Newlyweds Should Agree On How Money Is Spent

New York—(UPI)—A couple's agreement on how they spend their money is far more important than how they actually spend it.

This budget wisdom comes from Philip W. Smith, vice president and manager of installment credit for Chase Manhattan bank.

Smith, soft-spoken, relaxed, had none of the expected financial tables, no pat spending formula. His whole approach to the problem was refreshing and encouraging in contrast with so much of the current how-to budget advice.

Ideally, this banker feels, a young couple should discuss before marriage just how the family income will be dispensed. "But, of course, no one ever does. Would you really expect it?" he commented.

Should Agree
Smith would urge every couple in the first months of married life (and for the no longer newlyweds it never is too late) to establish a working partnership, come to agreement on the main points of how and when their money should be spent. Probably no two couples will come up with the same answer.

Rare, too, will be the husband and wife who agree completely on how to spend a given sum. If through trial and error, through give and take, they come to a working agreement, spending need not be a matter for argument.

If they both are willing to eat frankfurters and beans in order to squeeze in the theater evenings she treasures and the camping trips he wants them to take, it doesn't matter that their budget is out of balance when held up to a so-called model spending plan.

Make Provision
Smith would urge all young people to make early provision

for a liberal and extremely flexible "miscellaneous" fund. He suggested that they talk to other couples in their group to help reach a realistic determination of what spending should encompass in view of the style of living in a given community.

The spending pattern of a couple in New York would, of course, differ sharply from that of a rural couple with the same income. They must decide what emphasis is to be put on social life, clothes, whether or not a car is necessary.

To critics of installment buying, Smith answered that "most young people just could not afford to marry at a competitive age unless they were willing to go into debt. Most young couples could not furnish their homes if they tried to do it on a strictly cash basis."

Actually, he said, "debt is a wonderful education for the young; it teaches character and planning." And people who deal with installment credit have experienced very little difficulty with young couples, he reported.

Insurance Needed
Insurance should be everybody's concern, Smith feels. Certainly there should be life insurance on the wage earner, with a program planned as early as possible to take advantage of favorable rates for the young. Other forms of insurance, again, depend on individual circumstances. "For instance, how dependent are they upon their own resources? In a real emergency would there be family to count on?"

An investment program should not be part of a young family's spending, he feels. "First thought should be for savings which offer more flexibility. Investment can come later."

Put Off Home
And Smith believes young people should put off buying a home. "It generally is not economical to buy for short term need and it is foolish as a long term commitment," he said. "Home ownership is not a savings but a luxury, albeit a very desirable one at the right time." A young couple, he feels, needs freedom to determine its future—to go where opportunity and inclination beckon.

As for the old question: "to charge or not to charge," Smith said charge accounts, properly used, are a good thing. His wife has convinced him that, at least in this day and age, a charge account offers perhaps the best insurance of quality and satisfaction on purchases.

San Francisco Widow Donates To Native Land

San Francisco — (UPI) — The story of the European who migrates to America, becomes a success, and then donates money to his native village, is a familiar one.

Such a story can be told about a San Francisco woman — with one exception. This woman is far from wealthy.

Mrs. Katrina Jellepis is a 76-year-old widow who works in a laundry, and earns \$240 a month. She pays \$1.50 a day for a hotel room in an area that's slated eventually for slum clearance.

Yet Mrs. Jellepis, whose English still is imperfect, has donated thousands of dollars to a town in her native Greece.

Mrs. Jellepis left her native land with her husband in 1915. They settled in San Francisco and started a bakery. It thrived until the 1930's depression forced them out of business. Her sons married and moved away. Her husband died and Mrs. Jellepis started to work in the laundry.

"Twelve years ago, after her daughter Sophie died, Mrs. Jellepis decided to send what money she could back to her native land.

But the village of her birth had been wiped out by war. So she picked a nearby town — Kalabryta — as the object of her special interest. It also had suffered in full measure the horror of war.

Nazi troops killed almost all of the village's 1,500 men, then burned the church — which was packed with women praying for help.

