The "baby" of this United States Golf Association USGA tournament at the Country Club of Rochester is 17-year-old Ann Baker of Maryville, Tenn. The senior member of the eight-player cast is Mrs. Harry Nevill, 41, of Coopers-town, N.Y.

The other surviving candidates for Mrs. Decker's crown are Mrs. Decker, Joanne Gunderson, 23, Kirkland, Wash.; Phyllis Preuss, 23, Pompano Beach, Fla.; Barbara Williams, 24, Richmond, Calif.; Marcia McLachlan, 21, Danbury, Conn.; and Patricia Hahn, 22, Wilmington, Del.

best running backs in the American Football league and a rushing defense to match any rival's ground attack, but they still seem only a distant title threat.

Inconsistent quarter back, a questionable interior offensive line and a pass-leaking secondary more than offset the Texans' strong points.

Several of the rookies — like defensive end Bill Hull, offensive end Bill Miller, defensive halfbacks Curtis McClinton and Jim Saxton, and offensive ends Tom Brooker and Bill Miller — appear to be of pro caliber and destined to be starters on either offensive or defensive units.

Injuries, which plagued the

club a year ago, are already making themselves felt in a costly manner. In last week's Denver game, Dave Webster, one of the better safety men in the league suffered a broken leg which will just about ruin him for the season.

Fullback Jack Spikes, who missed eight games last year due to injury, and All-League halfback Abner Haynes, who sat out three contests have also been frequent visitors to the training room.

Losses Not Too Serious

But, their loss this year shouldn't hurt as much as a year ago. Because McClinton boasts enough power to fill in for Spikes while still being

speedy enough to play halfback. Fleet Frank Jackson is nearly as adept as Haynes, as he proved last year as a rookie fill-in for the injured star.

Johnny Robinson, a running — receiving star in his own right at the other halfback for two seasons, has been shifted to defense to make room for the new talent. And, he is sorely needed in the new job.

Saxton will be used as either a flanker or on defense to take advantage of his quick reactions and speed. He's had trouble learning to catch passes, but Stram isn't too worried about that.

That brings the offensive

backfield up to the quarterback, where Cotton Davidson has withstood challenges for two seasons despite his erratic performances. Stram has three other quarterbacks in camp — Arizona's Eddie Wilson, National Football league veteran Len Dawson and Baylor's Bobby Ply.

Haynes and Jackson are prime passing targets as flankers, while Stram also has one of the league's top ends in Chris Burford with rookie Miller to back him. Fred Arbamas, who missed his rookie year because of injuries, has won the tight end spot ahead of Brooker.

Offensive tackles are ade-

quate with Jerry Cornelison, Jim Tyrer and Charley Davidson returning.

But, that's where the adequacy ends. Jon Gilliam is looking better at center, but needs help that isn't in sight. Al Reynolds, John Cadwell and Marvin Terrell return at the guards, but neither Terrell or Cadwell played much a year ago. End Curt Merz has been shifted to that position in desperation.

On defense, the picture is much different. Hull has developed into a terrific running mate at end with experienced Mel Branch. Jerry Mays and Paul Rochester stand out at

the tackles, and if there is a better corps of linebackers

around than Sherrill Headrick, E. J. Holub, Smokey Stover and Walt Corey, then Stram hasn't seen them.

Webster's departure depleted an already shaky secondary. Robinson is proving adequate to go along with returnees Dave Grayson and Duane Wood, and Auburn rookie Bobby Hunt may have the makings. But, Saxton or Ply may get much more work

than even Stram had anticipated. The acquisition of Durwood Pennington from Buffalo as a placekicker has taken some of the pressure off Spikes; Davidson still will be the No. 1 punter.

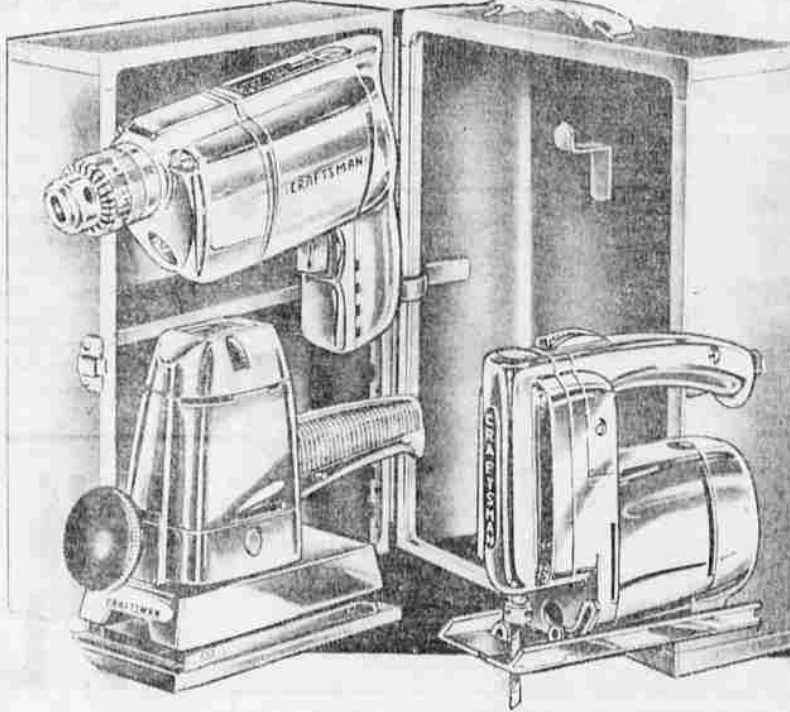

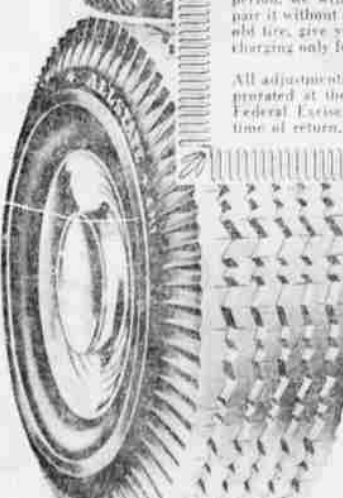

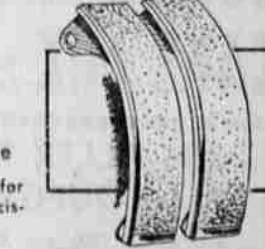
