Feeding the Family

Grapevine Reveals

Bigger Thompsons

It's not an optical illusion and this grapevine rumor is no idle talk. The Thompson Seedless grapes which are currently arriving at produce counters are about twice the size they used to be. Larger berries and much longer, fuller clusters.

Grape growers have known for years that bigger Thompson seedless could be produced by thinning away part of the clusters and girdling the vine after the berries had set. This very thin, narrow ring of bark cut from all around the lower part of the grape vine prevents the sweet sap, the carbohydrate, from returning to the roots for storage. Larger, plumper grapes result. Other research goes on constantly to bring to our tables perfectly beautiful as well as sweet-tasting fruit.

All-Purpose Grape

Actually, Thompson seedless is an all-purpose grape. In its new, most pampered form, it comes to the fresh market as a table grape but 80 per cent of all our raisins are also made from this variety. Still other Thompsons are used in making white wine. For this reason, 48 per cent of our huge vineyards are planted to them.

Thompson seedless come to market in summer and are available fresh through November. Berries are uniform, greenish white to light golden, always seedless, firm and tender in texture, very sweet when fully ripened and moderately tender-skinned.

Baked Duckling With Seedless Grapes

Long Island is sending us good supplies of frozen duckling for our enjoyment. These are Pekin-type ducks, descendants of the original Pekin ducks that were brought to this country from China in 1873. Pekin-type ducks make up 90 per cent of all ducks sold in this country and of these nearly 60 per cent are grown on Long Island.

Duckling come all-ready-to-cook ranging 4 to 5½ pounds and require no more time or talent than any other poultry yet provide rare, good eating. Six servings here:

- 1/3 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 4 cups toasted bread cubes (croutons)
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 cup dried celery
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

PACERS VIE

Delaware, Ohio - (AP) - About 35,000 fans were expected to turn out to watch 13 of the nation's best 3-year-old pacers vie today for top money in the \$75,038 Little Brown Jug classic at the Delaware County fairgrounds.

1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/3 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup butter or margarine
3 tablespoons milk
Sift together into a mixing bowl, flour, sugar and salt. Add lemon rind and butter or margarine. Cut in with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Add milk. Mix lightly to form a dough. Divide dough into eight equal parts.

Roll each very thin, about one-sixteenth inch thick, in a circle. Fit into eight 3½-inch tart pans. Prick pastry at intervals with a fork to prevent it from blistering. Bake in a preheated moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes. Remove from pans when thoroughly cooled.

Fill with pastry cream* and top with Thompson seedless grapes. If desired, garnish with whipped cream or sprigs of mint.

*Pastry Cream Filling. Combine one-fourth cup cornstarch, one-half cup sugar and pinch of salt in top of double boiler or in a saucepan. Heat 1½ cups milk and add gradually. Stir and cook over medium heat until mixture is very thick. Blend additional one-fourth cup milk with four egg yokes. Cook over hot water or low heat until mixture is about as thick as mayonnaise. Remove from heat and stir in 1½ teaspoons pure vanilla extract.

Cool completely; then spoon into eight baked tart shells. Chill three to four hours or overnight. Proceed as suggested above.

Dessert Grape Sauce

We made this grape sauce and poured it over scoops of vanilla ice cream but sauce is equally good over any flavored pudding or plain cake when you want a really exceptional dessert using a liquor. We use Triple Sec.

Combine one-half cup sugar, one-half cup water, one teaspoon fresh lemon juice in a three-cup saucepan; mix well. Stir and cook until simmering point is reached or until sugar is thoroughly dissolved. Continue cooking over medium heat without stirring and uncovered, 10 minutes or until a heavy syrup is formed. Add 1 cup Thompson seedless grapes and cook one minute. Remove from heat and stir in one-third cup Triple Sec liquor.

Spaghetti and Beef With Dairy Sour Cream

For six generous servings of a main dish of excitingly good flavor, try this recipe. Then keep it handy for repeat performances.

- 1 pound steak cut in ¾ inch cubes
- ¼ cup flour

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1/2 cup onion, minced
1 clove garlic, minced
1 can (6 ounce) mushroom pieces or ½ pound fresh mushrooms
1 cup dairy sour cream
1 cup condensed tomato soup

1 tablespoon Worcester-shire sauce
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 8-ounce package spaghetti, cooked
Cut fat from meat; heat in

frying pan. Roll meat in flour; brown in meat fat. Add onions, garlic and mushrooms and cook until onions are golden. Stir in rest of ingredients except spaghetti; cover and simmer until meat is tender (about one hour). Serve

over hot cooked spaghetti. In the meantime, cook spaghetti according to package directions which probably will suggest three quarts boiling salted water — until tender or 10 to 12 minutes. Drain.

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CUBS ON EXHIBIT - Two five-month-old tiger cubs have been placed on exhibit at the San Diego, Calif., zoo.
