Transient Lodged in Jail After Accident

According to police, the accident occurred on Central ave. between Sixth and Main sts. about 1:18 a.m. Mortimore was charged with failure to leave information at the scene of an accident and failure to obtain an Oregon operator's license.

He was fined \$150 in municipal court this morning. Witnesses reported the accident to police and gave them a description of the car. According to police, Mortimore "did not think the accident was bad enough to be worth stopping for."

The two passengers in the car, George Wesley Barnes, a transient, and Ernest Glenn Dupuy, 520 North Front st., were lodged in jail on charges of vagrancy, late and unusual hours, and both were released without sentence after pleading guilty to the charges in municipal court this morning.

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Forest Fire Danger Extreme; People Asked to Use Care

People going into Rogue River National forest have been asked to be careful with fires. The fire danger is now extreme, and probably will remain extreme until the fall rains start, forest personnel have announced.

The weekly recreation report by districts of Rogue River National forest is: **Applegate district:** Personnel at Star Ranger station has expressed appreciation to forest users for being careful with fire during this past summer season, especially over the Labor Day week end.

Fire danger is now extreme, and will be until the fall rains. Forest users have been asked to continue to be careful.

All roads are open and are in good shape. The Sturgis Fork trail is still closed, but all other trails are open. None of the trails are closed to scooters, but mufflers are required.

McKee campground is now open seven days a week. There is no restriction on camping except that all campgrounds have a 14-day camping limit.

Fishing has been reported good on Elliott creek in California. No reports have been received on other streams.

Ashland district: Fall weather and a series of hunting seasons are expected to keep plenty of people in the woods on the Ashland district. Campgrounds will be open, and maintained until winter weather arrives.

September is often one of the good months of the year for camping, hiking and general "exploring." Personnel at the ranger station in Ash-

land (on the Plaza) will provide information regarding trails, roads, and places to go on the district.

The last two weeks have been the most dangerous fire weather of the summer so far. Fall warming fires easily become hot forest fires, district personnel noted.

Butte Falls district: The huckleberries have been heavily picked along the roads and are becoming scarce. Pickers are advised to get away from the roads for the best picking. The woods still are dry and visitors are asked to be extremely careful with fires.

Grouse are fairly plentiful around the upper end of the Black Bear road and along the Blue Rock road. Dove hunting is poor throughout the district.

The Blue Rock road is dusty and rocky, but passable. All other roads are in good condition. Motorists are cautioned to watch for heavy logging traffic week days on the Lodgepole, Innaha access, and the upper end of the Fish Lake roads.

All campgrounds are open. Improvement work is continuing on Whiskey Springs, Snowshoe, Fourbit, and Willow Prairie campgrounds.

Prospect district: Temperatures on the district are 85 to 90 degrees in the daytime and quite cool at night.

Fishing is slow during the heat of the day however, late flies and grasshoppers are producing good catches in the morning and evening.

Huckleberries are fully ripe and still plentiful in the high regions of the district.

Historical Group To Meet Saturday

Yreka — "Early Day Banking" will be the subject of a talk by Louis Wacker before the Siskiyou County Historical society at 2 p.m. Saturday at the county museum.

The society is planning a field trip in September. The specific Sunday date has not yet been announced, but the outing is planned for the latter part of the month.

The route will go up the Klamath river via Ager, over the old stage road to Klamath Hot Springs and over Topsey grade into Butte valley.

The return trip will be via Bray, past Sheep rock and the monument that marks the old Emigrant trail on Highway 97 and back to Yreka. Tom Bigelow will be in charge of the field trip, and all who can go are asked to let the society know so arrangements for transportation can be made.
