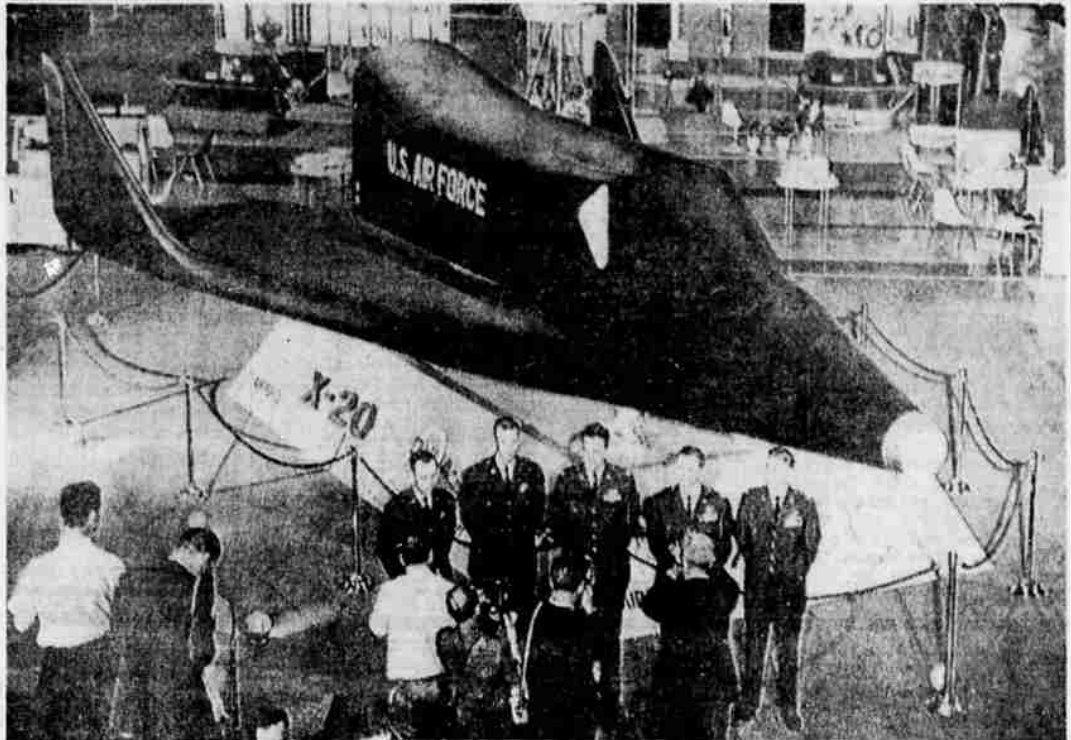


Cuba, U.S. Tension Flares into Open in UN

Negro Veteran To Try To Enroll at Southern School

Oxford, Miss. — (UPI) — Attorneys for Negro veteran James H. Meredith said he would try to enroll today at the racially segregated University of Mississippi.

There was a barrage of last-ditch legal maneuvers by state officials in attempt to bar him.

Meredith was to be accompanied to the tree-lined, 100-year-old campus by U. S. deputy marshals. No time was given for the arrival of the 29-year-old Air Force veteran, but registration lines were to close at 3:30 p.m. (EDT).

Late Registration

Meredith does not have to register today, although it was enrollment day for transfer students and he is a junior transfer from Jackson State college for Negroes. He could wait until Friday, the day for late registration, when classes would be under way and there would be less student activity on the campus.

In contrast to the orderly registration of most of the university's 5,500 students Wednesday, there was a flurry of activity at the state capital in Jackson.

The state college board argued for five hours and then broke up at 2:30 a.m. (EDT) today without reaching a decision on whether to bar Meredith from the university. Gov. Ross Barnett, who has directed state officials to go to jail rather than obey federal desegregation orders, said after the meeting, "We didn't reach a decision on anything."

Air Force Unveils New Space Craft, X-20 'Dyna-Soar'

Las Vegas — (UPI) — A plywood mockup of the Air Force answer to civilian space craft, the X-20 Dyna-Soar, was unveiled today to the public.

Billed unofficially as combining the best features of the short-flight X-15 research plane and the long-flying Mercury space capsules which cannot be controlled like airplanes and must return to earth by parachute, the Dyna-Soar and its first six future pilots were presented at the 16th annual convention of the Air Force association.

Dyna-Soar is a delta-winged research vehicle designed to be boosted into outer space by a souped-up Titan III rocket, orbit the earth at speeds up to 18,000 miles an hour and then glide to a landing at almost any airport under full control of the pilot.

