Coast Salmon Best in Years

Portland — The offshore and lower river sport salmon fisheries are reported to be the best in years according to angler interviews up and down the Oregon coast. Most anglers have been scoring well on silver salmon with good numbers of chinooks also being brought to creel.

Game commission fishery biologists checking anglers at Gold Beach reported that through mid-August 3,179 anglers reported taking 1,308 salmon with more than two-thirds large chinooks.

At Winchester bay, around 4,000 anglers were interviewed during the period and reported taking 1,4 fish per angler at mid-August. Almost 97 per cent of the salmon taken were silvers.

Heavy To Silvers
Coos Bay anglers found the salmon fishing good with 1,805 fish reported taken by the 2,139 anglers interviewed. Again, the catch ran heavily to silvers. Siletz bay anglers were reporting one fish per angler during the period.

At Yaquina bay, anglers checked numbered 514. These anglers reported taking 321 silver salmon and 5 chinooks. The estimated catch to August 18 at this popular salmon angling center was 7,700 silvers and 120 chinooks. At Depoe bay, 540 anglers were checked and reported taking 340 salmon. Cape Kiwanda anglers checked numbered 1,100 and reported in with 710 salmon, mostly silvers.

The big fishery was at the mouth of the Columbia where 2,674 anglers were interviewed to mid-August. These anglers reported taking 2,440 silver salmon and 314 chinooks. Large chinooks were entering the catch at mid-August.

A group of 34 sports writers and sportscasters voted the Huskies the outstanding team in the AAWU following an air tour of the college football training camps.

The group picked this order of finish: Washington, Southern California, UCLA, Stanford and California. The sixth school, Washington State, will be eligible to play in the Rose Bowl, but will not be eligible for the conference championship since the Cougars are playing only two members this year — Stanford and Washington.

The writers also chose Ohio State as Washington's probable Rose Bowl foe.

Washington State Will Be Lucky To Break Even

Pullman, Wash. — The Washington State university joins the Big Six this year, officially opens play in a new 35,000-seat stadium at nearby Spokane — and will be lucky to break even in the won-lost column with its football team.

The Cougars were admitted into the Athletic Association of Western Universities during the summer and are happy to have some goal to shoot for — such as the Rose Bowl.

But they play only Stanford and Washington inside the conference and will be longshots to win either of these tilts.

They do have, however, one of the great athletes in the West in Hugh Campbell, the pass-catching end who shatters records every time he catches the ball.

Heavily Guarded
But the opposition puts two or three men on him every time he runs downfield, says coach Jim Sutherland, "so maybe we'll have to use him as a decoy."

The Cougars, with a 3-7 record last year, have 14 lettermen. They have a fine crop of freshmen and an outstanding lot of junior college transfers.

There are only four seniors on the team that probably will play the most. Sutherland will use the unit system in substituting and all 33 boys are expected to see a lot of action.

On the No. 1 team, or "Big Red" as he calls it, are Campbell and quarterback Dave Mathieson. In the backfield with the signal-caller are halfbacks John Brown and Ken Graham and fullback George Reed, a 5-10, 210-pound powerhouse.

Portland — Portland has as much chance right now as any of four other cities to be this country's choice for the 1968 Olympics host, the city was informed Monday.

J. Lyman Bingham, executive director of the U.S. Olympic committee, said Los Angeles, San Francisco, Detroit and Philadelphia all were in the running. He added that although New Orleans, Chicago and Minneapolis had failed to send word to his office they could have filed notice with Tug Wilson, chairman of the site selection committee.

The committee meets Oct. 15. The U.S. choice still must compete with those from other countries. Tokyo is the 1964 Olympics site.

"We tried to do it the easy way and had to do it the hard way," he remarked. Spiegelberg also brought out "it took us quite a while to get going."

GAVE US FITS
The coach said that the Indians were fired up and "they gave us fits with their defenses." A nine-man line was used by the Indians quite a bit of the time against the Tornado running game and they played havoc with the Medford passing game by holding back potential receivers.

"They were a good team and we wore them down," said the Tornado coach.

THE DALLES IMPRESSED
Medford's football team made a definite impression at The Dalles.

Said Rod Geier, sports editor of The Chronicle, "You have a terrific club this season—sound and with depth. Based on his play Friday, I'd vote Jack Lowery all-state tomorrow if it was up to me."

"Miles is a great little quarterback. He mixes his plays well and really keeps his opponents honest. Also, a tip of the hat to Hammons, a great receiver."

LEARNED A LOT
Geier quotes The Dalles Coach Keith Tucker as saying, "I'd still like to play Medford again. I'd like to keep on playing them, at least until we beat them. Sure we lost, but we learned a lot. I'd rather play a team like Medford."

"We've got a good film of the game and it will help us discover some of our weaknesses."

MAY HAVE HANDS FULL
It appears that the Medford Black Tornado may have its hands full come Friday when it entertains the Marshfield high football aggregation. Marshfield's 25 to 7 verdict over Klamath Falls makes the Pirates look a little closer than a previously reported "year away."

"They hit hard; that's what I like," said Buc Coach Pete Susick of a group of tough linemen which included such veterans as John Mahaffy, Ernie Manders and Larry Smith.

Dick Fishback, sports editor of the Coos Bay World, reported that "... it was hard for Marshfield fans and boosters ... to miss the potent straight ahead power evinced by this year's version of the Pirates."

GAPING HOLES

Doyle Gambille with 118 yards in 15 carries and Bud Walsh with 96 in 15 were the leading rushers. Gambille, showing out away ability in open field, scored three of the Marshfield touchdowns and Walsh the other.

GEREN JERSEY RETIRED
Vern Steward, Eagle Point High school football coach, reports that the Eagles have retired the No. 28 football jersey worn by Steve Geren, stellar tailback. The jersey will be put in the school trophy case along with the trophy awarded Geren as most valuable player in the Shrine East West all-star football game last August.

Geren is enrolling at the University of Oregon. He does not have an athletic scholarship but is going to give football a try. Steward reports that Geren has talked to Duck Coach Len Casanova and was told that he is being considered No. 3 frosh quarterback.

FIRST FOR STEWARD
Eagle Point high's win over Brookings last Friday in football was the first opening game victory for Steward as a coach. "I'm pretty pleased over the win but not too happy over the way we got it," remarked the mentor.
