Calendars Support Clothing Pool

In the winter of 1957, the Medford Junior Women's club was organized as a civic and philanthropic organization and was accepted as a member of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs. The 14 charter members began searching for a project through which they could fulfill the purpose of the club and also satisfy a need in the community. Their problem was increased because they had no funds available to spend on such a project.

Through one of the members, the club became aware of the need for a centrally located clothing depot for the use of school nurses and principles in dispensing clothing to needy children in the schools. A room provided in Lincoln school building and clothing was collected through the PTAs. Club members assumed the responsibility of cleaning, mending and sorting the clothing by type and size. Over 200 hours each year have been devoted to this work, and at present, each of the club's members has a goal of 12 hours per year on work at the clothing pool.

As soon as the clothing pool was in operation, club members looked for a means of raising funds to defray maintenance expenses and to purchase articles of clothing when needs could not be filled at the clothing pool.

In the fall of 1958 the Junior Women's club published its first Social and Appointment Calendar as a combined fund-raising and civic project. The calendar is designed to include dates of school and city functions as well as any privately sponsored events which are of interest to the general public in the Medford area.

The calendar covers a period from October of one year through September of the next. Care is taken to leave adequate space on each date for the recording of personal appointments. The back cover contains a list of organizations and also includes meeting times and telephone numbers of a club officer. Advertising is sold to local merchants to defray print costs.

Club members average over 200 man hours of work on this calendar each September.

They compile all the information and prepare it for the printers. After proofs are made, they glue the printed material on blank calendar pages. These pages are then photographed and completed by the printing firm. Members then assemble all pages, punch the holes for binding and bind the calendars.

The production work done by club members saves an estimated \$100 to \$150 in printing costs, and the combined cooperation of advertisers, the printer, and the club members makes it possible for all sales revenue to go to the club's philanthropic fund.

The combination of black
