New York - (UPI) - This column should be titled the "before" and "after" of Jean Leslie Allen, 17, who still likes peanut butter sandwiches although her reign as America's Junior Miss has begun.

Gay Pauley accustomed her to file mignon. Or, subtitle the column, if you please, one of advice to parents.

Yes, encourage your daughter to compete in legitimate contests in which beauty, personality and talent are the criteria by which she will be judged.

She stands to gain, as Jean did, a scholarship toward a full college education, early development of independence, judgment and responsibility, increased poise in meeting people, and further, the pure joy of being a celebrity during her reign.

Caution, however, don't let your daughter compete for the sake of the crown only. It might go to her head.

Only Temporary And do instill in her the fact that if she does win the finals in one of the numerous contests, she is queen bee only temporarily. Next year someone replaces her and she gives up the spotlight to return to the everyday.

I'm talking about specifically about Miss Allen, a blue-eyed brunette with a beauty reminiscent of an early Hedy Lamarr, because I was one of the five judges who selected her America's Junior Miss from 51 finalists last March in Mobile, Ala.

And, just as judges who this week will select a new Miss America at Atlantic City, N. J., will follow the course of the winner, I wanted to see what changes a title might create in a young lady.

Did she, a straight "A" student during high school, still plan to teach as she had announced when she entered the Miss Rhode Island contest leading up to the national one?

"The crown went on my head, not to it," said Miss Allen during a visit to New York.

New York was one of the last stop on a tour that began June 11, three days after high school graduation, and has taken her some 30,000 air miles around the nation.

Has the title changed her outlook?

"Actually," she said, "I feel the same... I'm the same person. But I've learned a lot and I wouldn't trade this summer for anything. I've learned how to meet people, I'm not scared any more when I stand up in front of an audience. It's the first time I've been semi-independent and really away from home. But when I give up the crown I won't mind joining the 'has-beens' again."

"There's college ahead. And it will be fun to be able to reach in a cupboard at home in the next few days and haul out peanut butter when I want it. On the tour, it's not been peanut butter. It's been filet mignon. And hotel suites and jet flights and convertibles to drive you in from the airport."

This is not to say most husbands have acquired the wisdom to understand that mink is no luxury. But if husbands aren't quite that easy-going, the study still indicates they would rather buy something for the wife and children than for themselves.

Not so the ladies! Most are ready, the study indicates, to cut out their husbands' beer and cigar money when the budget runs low. Husbands' bowling and spending for home workshops also come under the heading of extravaganzas in most wives' books.

More evidence that men are more generous: most of the husbands studied wanted more labor-saving household appliances for their wives, but the women saw little need for such husband-savers as power lawn mowers.

Spiced Eggs Are Good Breakfast

As autumn approaches, the days grow cooler, and the children return to school. Cooler weather and more rigid schedules demand hearty and planned breakfasts.

Individual ramekins of eggs nestled in a ring of bacon strips, and baked with a topping of grated Parmesan cheese and spiced butter, are a sunny-side-up way to begin a busy day. A liquid seasoning such as Tabasco sauce may be used.

To serve three, the home-maker will need six to nine strips of bacon, six eggs, three tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese, one tablespoon melted butter, and ½ teaspoon liquid spice.

The bacon should be cooked until partially done but not crisp. Two or three strips are then placed in each ramekin or individual baking dish.

The cook should carefully break two eggs into each dish. Sprinkle with grated cheese, and pour combined melted butter and spice over the eggs.

They should then be baked at 350 degrees for about 15 minutes, or until the eggs are set.



September is better breakfast month, and one breakfast which is unusual and flavorful is baked spiced eggs. Served with toast, these eggs encircled by bacon strips supply needed food value for the busy winter days ahead.

Use Imagination In Hanging Of Family Portraits

Chicago - (UPI) - Hang the family - in portrait, of course. Portraits can be given imaginative uses in the home, reports a photographic supply company.

Eastman Kodak, in a house-to-house look at how portraits were being used, found:

One woman had arranged portraits of three generations of brides - her mother, herself and her three daughters - on a 20x30 sheet of blue, perforated cardboard. These were hung on the wall beside her dressing table.

She suspended the hardboard from a fleur-de-lis fixture of the type frequently used in the bathroom. Of varying sizes, the pictures were arranged in an informal pattern and identically framed in beige, accent color of the bedroom.

Another woman, working with all the same size pictures, four 8x10 portraits, had framed them identically and hung them in a checkerboard pattern on the closet door. She had matted the pictures with a small floral wall-paper used on three walls of the room.

In a colonial farmhouse with a fireplace in the bedroom, the wall over the mantel was hung with a massive photograph of the children in the family.

A New England woman of nautical leanings had used colored plastic tape to fashion a ship shape on the wall and hung small framed pictures from the crossbars.

A woman from Nebraska put photographs of varying size in a haphazard pattern on a folding screen. Some of the frames used were antiques - several from daguerotypes; others came from thrift shops and the five and dime store.

