Gardner To Leave For Paris Meeting Of Repairmen

Wilbur Gardner, Medford shoe repairman who has campaigned to have shoe materials labelled, will leave for Paris Wednesday to represent the shoe repair industry of the United States at the second International Congress of Shoe Repairers.

Gardner attended a similar congress last year in Germany. At the congress in France, Gardner will be one of four speakers from Germany, France, Great Britain and the United States.

"I also hope to get information on the world's largest trade school in Germany," Gardner said. "My intention is

to contact further the U.S. Department of Labor so a similar school can be built in the United States."

Prepare for Congress
Gardner also will have the responsibility in Paris of preparing for the fourth world congress to be held in the United States in 1964.

While in Europe he plans to visit Alba, Italy, Rome and Madrid, Spain. Then he will return to Paris, to New York, Chicago and Portland, and home.

Gardner will carry greetings, also, from Gov. Mark Hatfield, Sen. Maurine Neuberger (D-Ore.), Sen. Wayne Morse, (D-Ore.), Medford Mayor

or John Snider, the Medford Chamber of Commerce, the Shoe Service Institute of Chicago, Master Shoe Builders of Boston, United Shoe Servicemen of America-Pittsburgh, from two large leather tanners and from many state organizations.

The congress will be held in connection with the world's largest leather fair, the Semaine de Cuir in Paris.

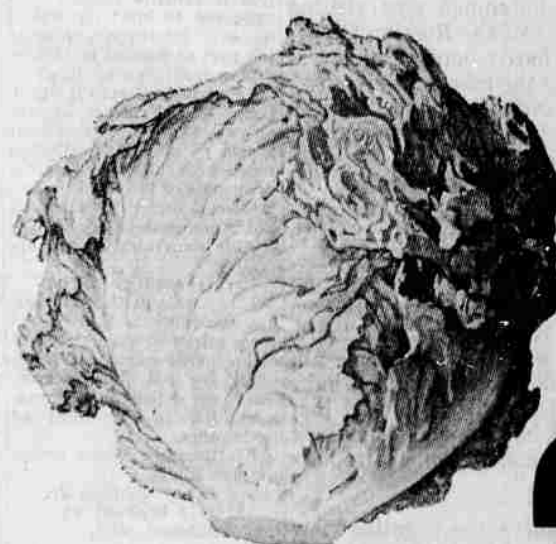

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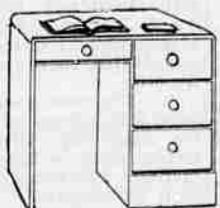

Russian Religious Leaders Sentenced

Moscow—(UPI)—Four leaders of a pentecostal religious group in the Soviet republic of Georgia have been sentenced to prison for prohibiting members of their sect from joining the Soviet army or listening to the radio.

The newspaper Dawn of the East, reporting the jailings, said three of the leaders were sentenced to four years in prison and the fourth received a five-year term for their "criminal activities."

REDS TRIGGER BLAST

Washington—(UPI)—Russia set off another atmospheric nuclear blast Sunday at its Novaya Zemlya testing grounds. The U.S. Atomic Energy commission said it was in the intermediate yield range, or between 20,000 and one million tons of TNT.

BUILDINGS BURN

Timber, Ore.—(UPI)—Fire destroyed a railroad depot, a restaurant, a vacant barber shop and three apartments Sunday in this small town in the Oregon Coast range. Damage was estimated at more than \$20,000.