Unlike North American Aviation's X-15, whose research flights from Edwards Air Force Base in southern California's desert do not last more than a few minutes, the Dyna-Soar will be able to remain in space as long as desired.

Parks Commission Changes Meetings

The Medford parks and recreation commission has decided to change its regular meeting date back to the second Wednesday of each month.

Grants Pass Man Drugged, Robbed En Route South

A Grants Pass man was drugged, robbed of \$180 cash and left in his car near the Siskiyou summit, Jackson county sheriff's deputies were notified Wednesday afternoon.

Ronald A. J. Master, 28, of 1434 Sherman lane, Grants Pass, told officers he was en route to southern California last Tuesday when he picked up a hitchhiker at Redding, Calif. Shortly afterwards, he said that he became sleepy as asked the hitchhiker to drive, which he did.

Master said that the hitchhiker offered him a pill to keep him awake, so he took one from a No-Doz box that he was offered.

After drinking a bottle of soft drink, Master told officers he went to sleep, and upon awakening found himself in his car, parked on Colestine rd., about one-half mile from Highway 99 at the Siskiyou summit.

He said that \$180 in cash was missing from his billfold and a pair of slacks and a shirt were taken from the car.

After returning to his home in Grants Pass last evening, Master was reported to have started again south where he will resume college.

The hitchhiker was described as about 25 years of age, six feet tall, weighing about 175 pounds, and with light brown hair.

Portland — (UPI) — There was disagreement in the Douglas fir industry today over plans by the West Coast Lumbermen's Association (WCLA) to change grades on lumber.

G. Cleveland Edgett, executive vice president of WCLA urged the industry to get behind proposals for changes in standards.

Edgett said there was a risk of having ground rules for sale and manufacture of lumber "taken out of our hands."

The WCLA has suggested changes which would result in kiln-dried lumber products manufactured in smaller sizes and green lumber manufactured in oversizes.

Out of Business

Manufacturers of green lumber contend the changes would give dry-kiln mills a \$7 per 1,000 feet margin in the market and would put many of them out of business. Much of the margin would come in freight rates.

Producers of green lumber have formed a committee called C.H.A.O.S. Committee Against Chaos in Lumber Standards, Ken Rinke, its secretary, said attorneys had warned proposed changes would be violation of Sherman Anti-Trust laws in that they discriminate against mills without dry kilns.

Edgett denied this and said WCLA was operating within the law and its responsibility to members in pushing for new standards.

Willie Smith, Coos Head Lumber Co., said he was opposed to the changes "as are nearly 100 per cent of the green producers."

Some 135 lumbermen attended the meeting which adjourned without discussion of a resolution on the proposal or its opposition.

House Committee Backs Kennedy on Cuban Situation

Troops May Be Used If Needed

Washington — (UPI) — The House Foreign Affairs committee today unanimously approved a resolution to give President Kennedy a 100 to 1 unlimited congressional backing to deal with the Cuban situation.

Following the lead of the Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services committees, the House group supported the President to the extent of using troops if necessary to stop the spread of Communist influence in the Western Hemisphere.

The Senate, and perhaps the House too, was expected to adopt the fight-if-we-must resolution today.

The Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services committees unanimously approved the measure Wednesday. The House group quickly followed suit this morning at a closed-door meeting.

Dangerous Aspect

In its formal report, the Senate group said "the situation in Cuba should be taken seriously but not hysterically." It said the most dangerous aspect is the threat Cuba poses to nearby Latin American nations.

A principal objective of the proposed resolution, the report said, is to "prevent that threat from materializing through force or the threat of force."

The resolution, which won the support of the 33 senators on the two Senate committees, would express the determination of the United States to use all necessary means "including the use of arms" to resist the spread of Cuban communism in the Western Hemisphere.

It would also declare the determination of this nation to prevent creation in Cuba of an "eternally supported military capability endangering the security of the United States."

It would pledge the United States to work with the Organization of American States and with freedom-loving Cubans to support "the aspirations of the Cuban people for self determination."

30 Area People Will Camp Out

About 30 area residents will participate in the Friday and Saturday activities before and after the official dedication of the new 250 mile section of the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea highway.

Don McNeil, Medford Chamber of Commerce manager, said more Medford residents are expected to attend the dedication event Saturday morning.

Residents who have made their reservations with the chamber for the two-day desert caravan camp-out Friday and Saturday will leave from the chamber office, 304 South Central ave., at 8:30 p.m. Friday.