Several were painted the color of the rug and draperies. In many homes, family portraits were grouped with other wall decorations - antique mirrors, objects d'art and oil paintings and sketches.

Comfort and Glamour Must for Hotel, Motel

New York - (UPI) - The ever-growing numbers of travelers are changing the image of the average hotel and motel room for the better.

The inn-keeping industry no longer can afford to settle for flowered drapes, the dime store work of art over the bed, and the dim bulb in the floor lamp with its shade always askew.

The theme today is first, supreme comfort, then glamour, said William Pahlmann, San Antonio-born fellow of the American Institute of Decorators and boss of a design staff of 25 which has done numerous hotel and motel decorating plans.

"But not a home away from home... that's not what the traveling public wants," said Pahlmann. "This would bore them... what they want is something different from what they live with every day."

"My great gripe," said Pahlmann, world traveler through his work in interior design, "is to find that the new hotels going up in all parts of the world all copy Americana."

"The sterile rectangular structure of glass and concrete has taken over. Yet tourists aren't looking for this. They'd like to enjoy some of the atmosphere of the country they're visiting."

Pahlmann said his insistence on retaining some of the flavor of the surroundings was causing him problems with his latest project - decorating the 800 rooms of the new President hotel in Hong Kong, a privately financed project.

Oriental Touch

"I insist on some Oriental touches and the use of some fine antiques with the new," he said. "So cables have been flying back and forth for two weeks now, and I think I've got them convinced." He leaves soon to supervise the interior design of the hotel.

We asked what changes in hostelry interiors had been caused by the growing sophistication and growing numbers of travelers.

"Plenty," he said. "Today, the first class hotel either has a full-time interior designer on the staff or has an outside consultant. No longer does the resident housekeeper have the last word in what goes into a room."

"More attention is being paid to feminine tastes. Today's international tourists, by and large, are couples middle-aged or older."

Pahlmann listed some of the small but basic touches which he believes help create a pleasant setting - and also attract more return customers: "Dust ruffles on the bed, so that when the spread is removed the steel frame does not show; works of art scaled to the room size and chosen to fit the mood and color; a colorful spread on the bed, durable enough to take luggage dumped on it and people sitting on it; Tea tables 22 inches high,

taller than the standard cocktail table but more comfortable for room service dining than the carts wheeled in, in most hotels;

Cabinet basins in the bath with the mirrors lighted so that a man can shave without slashing his throat and a woman can apply her makeup and have room for a cosmetics kit without having it splashed from the basin; incandescent rather than fluorescent, which alters the color of the skin; a light somewhere in the shower area so that when the curtain is closed, the person in shower is not bathing in darkness;

Ample light for bedtime reading - "most hotels just don't," said Pahlmann, "and they also have a knack of putting the bed light where you have to get out of bed to turn it off."

Modernization of the luggage storage area so that it will hold today's two-and-four-suiters and the soft, lightweight dress and suit cases which unfold to hang.

Splashes of bold color rather than the beige or grey basic; wallpaper either in combination with paint or throughout a room; "big, not dinky mirrors, preferably framed";

And plenty of stationery in the desk with the Gideon Bible so you don't have to call the management for more paper when you write the folks back home.

"A hotel room should indicate that somebody cares," said Pahlmann.

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Restaurant and Hotel World Has 'Little UN'

United Press International New York - (UPI) - The restaurant and hotel world has its own United Nations, with headquarters in Zurich, Switzerland.

Instead of world politics, Ho.Re.Ca. discusses the shortage of well-trained cooks and other help, credit cards, music, the language barrier and anything else involved in running hotels, restaurants, cafes and catering businesses.

The abbreviated name stands for Union Internationale D'Organisations Nationales D'Hoteliers, Restaurateurs Et Cafetiers.

Because it deals only in mutual international problems, Ho.Re.Ca. is called a "little United Nations" by T. Edward Beale, president since 1955.

Beale was in the United States to address the annual convention of the international group's American member organization, the National Restaurant Association in Chicago. He is chairman and managing director of a British firm that operates a hotel, a restaurant chain and banqueting suites in London.

In an interview, Beale explained that banqueting suites are buildings designed for serving large catered parties, such as weddings, birthdays and business banquets.

Beale blames a shortage of good cooks on the low status they are accorded in much of the world.

"We must raise their status," he added. "In England we are doing this with training at the graduate school level."

"We have 120 colleges that teach cooking to men. Our Hotel and Catering Institute offers two degrees - one associate or junior members, and one for senior graduates."

An institute degree takes four years of college. Three years are spent in classroom and one year plus summer holidays, in food industry jobs.

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"We emphasize the cooking; we may guarantee a certain profit in operating a restaurant, but what counts is in the kitchen," he said.

"But we are miles behind you (the United States) in our costings - in food costs, portion control and other administrative details."

Beale said that the institute's student exchange program would like to enroll more Americans. Most exchange students currently come from Europe.

One European custom he would like to see Americans adopt is multi-lingual training for hotel and restaurant personnel.
