"He was the best man I ever knew," said the globe-trotting evangelist who plans to attend funeral services for his father at Calvary Memorial Church here today.

Johnson Mobbed on Meet-the-People Stroll in Turkey

Istanbul, Turkey — (UPI) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson took another informal meet-the-people stroll today, this time in the steaming and teeming fabled bazaar of Istanbul.

He was mobbed as he wound his way through the twisting alleys and had gifts — cumquat-sized prayer beads and a bottle of inexpensive cologne — thrust into his hands.

Orderly Walk
The crowds pressing in on him at the covered market recalled a similar scene in Tehran but, from all appearances, this was a more orderly walk today as he continued his good will tour of the Mideast.

Dressed in a black linen suit, Johnson stopped at several stalls selling bedspreads and pillows and at others selling yarn and Turkish slippers. The vice president looked at some yarn, but did not buy, telling the beaming

proprietress "You sure have an attractive place."

Johnson stopped every few steps to shake hands with smiling Turks and when he approached a boy with a budding beard and open-neck white shirt, he was brought up short when the youth said "How are you, Mr. Johnson?" in faltering English.

Johnson told his interpreter to ask the boy's age but the youth answered without waiting for the translation, "I am 18 years old."

Johnson drew the loudest cheers of his bazaar visit when he told his interpreter to "tell him I think his country is on the verge of a new era. It will be up to young people like these to make the country advance."

Six Reindicted By Grand Jury On Fraud Charge

Tacoma — (UPI) — A federal grand jury Monday reindicted six men on fraud charges involving bankruptcy laws and land transactions.

U.S. Attorney John S. O'neal said Tuesday a similar indictment against the six had been dismissed last April on one count of conspiracy which now has been changed to two conspiracy counts.

The men are Anthony Fernandez, Kelsey Raymond, T. Duall, Longview; Carl G. Pratt and Reuben G. Lenseke, both of Portland, Ore.; Joseph P. Delay, Spokane, and Burl E. Dalgleish, Utah.

They are charged with violating federal bankruptcy laws in connection with timber and land transactions. All except Lenseke also are charged with conspiracy to violate federal laws on interstate transportation of money obtained by fraud.

The sums allegedly involved in the fraudulent transactions total about \$156,000. One count concerns transporting William B. Belcher of Days Creek, Ore., across state lines in connection with an alleged fraudulent action involving \$40,000. Another charges fraudulent acquisition of a \$25,000 certified check from a Trail, B.C. bank.

The charge of conspiring to violate the bankruptcy laws by concealing assets involves a \$538,000 bankruptcy judgment obtained against Fernandez in 1958.

San Jose Doctor Jailed, Charged With Wife Torture

San Jose, Calif. — (UPI) — A San Jose doctor was arrested today on charges he used acid to torture his pretty blonde model wife of five weeks.

Police answered the call of Dr. Geza de Kaplany early today and found Mrs. Hajna de Kaplany, 25, bound nude on the bedroom floor of their swank westside apartment. She was in great pain and crying hysterically.

Her hands and feet had been tied with white electrical cord and on a bedside table police found an attache case with bottles of sulphuric, nitric and hydrochloric acid and surgical equipment such as gloves, gauze, tape and washcloths.

The victim was taken to the hospital with third degree burns of the face and torso.

Police said Mrs. De Kaplany had been a San Francisco fashion model before her marriage and that she had been offered a job last week which her husband did not want her to take.

Doctors at the hospital said that it was almost certain that the acid would leave permanent scars.

Firms Reminded Of Service Act

With the impending release of reservists and National Guardsmen called to active duty during the Berlin crisis, Elmer W. Donahoe, Jackson County service officer, reminded employers and labor organizations of the reemployment provisions of the Universal Military Training and Service act.

Persons who left their jobs to serve the country during the emergency are entitled under the law to be restored to their former positions without loss of seniority, status, or rate of pay, according to the bureau of veterans reemployment rights, U.S. department of labor.

The act gives veterans protection of their civilian job rights for up to four years of military service. Donahoe noted. Because many had already served four years during the Korean conflict, the Act was amended last October to protect the rights of reservists and Guardsmen recalled to duty in the recent military buildup.

Under the amendment, those re-entering the military after Aug. 1, 1961, will not have their prior service counted in the four-year period.

The bureau's "Field Letter No. 20" has the full text of the Reemployment Act, explaining the 1961 changes in question-and-answer form. Donahoe noted. Copies of the Field Letter and additional information can be obtained by employers and reservists by writing to the Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights, 410 U.S. Court House, Seattle 4, Wash.

Assistance on reemployment problems also may be obtained locally in Oregon through local offices of the state employment service, county veterans' service officers, or the department of veterans affairs.

Student Loan Fund Approved for OSU

Corvallis — A National Defense Student Loan Fund grant of \$250,000 has been approved for Oregon State University by the U.S. office of education, according to Milosh Popovich, dean of administration.

Any full-time student with a 2.75 or B minus average is eligible to apply for these loans. High school seniors may make application for a loan to be used during their freshman year in college providing they have a B plus high school grade average.

Students may apply for loans up to \$1,000 for the school year, but they must have a definite need for the money for educational purposes. When applying for a loan, students complete a budget showing their anticipated financial needs.

Has One Year
The borrower has at least one year after he leaves college before any repayment of the loan is due. He may take up to ten years to repay the loan. If the borrower returns to college, enters military service or joins the Peace Corps, the repayment schedule may be interrupted until he finishes.

Interest on NDEA loans is charged at the rate of 3 percent a year, starting one year after the student leaves college. If the borrower interrupts the repayment schedule for one of the approved reasons, no interest is charged during that period.

As an added benefit for students planning to enter the teaching field, they pay only 50 per cent of the principal of the NDEA loan plus interest at the rate of 3 per cent. This benefit applies to full-time teachers in public elementary or secondary schools.

The National Defense Student Loan funds are administered by OSU through the Student Loan office. J. Frank Jonasson is the loan officer. After a student's application has been received, it is reviewed by a committee of faculty persons who actually
