

Ashland Grizzlies Travel To Redding

Ashland — Ashland High school's gridiron crew is "just about as ready as its going to be" for its first game of the 1962 season according to new Head Coach Marsh Jones.

The Grizzlies go to Redding, Calif., on Saturday. They engage Shasta High school there that night.

Jones, looking toward a building program here, has described his squad as "pretty green. There are not many experienced boys."

The new mentor reported that the Grizzlies are coming "a little slower than I'm used to." Nevertheless, he said his Bruins charges are "trying and eager." He declared, "I'm pretty pleased with the kids. They're putting forth a full effort."

Sophomores Bid

There could be as many as five sophomores in the starting lineup. Jack Gruber and Jim Conklin were listed as offensive guards and Dennis Ekwall at flanker back. Mike Torressen and Lou Willets are

sophomores battling with Ron Boyce, junior, at left half. Don Scholer, a soph, is scrapping with Frank Willet, a senior, at fullback. Seniors who may start on offense include Jim Smith, center; John Polk and Don Sorenson, tackles; Dale Tepper and Mike Cotton, ends, and Howard Johnson, quarterback.

Jones has indicated that the Grizzlies will use shifting defensive tactics. He has listed Sorenson, Gruber, sophomore Bill Jury and Polk or Smith may be the up front men with Tepper, Frank Willets, Cotton and Conklin in backfield posts and soph Dave Lohman, Johnson and Torressen at the deep line.

Ankle Injury Hobbles Funston

Corvallis —UPI— The Oregon State traveling squad scored a 23-0 victory over a team of redshirts, substitutes and ineligible players in a three-quarter length scrimmage Thursday.

Four Beaver regulars, including quarterback Terry Baker, saw little or no action. Baker has infection on his leg, halfback Leroy Whittle is nursing a pulled muscle, and fullback Bruce Williams and tackle Jim Funston have injured ankles. Whittle played on defense and the others sat out the scrimmage.

All are expected to be ready for Oregon State's opener in Portland Sept. 22 against Iowa State.

Butte Falls Will Face Days Creek

Butte Falls — Butte Falls high, with things looking up and with an outlook for a good season, opens Class B eight-man football play on Saturday at 2 p.m. against Days Creek here.

The ruckus, originally planned for today, was shifted to Saturday at Butte Falls' request.

There are six lettermen and all will be in the starting crew. They are Neal Ellis, quarterback; Jim Lytle, halfback; Jim McConochie, halfback; Dan Edmonson, end; Monte Stratton, center, and David Webb, guard. Other starters may be Bob Copeland, end, and Ron Smith or Mike Mitchell, guard.

McConochie is a 215-pounder and Smith a 135-pound speedster. They switch positions at times.

New coach this fall is Connie McQuerry.

More than 325,000 fans are expected to turn out for the National Football league's opening games Sunday when the Green Bay Packers start defense of their world championship against the Minnesota Vikings and the New York Giants meet the Cleveland Browns in an early showdown.

The Packers are 17-point favorites.

Cleveland is a 3-point favorite over New York.

In other NFL openers on Sunday:

The San Francisco Forty Niners are the choice by 7 points over the Chicago Bears.

The Baltimore Colts are 7-point picks over the Los Angeles Rams.

The Philadelphia Eagles are the choice by 10 over the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Detroit Lions are favored at home by 7 over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

And the Washington Redskins and Dallas Cowboys are rated even.

Reds Deal Giants Crippling Setback In National Race

Time is running out on the Cincinnati Reds' tenure as National league champions but it's no fault of one-man-gang Frank Robinson.

If anything, his stature has grown bigger and bigger as the Reds' chances to repeat have grown smaller and smaller. And when it comes time for the experts to evaluate the league's most valuable player candidates they'll be looking at the fanciest set of figures since Sophia Loren hit these shores.

Frank, bidding for his second consecutive most valuable player award, leads the NL with a .341 batting average, ranks second in runs batted in with 129, is third in homers with 38 and has matched a club record of 47 doubles in one season.

Wilds Big Bat

Robinson swung a big stick for the second straight game Thursday night when the Reds dealt the San Francisco Giants' pennant hopes a crippling blow by beating them, 7-2. The loss, the Giants' second in a row to the Reds, dropped them two full games behind the idle first-place Los Angeles Dodgers with only two weeks left in the season.

Robinson, who hit two homers against the Giants Wednesday night, hit a double and a single Thursday night as the Reds routed Mike McCormick in four innings. Jim O'Toole pitched a four hitter and struck out five to win his 16th game for the Reds, while the loss was McCormick's fourth.

The Giants open a four-game series in Pittsburgh tonight while the Dodgers start a three-game set in Chicago.

The Reds, clutching at straws as the mathematics of their situation begins to overwhelm them, will be playing the New York Mets tonight, Saturday and Sunday.

Twins Beat Chisox

The first-place New York Yankees were idle Thursday and lost a half-game of their lead when the Minnesota Twins beat the Chicago White Sox, 5-1, and moved to within five games of the top. The Kansas City Athletics, however, struck a blow for the Yankee pennant cause by downing the Los Angeles Angels, 5-4, and dumping them into third place.

The Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1, the Baltimore Orioles whipped the Washington Senators, 7-1, and the Detroit

Tigers outslugged the Boston Red Sox, 14-8, in other major league action.

Klamath River—The news from the mouth is that salmon are slowing down to around 20 caught per day. Large numbers of steelhead are reported at Klamath Glen and in the Witchiepec area. Best catches are reported being made on fresh run. Salmon are showing up at Shasta River together with a few steelhead.

Rogue River—Salmon fishing is slow with a few being taken on herring right on the bar at the mouth. Weather at present is rainy, windy, and cold. The river has had a 1 inch raise and a 4 degree drop in temperature. The Calice area is giving up a few steelhead, but the larger bunch is in the lower and middle river. Signs point to a good steelhead season.

Diamond Lake—Most of the boats are limiting out. The fishing is good to excellent with 80 per cent of the catch made up of those rainbow planted last May. Best bet is a small gang troll with worms. Flies and eggs are taking some fish. More fishermen are needed.

Four-Mile Lake—is getting better. Kokanee up to 11 inches are taking a worm-draped hook with single-egg topping. More fishermen are needed.

Howard Prairie—Good fishing is for those who have the right style. This is drifting or stillfishing with an unadorned worm. About 90 per cent are limiting on 14 to 17 inches. More fishermen are needed.

Klamath Lake—More fishermen are needed.

Lake of the Woods—Fishing is fair with catches ranging 7 to 18 inches long. More fishermen are needed.

Willow Lake—Best bet for kokanee is FF&W or FF&W silver flatfish. There is good bank fishing.