Over the years, Mrs. Jellepis has sent what she could afford to Kalabryta — a total now above \$20,000.

The King of Greece heard about Mrs. Jellepis and bestowed on her the Royal Order of Welfare. The order is given to Greek women for service to their homeland through philanthropy.

And now the 760 residents of Kalabryta can worship in the rebuilt Greek Orthodox church. And there's a war memorial in the town square.

Women Flyers Equal Men Says Jacqueline Cochran

Los Angeles — (UPI) — America's number one aviatrix, Jacqueline Cochran, comes to the fast defense of women when asked why there are so few challenges for her crown.

Miss Cochran, the first woman to break the sound barrier and to fly twice the speed of sound, said bluntly women's aviation pioneering is a matter of money.

"Women fly just as well as men," Miss Cochran said. "They are absolutely just as efficient."

"But a woman must be a woman first of all," she said. This means marriage and family.

"You cannot train a person to fly the new jets for less than about \$150,000 to \$175,000," she explained. "And few airlines could afford such an investment in someone who would quit in a few years."

As for women's role in space flight, Miss Cochran believes it will depend on "a cold analysis of what the rewards of space are."

Flew Mach 1
"I flew Mach 1 (the speed of sound) a little less than five years after Chuck Yeager (pioneering pilot) made Mach 1," she said. "If we find man's personal exploration into space will bring sufficient rewards to justify it, then I think women will follow into space in about the same length of time or even less."

Miss Cochran spearheaded a program at the Lovelace Foundation in Albuquerque, N.M., in which the Mercury astronauts took were given to the would-be astronautess. "Twelve women passed with the same degree of efficiency as the men," Miss Cochran reported.

The flier—who marks her 30th anniversary as a pilot this year—continues to blaze aviation trails. In April, she streaked a four-engine compact jet to 69 new records, including 32 overall course records for both men and women.

Pilot Since 1932
Since she was licensed as a pilot in 1932 after three weeks training, she has chalked up an impressive array of aviation firsts. She currently holds 102 records.

Miss Cochran looks considerably younger than her 56 years but said, "I'm a basket case today."

The blonde flier had just returned to Los Angeles after landing the first jet (and first plane) at the new Oakland, Calif., airport. She explained she had been on a hectic schedule with only a few hours sleep the night before. Despite her protestations, she moved and talked with jet-paced energy.

The brown-eyed Miss Cochran in private life is the wife of financier Floyd Odum, the former chairman of the board of the Atlas Corporation and of RKO pictures. The two have joined forces to run the Cochran-Odum fruit ranch in India, Calif.

In addition to her extensive flying activities, she is boss of a cosmetics firm which bears her name.

Despite the fame her flying has brought her, there is no question in her mind which comes first.

"If I were faced with giving up my business or giving up flying," she said emphatically, "I would give up flying, much as I love it. My business is something enduring, something I have built up over the years."

Then, she added musingly, "It's almost something I have proven to myself."

She said, "I started working when I was 11. I have managed to go through life with a third grade education. But I have worked very hard to acquire some academic knowledge that one must have."

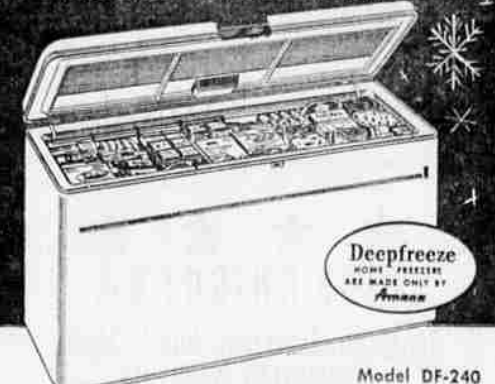
She credits her success in part to self-discipline — a quality she feels is absent in many persons today.

"I believe there is a great lack of self-discipline and stability in all walks of life. I think this applies to a great many young people. It's very difficult for them to make up their minds."

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
