This should be "Say Something Nice About Television" week. There are so many shows of unusual interest scheduled that even TV's most sour critics should find something pleasing.

Documentaries will cover such varied subjects as "The Ordeal of Woodrow Wilson" narrated by Herbert Hoover; "Meet Comrade Student," filmed in Moscow schools; "The Road to Button Bay," story of the 50th anniversary Girl Scout Roundup; and "The Cross and the Dragon," the true story of a Catholic missionary who is serving a 20 year term in a Chinese Communist prison camp for espionage.

The list of performers in the special musical and variety shows sounds like a Who's Who of stage and concert hall. Opera stars and comedians pop up everywhere. The new season is off to a good start, it seems.

CONCERT HALL, 2 p.m. Sunday K-SHA radio. Pianist Peter Katin performs Tchaikovsky's "Concerto No. 1 in B Flat Minor" and oboist Mitch Miller with the Sadrinberg Little Symphony perform Mozart's "Concerto in C Major for Oboe and Orchestra."

MEET THE PRESS, 5 p.m. Sunday KMED-TV. The Right Honorable Reginald Maudling, England's Chancellor of the Exchequer, will be interviewed.

McKEEVER AND THE COLONEL, 5:30 p.m. Sunday KMED-TV. McKeever and fellow cadets try to outwit their colonel at a military academy. (Series premiere)

Mobile X-Ray Unit Slated in Ashland

The mobile chest x-ray unit will visit Southern Oregon college and downtown Ashland this month, according to the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association.

The unit will operate near Churchill hall on the campus Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 26 and 27, from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The unit will be located in downtown Ashland on the Elks club parking lot Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29, from noon to 3 p.m., and from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Employees Receive Performance Awards

Supervisor C. E. Brown of Rogue River National Forest presented cash awards for exceptional performance to five people at a recent convocation at the supervisor's office.

Douglas B. Finch, Jack V. Finch, Nell V. Bishop, Lyle N. Anderson, and Robert A. Foster were the recipients. Finch was awarded \$150 for establishing and carrying out efficient and effective forest fire dispatching procedures with only limited guidance.

These procedures included the dispatching of aerial tankers to fires on four national forests and state protected lands.

He planned and designed a new aerial tanker base, including the site plan, facilities design, negotiation for site acquisition, and cost estimates. Finch's performance of assigned duties exceeded acceptable standards, Brown noted.

Fitch was awarded \$100 for initiative and skill in integrating a new accounting system.

Mrs. Bishop received \$100 for skillful leadership in maintaining a consistently high quality of clerical work in the supervisor's office.

One hundred dollars were awarded to Foster for performing outstandingly as air service manager at the Medford aerial tanker base. He supervised and trained a four-man crew into an efficient operating unit. He supervised the mixing, loading, and dispatching of 137,000 gallons of fire retardants for 112 aerial tanker flights to forest fires on four national forests and state protected lands.

He devised a number of techniques to improve and make safe the mixing and loading of fire retardants. Brown noted. Foster did an unusually good job of record keeping on aircraft flight times. Foster's performance of assigned duties exceeded acceptable standards.

Anderson was awarded \$200 for providing outstanding planning and direction for a complex reforestation, timber stand improvement, blizzard control, and brush field rehabilitation program.

Under his technical supervision, 3,575 acres were planted, 665 acres seeded, 265 acres of brush fields cleared, 578 acres pruned, 1,145 acres of 5-seeded pines sprayed with antibiotics to control blister rust including 143 acres of experimental helicopter spraying with Phytoactin, and 923 acres of ribes eradicated, Brown said.

Anderson's leadership, aggressiveness, and ingenuity has enabled the forest service to carry on an intensive program in antibiotic work and exceeds all previous records of production in reforestation and timber stand improvement work.
