Children's Art Display Continuing at Library

A display of international art work of children will remain on exhibit in the children's department of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson county this week.

Thirty-five countries are represented in the display, and all artwork was done by children from six to 15 years old. The show is sponsored by the Jackson county chapter of the Oregon United Nations association.

A meeting of interested persons was held recently in connection with the showing, at which Mrs. Benjamin J. Trowbridge Jr. spoke.

Mrs. Trowbridge's talk went behind the obvious international aspects of the show to the value artwork has for the child. She said that the "value

of stimulating a creative approach can be realized only if we avoid the pitfall of forcing our adult art standards on our youngsters." She pointed out that children view the world from a different perspective than adults, and therefore portray it differently.

"Tell me about your picture" was suggested as an appropriate substitution for the comment "What's that?" when viewing the artwork of children. The creativity of drawing gives a child an opportunity to express his own feelings, and may not be apparent to the viewer at once, she pointed out.

Mrs. Trowbridge added that the most important thing is to allow the child his own expression. He will ask for help when he can't produce what he wants to say, she said.
