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Covered Bridge In Photo Identified As McKee Bridge

 Applegate Valley—The Oregon State highway commission photo of the covered bridge appearing in August 28 issue of the Mail Tribune was recognized by local people as McKee bridge across Big Applegate seven miles south of Ruch.

The bridge has not been in use since a cement bridge was built a quarter mile up stream four years ago, but it is preserved for its scenic value.

The photo also was identified by Wesley Hartman of Jacksonville of the Hartman Bros. county bridge builders. The bridge construction was contracted in 1917 to the late Jason Hartman, father of Wesley and Lyal Hartman. This was Wesley Hartman's first job on his father's crew, he said.

The river crossing was adjoined on the south east side by the Adelbert (Deb) McKee ranch, and through community association became known through the years as McKee bridge.

In the early 1900's the McKee place, now a part of the Dave Winingham farm, served as a stage station and overnight stop for travelers to Blue Ledge mine and other places in Upper Applegate area.

Daughters of Adelbert McKee living in Jacksonville are

Mrs. Verna Culy, Mrs. Albert Hackert, and Mrs. O. Z. Parker. Another daughter, Mrs. Henry Calloway, resides at Pendleton. Nephews living in Medford are Ernest and Floyd McKee, and nieces living here are Mrs. John Byrne and Mrs. Roland Smith.

The swimming hole, Forest Service park story operated by Mr. and Mrs. Willard Wilson, and gem shop owned by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Payne, constitute the present community surrounding the bridge, in addition to homes and farms.

According to Hartman five covered bridges remain in Jackson county, four of which are in use, including one across Yankee creek and another across Antelope creek in the Eagle Point area. A third one crosses Louse creek, tributary of Little Butte creek, which serves one family. The other structure in use is the Minthorn bridge across Evans creek.

By public demand another bridge across Evans creek at Wimer is being extensively repaired for its scenic and historic value, but is not in use. All of these bridges have been built by the Hartmans.

Governor Visits Illinois Valley Sawmill, GOP Club

Illinois Valley — Governor Mark O. Hatfield paid a visit to the people of Illinois Valley last Thursday.

He was accompanied by Bill Newell and Walter Holm of Grants Pass. Holm is acting as representative for the Josephine County Campaign Relations committee.

The group also included county commissioners Louis Ringette and Don McGregor.

The governor was greeted by Phayo Pellerie on behalf of the Illinois Valley Republican club. The party met at the Rough and Ready sawmill and was welcomed by the owner, Lew Krauss.

The governor was able to have an informal chat with the workers during their lunch hour. Hatfield gave a brief talk on lumber industry problems including competition

from other countries, principally Canada.

The group made an impromptu visit to the National Forest aerial project located on hiway 199. Director James Allen and Foreman Al Boucher showed the governor the smokejumper's set-up from the mess quarters. The party met all the personnel and viewed the parachute loft.

Arriving at the American Legion Hall in Cave Junction at noon the governor was included in a potluck luncheon, with a large crowd gathered to greet him.

Representative Sid Bazett was also present for the luncheon. Previous to the luncheon princesses of the Labor Day Jubilee royal court greeted Governor Hatfield and talked with him.

Saturday will find Dr. Rafferty at a breakfast at the home of Mrs. Olga Owsley in Gazelle, one of the county's loveliest homes, with the public welcome. It will be a silver breakfast from 9 to 11 a.m. She is planning on 250-300 persons. The Owsley home may be found by going out the old road to Big Springs which is east of Gazelle.

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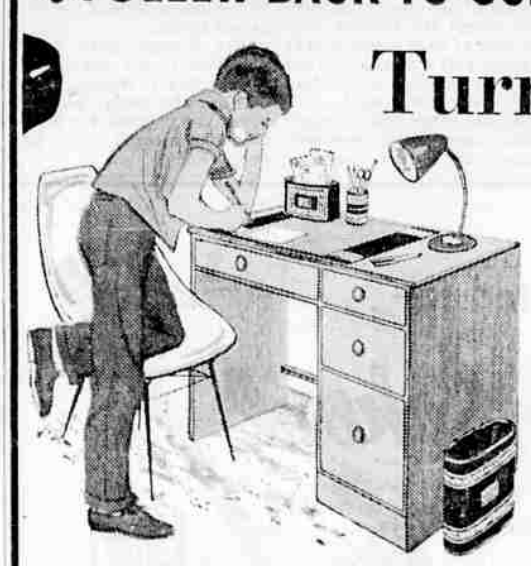
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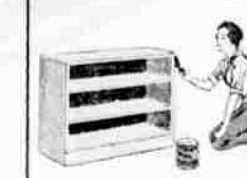
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
