Joseph A.—This year Lew's parents want to come along on our camping trip!

Lewis M.—That's the only way we can get the use of their new car.

Joseph A.—For the past two years my wife and I have spent our vacation period going on camping trips with a family car. It's Lew's turn this year and suddenly he springs the news on us that we'll be three couples this time, the third being his father and mother. It's supposed to be a package deal. This time they go along with their car. I doubt that they'd enjoy the sort of trip we like, and we surely won't be able to have fun traveling the way older people prefer.

Lewis M.—My folks have a brand new car and they're curious to know what we find so fascinating about camping trips. So they've tied a string on their usual offer to me. This time they want to be included in the party. This puts me on the spot. If I say no, I'll not only insult them but I won't get the car and the whole trip will probably be off. Motion Pictures Doing Big Business In Puerto Rico

New York (UPI)—Not too many new 1,400-seat motion picture houses are planned for cities in the United States these days, but one is being contemplated for San Juan.

Few proprietors have spent up to \$300,000 refurbishing a downtown theater recently in these parts, but that also has taken place in San Juan.

The man who heads the organization doing this sort of thing is Rafael Ramos Cobian, San Juan, P.R., who started operating a single theater in the small town of Coamo 37 years ago. He took it over to help boost sales of a drug store which he operated on the strength of his early training as a pharmacist.

Since that time he and his former competitor and present chairman of the board of directors, Victor Carrady, 42-year-old financier, have welded a chain of 42 theaters into a corporation, the Commonwealth Theatres of Puerto Rico.

"People in Puerto Rico like movies," Cobian said on a recent trip here.
