

Thirteen States Hold Primaries This Month

Washington—Thirteen more states nominate candidates for Congress and state offices this month in a mop-up round of party primaries. It will be Ted vs. Ed in the Massachusetts Democratic primary Sept. 16 and a scramble among former associates of the late Sen. Styles Bridges for Republican nominations in New Hampshire Sept. 11.

For the first time in years, Georgia Democrats will nominate candidates Sept. 12 without using the county unit system which gave the rural voter a magnified voice in state politics.

When the September primaries are over, all of the states except Hawaii will have their nominees chosen for the elections Nov. 6. Hawaii holds its primaries Oct. 8.

The Massachusetts Senatorial primaries will overshadow all other nominating contests for national attention. Competing for the Democratic nomination will be Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy, brother of the President and winner of a state convention endorsement, and State Atty. Gen. Edward McCormack, nephew of Speaker John W. McCormack of the House of Representatives.

Republican Candidates
Candidates for the Republican Senatorial nomination are George Cabot Lodge, son of former United Nations Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, and Rep. Laurence Curtis.

Also in Massachusetts, Gov.

John A. Volpe, a Republican, is unopposed for renomination. Endicott Peabody, Harvard's last All-American football player, and Clement A. Riley, state motor vehicle registrar, are contesting for the Democratic nomination for governor. In 12 Congressional districts, all incumbents have primary opponents except Reps. John W. McCormack and Harold D. Donohue, both Democrats.

Nevada held the first of the September primaries Tuesday. Gov. Grant Sawyer, Sen. Alan Bible and Rep. Walter Baring all had competition in their bids for Democratic renominations but were nominated. The GOP also had contests for the nominations for governor and senator but J. Carlton Adair was unopposed for the nomination to oppose Baring for Nevada's single House seat. The Republican gubernatorial nomination was won by Las Vegas Mayor Oran Grayson.

New York Primary
New York holds its primaries today to nominate candidates for the House and elect delegates for mid-September state conventions, which nominate candidates for statewide elections. The GOP convention will renominate Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Sen. Jacob K. Javits.

There will be primaries Sept. 11 in nine states—Arizona, Colorado, Minnesota, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin. Bridges' death is largely responsible for a large field of Republican candidates seeking nominations in New Hampshire. His widow, Doloris, is a candidate for his four-year unexpired term against Sen. Maurice J. Murphy, now serving by appointment. Both New Hampshire Congressmen, Reps. Perkins Bass and Chester E. Merrow, also are seeking the same nomination.

Five GOP Candidates

Chester M. Wiggin Jr., Louis C. Wyman and George Gilman, all alumni of Bridges' senate office, are in the field of five GOP candidates for Merrow's seat. Bert Teague, another former Bridges aide, is one of six GOP candidates for Bass' seat.

Gov. Wesley Powell, once Bridges' administrative assistant, is seeking renomination for a third term. One of his two GOP challengers is John Pillsbury, a former Bridges aide.

Sen. Norris Cotton has only one opponent, Norman Le Page, in his quest for Republican renomination for a regular six-year term. In the Democratic primary, Alfred Catalfo Jr. is unopposed for the nomination for Cotton's seat and Thomas J. McIntyre is unopposed for the nomination for the Bridges vacancy.

