

# Eugene, Tri-City Clash Tonight In NWL Encounter at White City

Frank Linzy for Eugene and either Lee Featherstone or Aubrey Gatewood for Tri-City. Those are the probable pitchers for tonight when the Emeralds and Braves contend in Class B professional baseball at Memorial field, White City.

The 8 p.m. engagement will be a regular Northwest league game. Eugene and Tri-City come to the Rogue Valley after twinbill sweeps on Sunday. The Emeralds won Saturday 17 to 1 and 9 to 7 and the Braves licked Salem 9 to 1 and 7 to 0.

Victories by the Braves from Pasco, Wash., brought them back into a tie with Salem's Dodgers for the league leadership after losses Friday and Saturday to the Dodger nine. Eugene now is in fifth place in the loop 4 1/2 games back of the league leaders.

Linzy has a 7-8 season record for the Emeralds. His earned run average is 3.76. He also serves as a pinch-hitter. Linzy came to the Eugene crew after starting the season with Springfield in the Class A Eastern league. He is in his third year of pro ball. In 1960 he was with Salem in the Appalachian League. Last year he played for Quincy in the Midwest circuit.

Featherstone, a 6-5, right-

hander, aims to halt a six-game loss streak. He is 11-12 with a 4.21 ERA. The chucker is the property of the Chicago White Sox. This is his second year in pro ball. He was on the Sox roster for spring training this year.

Gatewood, 1-2, is just down from Hawaii of the Pacific coast league.

Both teams have a player who is on a hitting streak. For Tri-City it is Chico Telleria, who hit his eighth homer of the season and drove

in seven runs in the Sunday doubleheader. He has hit safely in six straight games and in 12 of the last 13. His batting average for the past six tussles is .636 on 14 of 22. With this rampage Telleria has boosted his batting average 14 points to .335. He has 84 runs batted in this year. Telleria is a farm hand of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Dick Dietz, catcher-outfielder, who signed with the San Francisco Giants for a big bonus, is the current blaster for the Emeralds. He has five

home runs, a double and a triple in five games.

Eugene has had an unimpressive season but Dick Strife, sports editor of the Eugene Register-Guard, declared this morning that the Emerald infield now is the best ever in the history of the ball club. He reported that the club lacks strength in the outfield and in overall pitching.

Bolestered Bill Dixon and Don McGillicuddy, from the Springfield club, are recent acquisitions bolstering the outfield. Dixon, of course, has contributed to the strength of the infield. He alternates between the inner and outer pastures and was at first base when the Emeralds played Salem here earlier this month.

Eugene is a San Francisco Giant farm club through working agreement. Tri-City draws its talent through a number of major league connections.

Tonight's game at the veterans domiciliary will be the last of three to be played by Eugene in the Rogue Valley. Medford Lions club is sponsor and will apply its share of the proceeds to its sight and blind fund.

### Lemay Has No-No Game for Tacoma

Richard Paul Lemay, lanky southpaw with the Tacoma Giants, gave himself an early birthday present Sunday night and it was just what every pitcher wants - a no-hitter.

Lemay, who celebrates his 24th birthday Tuesday, shut the door on the Vancouver Mounties, 4-0, in the seven-inning nightcap of a Pacific League doubleheader.

Vancouver won the opener, 5-4, while in other games the Portland Beavers defeated Salt Lake City, 5-1 and 6-5. Seattle won its seventh straight and tenth in a row from Spokane, 4-3, and Hawaii defeated San Diego, 6-4, as Dick Egan notched his 16th victory.

Lemay started on his pitching gem in not too grand a fashion. He walked Al Moran, the first man he faced.

But Moran was erased when Ray Looney lined to first baseman Dick Gernert for an unassisted double play and Lemay was on his way.

The only other trouble he had was in the seventh inning

when the last batter, Jay Ward, lined a shot down the left field line which barely turned foul. Ward then popped up to end the game.

Lemay's no-hitter was the second of the season and gave him his eighth victory of the year.

### Art Pollard Nabs Races

Art Pollard, Medford auto racer, will aim for his ninth straight main event victory over the Labor day holidays in competition at Victoria, B.C. Pollard scored sixth, seventh and eighth victories over last week end in modified sportsman races at Boise, Ida., and Jantzen Beach, Portland.

At Boise in the Western States championship, Pollard won the two-day overall points title. On Friday he took the trophy dash, was third in his heat and won the 50-lap main. He was victor in the Saturday 75-lap main after placing second in the trophy run and winning his heat. He collected a \$750 purse.

At Jantzen on Sunday Pollard came home ahead in a 50-lap main. He was second in the trophy sprint and third in the heat chase.

Pollard recently captured a \$2,000 purse as Gold Cup winner at Edmonton, Alta.

### Mexicans Take Doubles Title

Chestnut Hill, Mass. - (UPI) - A pair of bouncy Mexicans who quit "only when they call game, set and match" now are full fledged members of the growing heat-the-United States club.

Rafael Osuna and Antonio Palafox, the jumping beans who earlier this month handed the United States its most humiliating licking in the history of Davis Cup play, added the National Doubles tennis championship to their growing string Sunday.

To do it, the Mexicans reversed the outcome of last year's tournament and beat the nation's top doubles players, Chuck McKinley and Denny Ralston, 6-4, 10-12, 1-6, 9-7, 6-3.

Darlene Hard the 26-year-old Long Beach, Calif. girl and acknowledged queen of women's tennis, collected her fifth straight crown in the U-16 co-feature. Miss Hard and Maria Bueno of Brazil repeated the championship they won in 1960 in a 4-6, 6-3, 6-2, victory over Californians Karen Hantze Susman and Billie Jean Moffitt.

Eugene made its move on an attack which turned out 26 hits and 26 runs. Seven of those runs were driven in by Dick Deitz, who had a grand slam homer, triple and double.

Lewiston got its victory on Gus Enriquez' bases-loaded single in the bottom of the seventh, while Yakima bounced back in the nightcap to win on Jerry Glynn's sixth-inning pitch.
