

Spain Counts 368 Dead in Flood; Asks U.S. Air Force Aid

Kennedy Given Full Backing To Deal With Military Build-Up by Communists in Cuba

Washington—UPI—President Kennedy had full congressional backing today for whatever steps he considered necessary to deal with the Communist military build-up in Cuba, including use of U.S. troops.

The House completed congressional action on a Cuban fight-if-we-must resolution Wednesday. It cleared the House by a 384-7 vote. The Senate had passed it previously, 88-1. Opponents contended the resolution was not strong enough.

Criticism Not Indicated
The lopsided House vote did not indicate the strong criticism of Kennedy which preceded it. Many lawmakers, especially Republicans, said he was not being tough enough in handling the Cuban situation.

The President had few defenders, but one of them, Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.), urged the American people to put their faith in Kennedy and ignore "the paper mache generals."

Before sending the resolution to the White House, the House defeated 251-140 a Republican effort to "strengthen" the proposal by declaring the Soviet military build-up in Cuba to be a clear violation of the Monroe doctrine.

Practically Unanimous
GOP House members made their bid for a stronger leadership. Chairman Charles B.

Hoever (R-Iowa) of the House Republican Conference said support of the move was "practically unanimous."

Toll Expected To Increase in Outlying Areas

Barcelona, Spain—UPI—Spanish authorities today asked the U. S. Air Force to aid survivors of Spain's worst flood of modern times. The casualty toll rose to 368 dead, 465 missing, and 536 injured.

Heavy rains predicted for today had not come by afternoon, but officials expected the death toll to climb as rescue workers reached outlying villages hit by the flash flooding Wednesday.

Bulldozers Asked

The mayor of Barcelona answering an Air Force offer of help, asked the Air base at Zaragoza to send bulldozers and other earth-moving equipment to clear away the mud and debris in Sabadell, a hard-hit textile center.

Other help began to pour in from Spain and abroad. The Bank of Spain began a national fund for flood victims with a \$167,000 contribution. King Boudouin of Belgium and his Spanish-born queen, Fabiola, donated \$2,000.

The National Radio appealed for food, blankets, and medicine for the thousands of homeless survivors.

Damage Tops \$25 Million

A U. S. embassy spokesman in Madrid said that no U. S. citizens were among the casualties.

Unofficial estimates put the total property damage at more than \$25 million.

The scene was catastrophic at Tarrasa and Sabadell, Spain's two biggest textile centers.

"This has ruined our textile industry," a textile engineer said today as he sadly surveyed the debris, mud and ruins which were once his factory.

Barcelona escape the full force of Wednesday's flood, which was caused by a torrential eight-inch rain following several months of drought.

Highway Bid Letting Planned

Salem—UPI—Oregon Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said today the highway department's Oct. 30 bid letting will include about \$11 million worth of interstate highway projects.

This word came after the U. S. Commerce department announced that apportionments for interstate projects had been made to the various states. Oregon has been running low on federal aid funds, and awaiting the new apportionment.

The department will call for bids by project Oct. 9. Contracts will be awarded Nov. 1.

Cooper said the department is still waiting for fresh federal aid money on primary, urban and secondary systems. Funds will be available only after Congress passes the 1962 federal highway act.

Cooper said that until this act passes, several major projects will be held up. This includes improvements to state Highway 42, and the lower Columbia River highway at Linton.

Four Juveniles Are Apprehended by Police

Lumber Shippers Gaining Market

Seattle—UPI—North west lumber shippers appeared to be gaining back some of the Atlantic markets from British Columbia, according to figures released by the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau.

But the PLIB indicated the gain was very slow.

August waterborne shipments from Oregon, Washington and California to the Atlantic coast totaled 42,777,645 board feet compared to 65,029,635 board feet from British Columbia.

The Pacific coast share of the market equaled about 40 per cent, about the same as for July but well ahead of January and April when U. S. shippers had only 28 per cent of the East coast market.

All water shipments from B. C. decreased during the last three months, while U. S. shipments increased.

The PLIB indicated that Canada has been aiming more shipments at Britain and Japan.

TANGANYIKA BILL AIMS AT SECURITY RISKS
Dar-es-Salaam, Tanganyika—UPI—The Tanganyikan government today sought approval by the National Assembly of a bill that would allow authorities to detain persons considered security risks.

Home Affairs Minister Oscar Kambona submitted the bill to the assembly Wednesday. He said the "continued stability and security of the state necessitates that the executive should have the power to detain persons who threaten the stability or security."

Manila—UPI—President Diosdado Macapagal said Wednesday that Filipino soldiers are "ready to fight and die" in the defense of democracy.

HELICOPTER CREWMEN HURT NEAR SAIGON
Saigon, Viet Nam—UPI—Two American helicopter crewmen received slight injuries when a U.S. Army helicopter was hit by Communist ground fire south of Saigon, American military sources said Wednesday.

The names of the crewmen, who were treated in a local hospital, were not immediately available.

The sources said the H21 helicopter continued flying after it was hit and returned to base.

SOVIET AIR SQUADRON DELIVERED TO INDIA
New Delhi, India—UPI—Russia delivered a second squadron of transport aircraft to India last week, reliable sources here disclosed Wednesday.

The AN12 aircraft were reportedly delivered to Indian defense authorities to haul supplies for border road development. Russia sent one squadron of the planes to India last year.
