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Kindergartners Lose Creativity Due to Inhibition

Washington — If your creative five-year-old seems to lose his creativity the moment he enters kindergarten, don't blame the teacher or the school. The cause is probably sex's sudden awareness of his facing because of it.
This advice from the National Education Association is based on a recent research study conducted at the University of Minnesota and reported by Dr. E. Paul Torrance, director of the university's bureau of educational research.

When children begin to notice sex differences—when they learn that some activities are taboo for girls and others are not appropriate for boys—that when their ability to think creatively takes a sharp drop.

Usually that's around age five, the researchers found. The kind of behavior adults expect of a child that age represents a crisis that affects his creative abilities, the report found. Children in other countries experience similar crises when their behavior patterns are changed, the study indicated, but the terms are different in different cultures.

For American youngsters similar crises are reported to occur at ages nine, 13 and 17. "It is interesting to note that each of the generalist drops occur at ages at which the transitions from one developmental stage to another begins," says Dr. Torrance. "The drop at about five occurs with the end of the childhood stage and the beginning of the juvenile stage with its demands for social accommodation and compromise and acceptance of activities outside him. The second drop occurs with the onset of the adolescent stage with its increased need for consensual validation, peer approval, identification with peers of the same sex, and conformity to peer norms," according to Dr. Torrance.

"We have observed," Dr. Torrance points out, "that concerns about sex appropriateness and emphasis on differences become tremendously inhibiting at about age five and continue into the beginning of the first grade." When youngsters were asked to think of improvements that could be made on certain toys, "we found that boys at this age would frequently refuse to offer any suggestions for improving a nurse kit and some girls similarly refused to think of ideas for improving a toy fire truck. Some of the more creative boys, however, first changed the nurse kit to a doctor's kit, after which it was quite legitimate and respectable to think of ideas. Thus we see that whole areas of experience become taboo, and thinking thereby inhibited."

Another inhibiting factor in young children, Dr. Torrance said, was found to be the forced stifling of fantasy. "Many children at this age are inhibited in their thinking because they have been warned harshly by parents and teachers that they must eliminate fantasy. Although we are interested in developing a sound type of creativity, we need to keep fantasy alive until the child's mental development is such that he can engage in this sound type of realistic creative thinking."

Thornton Outlines Economic Plans

— Support for President Kennedy's program "vital to Oregon's prosperity."
