

Possibility of Late Afternoon Bus Being Studied by School Officials

Medford school officials are studying the possibility of adding a late afternoon bus schedule for students participating in extra-curricular activities and for those who remain after school to study and do research work.

The school board last week authorized the study after it was suggested by Superintendent Dr. Leonard B. Mayfield.

He pointed out that the late afternoon bus schedule would provide a greater opportunity for students living in outlying areas to participate in activities held after school hours. It also would provide an opportunity for students to remain after school for study work which must be done either in the library or laboratory facilities.

Preliminary Study

Russell Acheson, assistant superintendent, submitted a preliminary study which indicated that five bus routes could handle the number of students needing transportation home between 5 and 5:30 p.m.

Board members indicated an interest in such a plan, but mentioned several possible abuses. Members suggested that the administration consider these in its more detailed study of the proposal.

School busses are used in many districts in this area to carry students home following after-school activities, school officials noted.

The board decided to seek state legal advice in connection with the controversy which has developed in Oregon concerning public-supplied textbooks to private and parochial schools.

Background of Case

The state legislature in 1957 passed a law which provided that public school districts furnish free textbooks to private and parochial schools. The law was contested by a Clackamas county resident.

In late 1961, the Oregon Supreme Court reversed the Clackamas county circuit court decision and ruled that the law was unconstitutional. The case has been appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, the Oregon attorney general has ruled that public school districts do not have to retrieve textbooks already distributed to private or Catholic schools, but the districts could not issue new textbooks.

This ruling was upheld recently by Judge Virgil Langtry in Multnomah county circuit court, although the court did not make a decision, but overruled a Portland school

District Demurrer

The Medford board noted that there appears to be a difference of opinion among the legal profession as to the legal responsibility of school districts to provide textbooks

to private and parochial schools in view of the appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. It is on this basis that the board

will seek legal advice. In other action, the board expressed an agreement with suggestions and recommendations

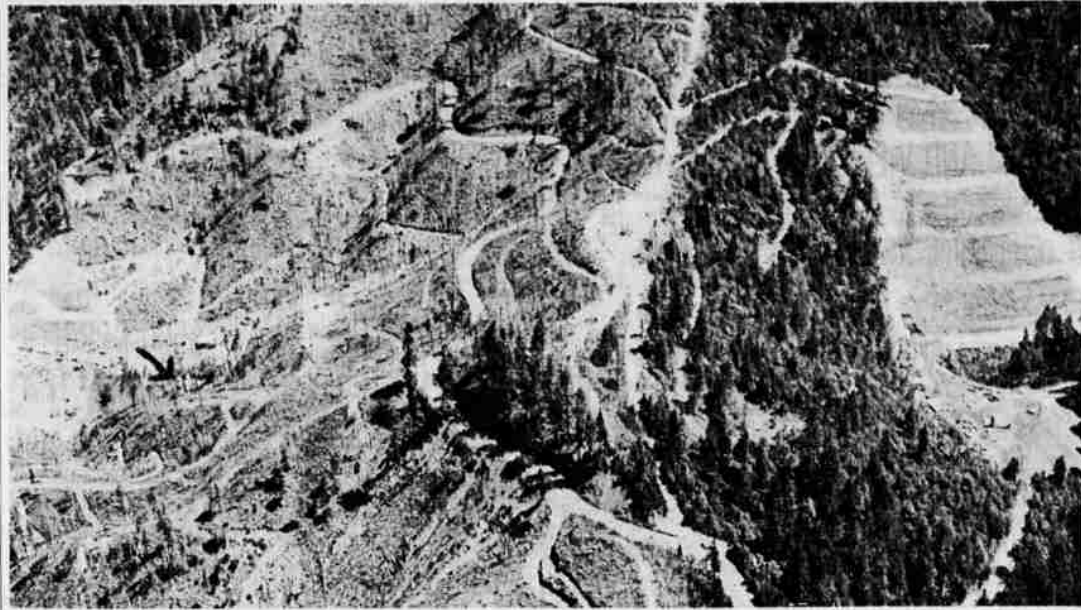
of the Oregon School Business Officials' association regarding a proposal to make county assessors local budget law enforcement officers.

The local budget law advisory committee of the state legislative interim committee on local government has suggested that the county assessor be named the local budget law enforcement officer.

The board also authorized the administration office at 500 Monroe st., Medford, to close Saturday mornings. This is common practice in other districts throughout the state.

Dr. Mayfield noted that by closing the office to the public on Saturday mornings it would give administrators "a chance to get a lot of work done."
