

Giants, Dodgers Both Lose; Magic Number Down To 8

The Los Angeles Dodgers' magic number-clinching number is down to eight and San Francisco's Giant manager, Alvin Dark's spirits are down to the point where he concedes, "The last week has been the low spot of my career as a manager."

For the last two the Dodgers have been running on a treadmill but the Giants just haven't been able to do anything about it. They've lost six straight games, equalling their longest losing streak under Dark, to make virtually a \$10,000 giveaway of their chances for World Series loot.

And now the Dodgers have found an unbeatable ally: Time. It's all in their favor as the contenders head into their final 11 games of the season.

The Dodgers bowed to Warren Spahn and the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1, Monday night but maintained their four-game lead and cut the magic number to eight because the Giants lost to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2. The Chicago Cubs defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-4, in Monday's only other major league action.

Dispute Over Liston's Gloves To Be Settled By Officials Wednesday

Chicago (UPI)—The stormy dispute over what brand of boxing gloves must encase the 14-inch fists of challenger Sonny Liston in his heavyweight title fight with Floyd Patterson, a week from tonight, will be decided at Sonny's camp Wednesday.

That's what Chairman Joe Triner of the Illinois State Athletic Commission announced today, on the heels of Monday's 40-minute hassle over the mitts—a torrid argument that threatened to erupt in violence.

"Commissioners Will Feigenbatz, Joe Robichaux and I will drive to Liston's camp at Aurora Downs, Ill., Wednesday," Triner explained, "and we'll see if any one of five brand new pairs of specially made gloves from the Everlast company in New York will fit him—particularly his huge thumbs."

Uses Other Make

If they fit poorly, or not at all, it will be a victory for Liston, Triner indicated, Sonny and his handlers have been insisting that only the Frager gloves of Chicago—moulded to his hands—can fit him properly.

The five new pairs of Everlast gloves were scheduled to be flown in from New York today.

Patterson and his handlers protested so loudly and so long against the Frager gloves at Monday's meeting in commission headquarters that trainers Dan Florio Patterson and big Willie Reddish Liston almost came to blows while grappling over a disputed pair of mitts. Special detectives

with the fighters separated the struggling trainers. Patterson and his group claim that the Everlast gloves, with their horsehair matting, retain their resiliency longer than the Frager articles with their compressed foam rubber; but the Liston cohorts declare the true story to be just the opposite.

Champion Floyd can wear his Everlast mitts, regardless of what Sonny pulls on. Although both champion and challenger have finished their public workouts, Patterson planned a brief sparring session late today.

Promoter Al Bolan announced that the advance sale for the live gate at Comiskey park had passed \$400,000. He said that indicated an ultimate gross gate of more than \$900,000.

Liston is favored at 7½ to 5 in the wagering.

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Bird Hunting Rule Synopses Being Sent Out

Portland—Oregon hunters are advised by the state game commission that copies of the 1962 upland game birds, small game, and waterfowl regulations should be available now, or will be within a week, at all license agencies throughout the state.

Shipments of the regulations synopses are being mailed by the game commission to vendors as rapidly as possible. Shipments are made alphabetically by county.

Season dates, bag limits, and open areas will be found in table form. Specific regulations are outlined in more detail for clarity. Included in the general regulations is a brief on shooting time, prohibited methods, possession and transportation, public shooting ground regulations, and refuges and closures.

For convenience, hunters will find a shooting hours table beginning Oct. 13 and extending through Jan. 2. The table is not a sunrise and sunset table, but represents the actual shooting hours for game birds and waterfowl. Prior to Oct. 13, shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.
