Seaside To Probe Labor Day Riots

Seaside—UPI—Seaside, about \$7,000 richer in fines and forfeited bail, is getting ready for an official look Wednesday into Labor Day week end riots that brought 130 arrests. A special committee headed by Gov. Mark Hatfield's chief aide, Wayne Nunn, is slated to meet here with local officials to launch an investigation into the rioting by more than 1,000 young vacationers. The last of the 130 arrested during the riots appeared in court Monday—or forfeited bail.

So far, 96 have forfeited bail amounting to about \$5,600. Nine have pleaded guilty, paying fines totaling \$1,373. Of 25 who pleaded innocent, 17 asked for hearings before the judge, which are scheduled Sept. 14 and 17. Six asked for jury trials, which have not been scheduled. Two more remain undetermined.

City Atty. Nicholas Zafraios said he was looking into the "definite possibility of felony charges for the ring-leaders." The city council met Monday night but bypassed discussion of the rioting until Wednesday.



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Board of Higher Education—an increase of nearly \$17 million over the current budget.

Action by the full board, expected today, will send it to Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Of the proposed budget—for instruction, research and general services—\$70,192,766 would come from the general fund, and \$37,834,076 from such sources as student fees and tuition.

Some \$6.2 million was slashed from requests from individual schools.

The budget would add 343 new teachers in 1963-64, and another 156 in 1964-65.

Also approved was a "B" budget of \$3.6 million for such things as participation in the Oregon program for the advancement of education, summer school costs, operation of the new radiation center at Oregon State University, and library book purchases.

Another \$3 million, a contingency fund that would be administered by the state emergency board, was approved. It would be to cope with unexpected high enrollments, avoiding the jamming that occurred last year.

Strike Threatens Southern Pacific

San Francisco—UPI—A three-man government emergency board met with union and management representatives today in an effort to ward off a crippling strike of almost the entire Southern Pacific Railroad system.

The dispute over what to do about some 9,000 clerical workers, station employees and other railroad men displaced by automation has caused friction for four years.

The differences are similar to those which two weeks ago led to the shutdown of the Chicago and North Western Railway. The board has until Oct. 9 to make its report in the Southern Pacific dispute, which could affect the railroad's entire network, except for lines in Texas and Louisiana.

Pennsylvania Firm Files Suit in State

Salem—UPI—A Pennsylvania corporation, the Smith, Kline & French Laboratories, has filed suit in the Oregon Tax Court against the Oregon Tax Commission.

The case involves authority of the commission to assess corporate income taxes against an out of state corporation having no offices, salesmen or property within Oregon.

Widow's Fight for Senate Highlights Primary Votes

Nine states hold primary elections today, highlighted by a widow's fight to replace her husband in the Senate.

The nine primaries are in Arizona, Colorado, Minnesota, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and New Hampshire.

In New Hampshire, the death of GOP Sen. Styles Bridges produced a flock of candidates, including his widow, Doloris. She is facing Reps. Perkins Bass and Chester E. Merrow and Sen. Maurice J. Murphy, who is now serving by appointment in Bridges' unexpired term.

The winner will face Thomas J. MacIntyre, who is unopposed in the Democratic primary. New Hampshire Gov. Wesley Powell is running for re-election against two GOP candidates, and Sen. Norris Cotton is up for re-election for a regular six-year term.

Two Unopposed
In the other primaries:

Arizona: Gov. Paul Fannin and Rep. John J. Rhodes are unopposed for Republican re-nomination and Rep. Morris K. Udall is unopposed in the Democratic primary. Sen. Carl Hayden, in Congress since 1912, was heavily favored over one opponent, Stephen Shadegg, and Evan Mecham are seeking the Republican senatorial nomination.

Vermont: Gov. F. Ray Keyser Jr., Sen. George D. Aiken and Rep. Robert T. Stafford are all unopposed in the Republican primary. The only Democratic contest pits former Rep. William H. Meyer and W. Robert Johnson for the senatorial nomination.

Colorado: Gov. Stephen L. McNichols and Sen. John A. Carroll are unopposed for Democratic re-nomination, and Rep. Peter H. Dominick is unopposed for the GOP senatorial nomination.

Minnesota: Gov. Elmer L. Andersen is unopposed for GOP re-nomination, and Lt. Gov. Karl Rolvaag is running for the Democratic nomination for governor. The biggest fight is between Rep. H. Carl Anderson, mentioned during investigation of the Billie Sol Estes case, and State Rep. Robert Odegard for a congressional nomination.

Rhode Island: Gov. John A. Notte Jr. is seeking re-nomination in the Democratic primary against Mayor Kevin K. Coleman of Woonsocket and Francis A. Manzi. The GOP also has three candidates for governor.

Vermont: Gov. F. Ray Keyser Jr., Sen. George D. Aiken and Rep. Robert T. Stafford are all unopposed in the Republican primary. The only Democratic contest pits form-

Soviet Device Said Exploded in Outer Space Last Year

Gallery Exhibit To Be Taken Down

"A Pacific Profile of Young West Coast Painters" will be taken down Friday evening at the Rogue Gallery to make way for the next exhibition of the series, which will open next Tuesday evening.

Those who have not seen the exhibition are reminded that this is the last time it will be available for viewing in the southern Oregon area, Gallery officials said.

Public reaction to the show has been mixed, but the Rogue Valley Art association should be complimented on making available work of a degree of excellence that other wise would by-pass this part of the West Coast, officials noted.

Paintings which have received greatest interest have been a landscape by Robert Huck, entitled "Mountain Flight," (Mr. Huck taught painting at Oregon State University, Corvallis, until his death two years ago); a seascape called "View From the Pacific Coast" by Gerrold Davis of Los Angeles which dominates the front window of the gallery; and a nude by the Portland painter, Robert Cole, entitled "Elsie" (which interestingly offended some viewers because of its ambiguity rather than its graphic detail).

Another large painting, entitled "Luncheon," is in the rich impressionistic style of the French painters of 30 years ago. Painted by Roland Petersen, who teaches at the University of California at Davis, it will interest those who have never seen an actual example of this style of painting, Gallery officials said.

United Nations, N. Y.—UPI—The United States said today that Russia exploded a nuclear device in outer space last year.

U. S. Ambassador Francis T. P. Plimpton denounced the Soviet Union in the UN Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space for its "crocodile tears" about the dangers to astronauts caused by an American nuclear explosion in space over the Pacific ocean this summer.

Soviet Ambassador Platon D. Morozov said Monday that the U. S. space explosion had endangered "the very lives of astronauts" by disturbing the Van Allen radiation belt which encircles the earth.

Plimpton told the 28-nation committee that Russia's series of nuclear tests, which broke without warning a three-year moratorium last year, created a fallout danger to "living, breathing human beings—not just artificial satellites."

"In fact," Plimpton said, "the Soviet Union carried out high altitude nuclear tests during its series which began a year ago. Less than one year ago, the Soviet Union exploded a nuclear weapon in outer space."

Plimpton recalled that Russia prepared the test series which broke the nuclear truce last October while the United States and Britain negotiated with it in good faith on a test ban treaty. He noted that the Soviet Union ignored a General Assembly appeal not to touch off a super blast and exploded 58-megaton device

in its series of more than 40 explosions.

As for the U. S. high altitude tests, Plimpton said, it was announced in advance and the Soviet Union had made it clear that it had information on the radiation disturbance before it launched its twin manned satellites—Vostok III and IV.

He said the U. S. space shot did not delay the flight of the two Soviet manned satellites and "it had no effect on their cosmonauts."

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