Here is a rundown on the Sept. 11 primaries in other states:
Arizona—Gov. Paul Fannin and Rep. John J. Rhodes are unopposed for renomination in the Democratic primary. Sen. Carl Hayden, who has served in Congress since 1912, has one opponent; Stephen Shadegg and Evan Mecham are seeking the Republican Senatorial nomination. The Democrats have three candidates and the Republicans two for nominations in the new third congressional district allotted to Arizona after the 1960 census.
Colorado Primary
Colorado—Gov. Stephen L. McNichols and Sen. John A. Carroll are unopposed for renomination in the Democratic primary, and Rep. Peter H. Dominick is unopposed for the GOP Senatorial nomination. Both parties have contests for the nominations for Dominick's House seat but the other incumbents, Democratic Reps. Byron Rogers and Wayne L. Aspinall and GOP Rep. J. Edgar Chenoweth, are unopposed.
Minnesota—Gov. Elmer L. Anderson is unopposed for renomination in the Republican primary; Lt. Gov. Karl Rolvaag is seeking the Democratic nomination for governor. There is no Senate seat at stake. The biggest contest is between Rep. H. Carl Andersen, who was involved in the investigation of the Billie Sol Estes case, and State Rep. Robert Odgaard for a Congressional nomination. Other incumbent Congressmen are unopposed or have only token competition.
Rhode Island—Gov. John A. Notte Jr. is seeking renomination in a Democratic primary contest against Mayor Kevin K. Coleman of Woonsocket and Francis A. Manzi. The GOP also has three candidates for governor including State House Minority Leader John H. Chafee, who has the GOP state committee endorsement. No Senate seat is at stake. Rep. John E. Fogarty is unopposed for Democratic renomination but Rep. Ferdinand J. St. Germain has one challenger.

Appraisal Short Course Slated at Corvallis Campus

Corvallis—The seventh annual Appraisal Short Course sponsored by the state tax commission and Oregon State university for county and private appraisers of the state has been scheduled Sept. 10 to 14 on the OSU campus.

The short course provides a continuous training program for county appraisers and is designed to help bring about greater uniformity in valuation of real property across the state.

Last year's course drew a record group of 208 appraisers from 34 of the state's 36 counties and a group of approximately the same size is expected this year.

Courses Offered
Intermediate and advanced courses of study are being offered this year. The intermediate course has been planned to provide basic appraisal information for beginning or less experienced appraisers and the advanced course will provide experienced appraisers with instruction covering mass appraisal techniques employed by the state tax commission's valuation division. Instructors will include leaders of the state tax commission and its valuation division, selected county and private appraisers, and Oregon State university faculty members. Three speakers from the American Appraisal company, Milwaukee, Wis., are included.

Demonstration appraisals of a residence, a farm, and a commercial property will be included in the intermediate course of study. Advanced students will make appraisals of motel and farm properties.

Dr. Grant E. Blanch, professor of agricultural economics at Oregon State university, is short course director. Representatives of the Oregon County Assessors association help develop the program each year.

Weight Standard Unopposed at Meet
Salem—No opposition to a proposed regulation of butter and oleomargarine package weights was voiced Wednesday at a State Department of Agriculture hearing.

The regulation would limit retail sale of butter, margarine and oleomargarine to one-quarter pound, one-half pound, one pound and multiples of one pound. The state of Washington has a similar rule.

The Agriculture Department proposed the regulation after a brand of "whipped" corn oil margarine appeared in the Portland market in a 12-ounce package that is the same size as the regular 16-ounce package.

Utah—Sen. Wallace F. Bennett is opposed by Former Gov. J. Bracken Lee, now Mayor of Salt Lake City, for the Republican Senatorial nomination. Rep. David S. King, son of the late Sen. William H. King, is seeking the Democratic Senatorial nomination. The governorship is not at stake. Democratic Rep. M. Blaine Peterson is unopposed for renomination. Both parties have two-man contests for the nominations for King's House seat, and two Republicans are seeking

the nomination to oppose

Peterson.
Washington—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, heavily favored to win a fourth term this year, has one Democratic primary opponent, and two Republicans are seeking the Senate nomination to oppose him. The governorship is not at stake. Of the state's seven incumbent House members, only Reps. Walt Horan, (R.), and Don Magnuson, (D.), have primary competition.

Seeks Fifth Term
Wisconsin—Sen. Alexander Wiley is seeking renomination

for a fifth term in the GOP

primary against one opponent. Gov. Gaylord Nelson is unopposed for the Democratic Senatorial nomination. There are three candidates in the Republican gubernatorial primary but John W. Reynolds is unopposed on the Democratic side. Of the state's 10 incumbent House members, only Democratic Rep. Clement J. Zablocki and GOP Reps. William K. Van Pelt and Alvin E. O'Konski have primary opponents.

