rather score a dull victory than have an exciting victory. But, honestly, it should be more fun. And, this game is supposed to be just for fun. Ha!"

The East mentor reported that all four players from the Rogue valley are showing well and are bound to see lots of action. When Woodward wrote, Steve Geren, Eagle Point, was fighting it out with Bill Fisher for the left halfback job. Mike Conbruck, Phoenix, and Roger Hiatt, Vale, were battling for fullback. Paul Elliott, end from St. Mary's of Medford, "is looking real good for us."

At center, Terry Hanson, Phoenix, was contending with Dennis McCoy, 200-pounder from Umatilla.

"We have some top players, we think, in . . . Hiatt . . . Keith Weber, a guard who played for Tinker Hatfield at Central Linn, Eddy Banker of Stanfield and Gary Cox of Drain in addition to players from our area," reported Woodward. Hatfield formerly coached at Rogue River.

"We are using both T and single wing and will probably run more from T than I ever had due to the fact we have this boy Cox from Drain," the East coach said.

Woodward also stated, "... it is a great experience to coach under these conditions. We have the boys on hand all the time. There is nothing to interfere with their 'education' such as work, school, etc."

The Phoenix coach described the two practices per day as rather hard on him since he is not used to them. He said, nevertheless, he realizes what he misses by not having the opportunity to have two per day at Phoenix. He reported that it seems his squad had done more in two days of daily double drills than can be accomplished by one night drill per day over two weeks.

Bob Waterfield of the Los Angeles Rams for Saturday night's National Football league pre-season game at Multnomah Stadium.

Van Brocklin named Oregon's own George Shaw to handle the quarterback assignment in a backfield with Hugh McElhenney and Jerry Reichow at halfbacks and Glen Shaw at fullback.

The Viking offensive line will consist of Tom Adams and Gordon Smith at ends; Grady Alderman and Frank Youso at tackles; Gerry Huth and Mike Rabold at guards and Ken Petersen at center.

The Rams will counter with a backfield unit consisting of Zeke Bratkowski at quarterback, Jon Arnett and Ollie Matson at halfbacks and Dick Bass at fullback.

In the line for the Rams will be Carroll Dale and Jim Phillips at ends, Jim Boeke and Frank Varrichione at tackles, Charlie Cowan and Joe Seibell at guards and Art Hunter at center.

As warm weather and local Viking practices perked up interest in the game, Oregon Sports Attractions held to an earlier prediction of 25,000 fans.

Randall's Chuck Wagon Of Salem Defends; Four Tilts Slated Opening Day

Randall's Chuck Wagon of Salem will aim for its fourth championship in five years in the men's state tournament of the Oregon State Softball association which opens with four games on Saturday, Aug. 18, at Memorial field, White City.

Four games also are scheduled on Sunday and the double-elimination tournament will continue through Wednesday, Aug. 22, at the Veterans Administration domiciliary park. A regional tourney spot goes to the champion.

Hal's Sport shop of Klamath Falls and Lake Grove Finance are contestants in the first game at 2 p.m. Saturday. Stoddard-Frink Chevrolet of Albany and McCulloch Chain Saw of Eugene are 3:30 p.m. rivals.

The two-game evening session opens at 7:15 p.m. with Corvallis Merchants against Randall's. Then, at 8:45 p.m. host John Wheeler Logging of Medford engages Bob's Hiway service of Bendleton.

Four Games Sunday
First round losers have games at 2 and 3:30 p.m. on Sunday and opening game winners move to Sunday night tussles.

Randall's won the state championship in 1958, 1959 and 1961. Mocks Comets of Eugene reigned in 1960.

This will be the 26th Oregon state softball meet. The first was held in 1933. With the exception of the war years, 1943, 1944 and 1945, the tournament has been conducted each season since then.

While Randall's is defender, at least one local person says Lake Grove should be considered the toughest team in the tournament. The Grovers took second place this season in the strong Portland Major league. Lake Grove, however, is not representing Portland.

The players outside the city limits of the metropolis and thereby qualify for participation in the state tourney. Portland, itself sends a team to the regional.

No. 1 at Portland
One of the Grover pitchers, Don Ellison, last year was named the No. 1 pitcher in the Portland circuit. Another Lake Grove thrower, Ron Davidson, pitched Mill City to the state championship in 1953.

Team rosters indicate that the "outstanding" players of last year's tournament and most members of the 1961 all-star team will be on hand.

Salem's Gene Hifflicker was picked as outstanding pitcher last year and Corvallis' Hal Wolmeier as outstanding hitter. Homer Applegate, Corvallis second baseman, was

Jones' car is built on a Model A frame and powered by a 1955 Chevrolet engine. He has raced it on many tracks and holds the track record at Crescent City at 14.5 seconds. Recently he raced for two days at Ontario, Ore., and then for two more days in the Tater Cup classics at Meridian, Idaho.

The Medford speedway is located on Antelope road east of Crater Lake highway in White City. Admission will be charged and concessions will be available at the track.

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
