Speaks With Rotarians

District Governor Of Rotary Meets With Local Club

Ward Hammond, Medford, Governor of District 511 of Rotary International, world wide service organization, addressed the Medford Rotary club Tuesday. The Medford club is one of 27 clubs in his district.

Hammond met with the club officers on Monday to discuss Rotary administration matters and service activities.

He is a senior active member of the Medford Rotary club and a past president of both the Medford and Grants Pass clubs. He was elected a district governor for 1962-63 at Rotary's 53rd annual convention in Los Angeles, Calif., in June. He is one of 271 district governors responsible for supervising the activities of more than 11,330 Rotary clubs having a total membership of \$26,000 in 128 countries.

In his address to the club, Hammond called attention to the explosive nature of the Rotary philosophy of "Service Above Self," and stated that this year Rotary was growing at the average rate of one new club each 20 hours and more than two Rotarians per hour.

Attends Assembly

Hammond attended the International Assembly in May at Lake Placid, N.Y. There were 260 governors-nominees attending from throughout the world, together with Rotary International officials and a large part of the staff of the secretariat from Evanston, Ill., headquarters of Rotary International.

Speaking of the work of Rotary clubs in international affairs, Hammond commended the local club for its support of The Rotary Foundation which awards fellowships to graduate students for study in countries other than their own. Since 1947, Rotary International has awarded nearly 1,600 Rotary Foundation Fellowships at a cost of more than \$4 million, with the grants averaging \$2,700. Contributions of Rotary clubs make the awards possible.

As a Rotary governor, Hammond is serving on a global team headed by Nitish C. Laharry, of Calcutta, India, president of Rotary International.

Speaks at Meeting

Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, was the main speaker at a meeting of the Medford Rotary club at the channel 10 television studios recently.

Dr. Stevenson gave what he called an "annual report to the stockholders" (the taxpayers) on the operation of the college. He said that Southern Oregon college is a multi-million dollar industry, pointing out that more than a million dollars annually is spent on textbooks and supplies alone.

Luncheon was served to members of the club in the studio, which was another in a series of service club meetings that have been televised by channel 10, according to Station Manager Russ Jamison.

Oil Companies To Build Stations Here

Two oil companies have announced plans to construct service stations in Medford.

A building permit to erect a station at 126 North Riverside ave. near the Chalet motel was issued by the Medford building department to Humble Oil company. The station will cost \$20,000.

The second station will be constructed on Barnett rd. at the Interstate 5 interchange. The station, to cost \$17,877, will be built by the Standard Oil company.

Hoover May Leave Hospital in Week

New York — Former President Herbert Hoover, 88, is expected to be able to leave Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center within a week, doctors said today.

Hoover was operated on Aug. 28 for removal of a cancerous tumor in his intestine. Doctors said his condition has improved steadily since the operation. They added that it was not likely the malignancy would recur.

Ashland Planner Tells Chamber of Surveys in City

Ashland — There's room in Ashland for 20,000 dwelling units compared to only 3,400 in existence at present, Robert Buchanan, city planner, told the Ashland Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

Buchanan brought chamber members up to date on planning surveys that have been made in Ashland and future surveys and plans that are scheduled.

Swimming Classes Start at Hawthorne

The Medford high school physical education swimming classes for sophomore girls started this morning at Hawthorne pool.

The classes, to be of three weeks duration depending on the weather, will include swimming instruction or improvement. City Parks and Recreation Director Robert Haworth said the city makes the pool available to the school for the program.

A similar program for sophomore boys will be offered early next spring prior to the pool's opening to the public. Classes start at 8 a.m. and continue through 2:45 p.m. daily with six classes participating. Haworth noted that the water is heated to 81 degrees.

Over half of the area within Ashland's city limits is still vacant, Buchanan said. Of the area that has been developed, 25 per cent is occupied by streets, 20 per cent by residential developments, 13 per cent by public or semi-public uses, 3 per cent by industry and 1 per cent by commercial establishments.

Buchanan explained that his predecessor, Marvin Gloege, worked on several of the initial planning studies in Ashland. These included a land use study to determine what uses are being made of each parcel of land in the city at present, and a population survey.

To Guide Development

Gloege then compiled a land use plan to guide future development of the city in an orderly and coordinated fashion. This plan was accepted by the city planning commission and city council, Buchanan said.

The planning commission and council subsequently adopted a subdivision ordinance and started work on a comprehensive zoning ordinance.

Buchanan explained that a master plan for a city can only affect future usage of land and cannot interfere with the activities of present land owners.

In tasks that still lie ahead, Buchanan said he expects to complete work on the com-

prehensive zoning ordinance and conduct studies of possible annexations, street traffic with relation to the new freeway, parks and recreation, the central business district and possible capital improvement projects by the city.

Tuesday's chamber meeting was the first of a fall series of weekly luncheons.