Caravan activities include lunch in Klamath Falls at 11 a.m. Friday and a buffet supper in Lakeview at 11:30 a.m. Saturday. The conference will start at 8 p.m.

Officers of posts from southern Oregon are expected to attend and will have an opportunity to question department of Oregon officials regarding veterans benefits, pensions, hospitalization, insurance and related program. Legion officials said.

State officials planning to attend include Al Friesen, Salem, state commander; Maurie Druhl, Portland department adjutant; Norman Rappell, Portland, state vice commander; and Glenn Howe, Portland, state service officer. Also attending will be chairmen of the Legion's state-wide committees.

The official dedication when Nevada Gov. Grant Sawyer will cut the ribbon will be at 11 a.m. Saturday at Daugherty slide, approximately 30 miles east of the camp area.

The week end activities will conclude with a barbecue at the Lake county fairgrounds at 2:30 p.m.

Medford Man Fined For Contempt of Court

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Washington Said Preparing Full-Scale Aggression

Attack Follows Stevenson Speech

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — Tension between Cuba and the United States flared into the open in the General Assembly today with a Cuban charge that Washington is preparing large-scale aggression against Fidel Castro's island.

Cuban Ambassador Mario Garcia-Inchausti took the assembly rostrum to level the charge as soon as Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson had completed a major U.S. policy speech in the general debate. Stevenson had touched only briefly on the Cuban situation. Speaking of what he listed as threats "in a dark and precarious world," he said: "Carries on Campaign."

"The government of Cuba, with moral and material support from outside, carries on a campaign of subversion and vituperation against its neighbors in the Western Hemisphere."

Garcia-Inchausti immediately demanded the right of reply.

The Cuban said the United States was "violating our air space, infiltrating our country and sending mercenaries against our coasts."

"The aggression of his government has destroyed the houses of our workers, damaged our industry and killed thousands of our citizens, with bombs."

"We reject your statement as a means of covering up a new large scale aggression which your country is preparing against our country."

Stop Tests

Stevenson, in his policy speech, renewed the U.S. challenge to Russia to stop nuclear tests and agree to disarmament under U.N. inspection.

He disclosed that Russia has exploded almost twice as much nuclear energy as the United States in its tests.

Stevenson argued for election of a strong secretary general with "full freedom and authority." The United States already has endorsed Acting Secretary General Thant for the post.

Stevenson urged the assembly to put the United Nations on a sound financial basis. He asked for approval of an International Court opinion that the organization's peace-keeping costs, such as in the Congo, are subject to assessment on all members.

Three New School Safety Patrol Members Sworn In

Eleven-year-old David Sparling of Lincoln school swore in three new members of the Medford school district safety patrol last night.

They were Gov. Mark Hatfield, Mayor John W. Snider and Dr. Leonard B. Mayfield, superintendent of Medford schools.

The swearing-in ceremony, which came as a surprise to all three men, preceded Governor Hatfield's speech at a safety awards banquet at Ping's Gardens.

Dr. Mayfield commented that he had been trying to get an honorary appointment to the safety patrol for years and was glad he finally was.

Sparling, who lives at 305 Beatty st., noted that the three new recruits fumbled some of their lines as they were repeating their oaths.

Loyal Government Forces Head for Argentine Capital

Buenos Aires — (UPI) — Troops and warships operating under a special army-navy-air force command were reported converging on Buenos Aires today to support the government against rebel forces at Camp Mayo, 20 miles northwest of the capital.

There was no immediate report of hostile action by the rebels, who said merely that "if we are attacked or pursued, we will defend ourselves."

Truck convoys were bringing 1,400 troops here from the provincial garrison at Azul and the anti-aircraft school in Mar Del Plata. A trainload of troops was arriving from the airborne school at Cordoba.

Newspaper reports which could not be confirmed immediately said the American-made light cruiser Nueve De Julio (formerly the USS Boise) was on the way here from the naval base at Puerto Belgrano.

Supporters of ousted ex-President Juan D. Peron sped through the streets of suburban Palermo early today, scattering propaganda leaflets from the windows of their automobiles. No other disorders were reported.

Reports from Camp Mayo said rebel Gen. Juan C. Ongania, who proclaimed himself commander of the army Wednesday, had set up his headquarters at the cavalry school on the big army base.

Newsmen on the scene said heavy artillery emplacements at the camp had been reinforced, while mechanized patrols scouted the approaches to the base.

President Jose M. Guido decreed the formation of the special three-service command Wednesday.

