Table Rock—A business deal and transfer has just been completed here that will be of interest to residents of this area. Mr. and Mrs. John Thomas, lately of Oakland, Calif., have purchased the Table Rock Store and all operating equipment "lock stock and barrel." Mr. Thomas informs us that there will be no change in the manner of operation. We have met these people and feel sure that we of the community are going to like them. Our best wishes and hopes for a prosperous future are tendered.

One thing about this change that is not pleasant is the realization that we must part with our good friends and neighbors who have been such an asset to the community socially and in a business sense, operating a clean and wholesome store, where decent folk felt at home. The Wyatts have operated the Table Rock store for the past nine years. Before this it was operated by Mrs. Wyatt's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Davison. The store building was originally constructed by Fred Hauptman, as near as we can learn about 1910, and was located about 100 yards north of its present site on the corner, where the two roads connect and was moved for safety reasons. Mrs. Hauptman's mother, Mrs. Harry Wilcox and son, lived in the house now occupied by the Bert Pierce family. Mrs. Hauptman was a niece of Ella Wheeler Wilcox, the noted writer and poet, who visited here with relatives at the Wilcox home. The neighbor teen age girls were invited to meet her, which visit they all enjoyed, especially the palm readings where she told them of a bright future filled with love and happiness. In later years some said it didn't turn out as rosy as she said.

Capital Punishment

We have received quite a little criticism from readers of the Tablets who disagree with our stand on capital punishment. One reader has referred us to a few verses of scripture in the Old Testament showing that killing by being stoned to death was mandatory for several offenses, including adultery. Record 13,288 Visit Jacksonville Museum in August

Jacksonville - A record number of 13,288 persons visited the Jacksonville museum during August, exceeding August, 1961 by 3,446.

A museum announcement reported that 29,787 persons visited during the three summer months of June, July and August and that 45,479 have registered since Jan. 1, 1962. Total attendance since July 10, 1950 is just shy of half a million, 498,627.

With the exception of New Hampshire, Delaware and Georgia, every state in the union, and Washington, D.C., was represented in August.

An unusual number of guests also registered from the following 18 foreign countries: Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone, West Indies, Peru, England, Norway, Holland, Germany, Switzerland, France, Italy, Ethiopia, Saudi Arabia, Japan, Malaya, Australia and New Zealand.

Groups who came in August included visiting travel editors; students from the University of Oregon Community Program for Scholastic Recognition; Eugene; a Camp White group; Clackamas County Y.M.C.A. members; the Vagabonds, an adult education group from San Jose College, San Jose, Calif.; ladies of Pacific Northwest Bell's Board of Directors' meeting, Medford; and Cub Scouts from Pack 6, Medford, and Den 2, Central Point.

Gifts and loans presented to the museum during the past month include a pair of pliers from Gary Ray, horse-shoe and stone Indian mosaic from Bert Kissinger, books from Mrs. Una B. Inch and from Mrs. Caroline Andrews Werner, documents and records from H. R. Farr and the Jackson County Sheriff's Department.

A collection of photographic prints of early Medford from W. E. Thomas, ladies' clothing and accessories from Mrs. Marie Ulrich and Mrs. Wm. P. Holt, bedspreads and a quilt from Mrs. Fred C. Shere, razors and shaving equipment, spectacles and leather collars worn by the donor at early rodeos, by James Whitaker, and a rocker, cake plate and woven cover-

let, belonging originally to the Halley family, from W. L. Sutherland, all of Medford.

Ray Lewis, Jacksonville, gave photographs, a ladies' silk dress and other clothing items. William La Faunce, also of Jacksonville, gave local mineral specimens, and Charles Lewis, Jacksonville, gave books.

Photographs were received from Mrs. Augusta Perry, and a collection of polished agate, petrified wood and coral and a shell hunting horn from Tom M. Riley, both Eagle Point.

Al Sherman, Ashland, gave school books, and Miss Nora Chamberlain, also Ashland, presented a blanket woven in the old Ashland Woolen Mills, and purchased originally by the E. J. Farlow family.

Also received were a length of barbed wire brought from Missouri, a shepherd's crook, an 1851 dictionary with stand, and glass bells, from the Mrs. Sam McNair home in Ashland. These articles were presented in the name of Mrs. McNair by Mrs. Herbert Corder, Kansas City, Missouri, a sister of Mrs. McNair.