In the Georgia Democratic primary Sept. 12, Former Gov. Marvin Griffin and State Sen. Carl Sanders are regarded as the leading contenders in a field of five seeking the Democratic nomination for governor in that Democratic state. Sen. Herman Talmadge has one opponent in his bid for renomination.

Seven incumbent Georgia

Congressmen are unopposed. Rep. James C. Davis faces three opponents and Rep. Carl Vinson has one. There are six candidates for the nomination in the Eighth District, where Rep. Iris Blich is retiring.

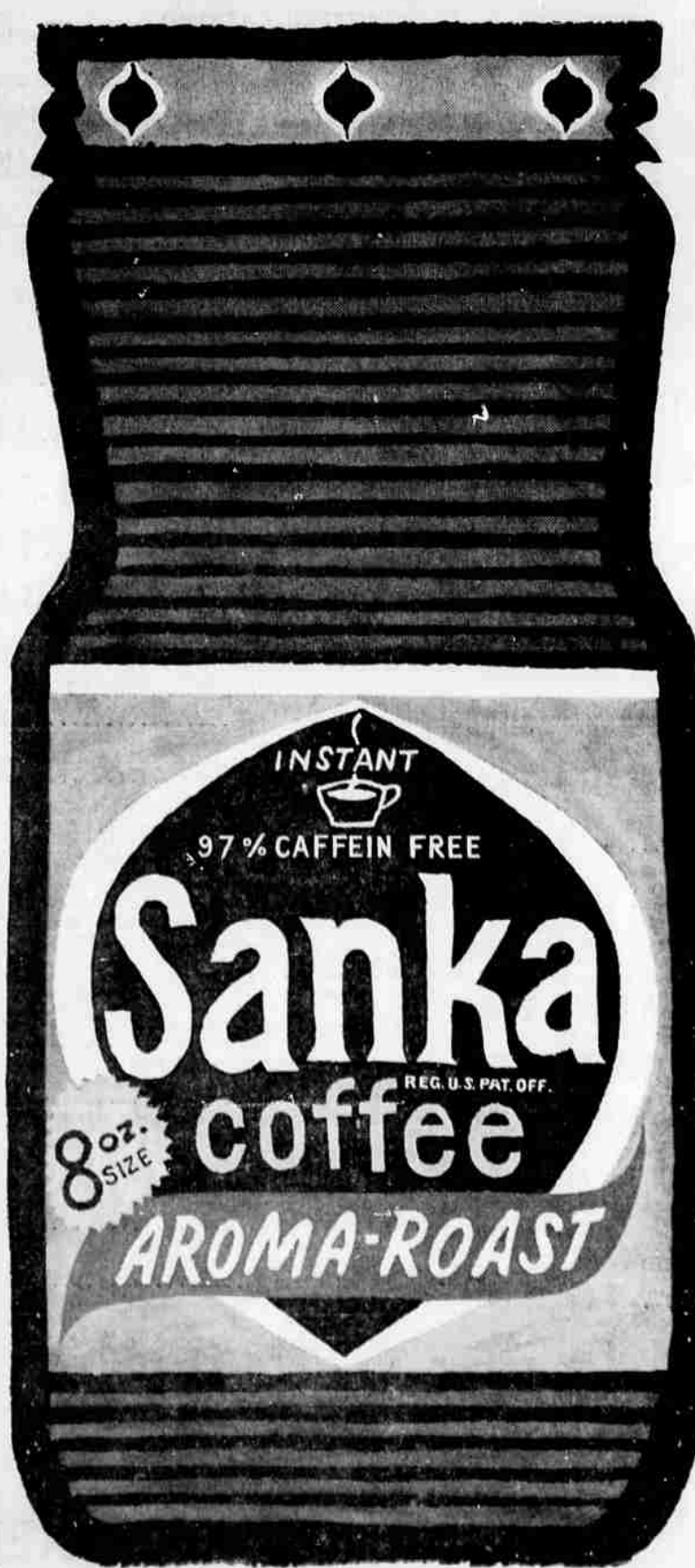
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