Hatfield Presents Safety Awards to Medford School

Gov. Mark Hatfield presented safety awards to Mayor John W. Snider and Dr. Leonard B. Mayfield, superintendent of Medford schools, and praised highway development in this area at a banquet here last night.

The awards banquet at Ping's Gardens, attended by some 75 persons, was the climax of a day of touring and campaigning by the governor in Jackson county.

Hatfield presented a 1961 National Safety council award for traffic engineering to Mayor Snider and a council 1961 award for school traffic safety education to Dr. Mayfield.

Praising both the city and the school district, the governor noted that the National Safety council "doesn't give awards lightly."

Hatfield also had praise for the freeway development in progress in Jackson and Josephine counties, noting that \$32 million worth of contracts have been let in connection with the Interstate 5 freeway from Grants Pass to the Ashland area.

During 1961 Oregon led the nation in miles of freeway completed and placed in use, the governor added.

Not all the state's highway money is being spent on interstate freeways, he went on, explaining that nearly \$5 million was spent in Jackson county during the last five years on non-interstate highways.

In contrast to the progress made in highway construction, Gov. Hatfield said he felt progress had not been made in the area of highway safety.

There were nearly 60,000

accidents in Oregon in 1961, injuring 19,706 and killing 484 persons. As of Sept. 17, the 1962 record was slightly better than last year's, "but one bad week end can shoot us ahead," the governor said.

To improve the state's traffic safety record, Hatfield said, "We must be more diligent in enforcement. We must develop a militant attitude and give authority to law enforcement agencies to carry out the laws."

He cited three recommendations for new laws he made to the last legislature which failed to pass, and urged that residents "put pressure" on the next legislature to enact them.

Proposed Legislation

The proposed legislation included:

1. An implied consent law, providing that when a driver receives his license he gives implied consent for a police officer to give him a sobriety test at the scene of an accident. Seventy-five per cent of drivers now refuse to undergo such tests, the governor said.

2. An arrest for probable cause law, allowing an officer to charge a driver with drunk driving if there is evidence that he was driving while drunk. At present such a charge can be made only if the officer actually sees the individual driving while drunk.

3. A maximum speed law, setting an absolute maximum speed as opposed to the present basic rule law. Speed is a major source of fatalities, especially in single car accidents, Hatfield commented. Twenty-eight states now have maximum speed laws, he added.

Meeting Set to Discuss Open Class Fair

A meeting to discuss an open class county fair will be held at 7:30 p.m., Monday in the Jackson county fairgrounds instead of Friday night at the courthouse.

Stan Zapell, Talent, former 4-H leader, said the meeting date was changed because of local football games Friday night. Zapell is one of a group of local citizens spearheading the drive for a proposed general county fair.

Zapell, members of the Jackson county fair board, representatives of 4-H, FFA, horse groups and the Southern Oregon Kennel club attended a discussion meeting at the present fairgrounds last night. They agreed to attend Monday night's meeting as a committee of the whole.

A majority of the 25 people attending feel there will be little left of the present fairgrounds since so many buildings are being placed there.

Some people said the old agronomy station would be an ideal site due to its central location, and because it is on level land and does not have sticky, clay soil. C. H. Buffington, fair board member, and Mrs. Carol Gibbs, kennel club representative, suggested the group obtain an open class county fair first, with a new fairgrounds, then discuss building construction.

Meeting Chairman Larry Perry, 4-H horse club leader from Lake Creek, was pressing for formation of a building committee to start planning for a large arena building.

Zapell said there is no formal committee organized yet. He had been asked by a local businessman to see what could be done toward organizing an open class county fair on adequate fairgrounds, he said.

A number of business, community, industrial and farm leaders have been asked to attend Monday night's meeting, he said.

Some of the people last night argued against moving the fairgrounds. Perry felt approximately 35 acres of land to the rear of the present grounds and the property to be vacated by the adjacent county shop could be used. He felt the city would not object to using some of its adjoining land included in the 35 acres.

Mrs. Gibbs said the annual

kennel club dog show is now too large for the high school stadium grounds it now uses. More adequate fairgrounds also would attract other activities, she said.

"This year we had 688 dogs in the show. This means 450 to 500 strangers were in town. Many of them stayed Saturday night and some Sunday night before going to the show in Eugene," Mrs. Gibbs said. "This means a nice piece of revenue for the community. We have been tempted to use the Josephine county fairgrounds."

Fair Board Member Francis Krouse said the 4-H and FFA fair would not lose parimutual funds, particularly if people appealed to their state legislators. Board Member William Bigham agreed.
