Portland Police Officers Cleared in Jail Strip Charge

Portland —UPI— Police Chief David Johnson said Wednesday there was no misconduct involved on the part of the head of the jail division and a sergeant Sept. 7 in the search of a disrobed woman prisoner.

Mrs. Nancy Ann Manning Zins, 24, arrested on a disorderly conduct charge, charged she was forced to strip in the presence of two male officers a few hours after her arrest.

The chief said Mariels received information which prompted a search of the women's jail for narcotics. He said that in Capt. Mariels' judgment it was necessary for the captain and Sgt. Sprague to be in close proximity to the scene of the search. He said they were in the women's jail but not in the cell at the time.

Two matrons conducted the search, he said. The chief said all 14 women prisoners were searched by matrons that day and that "it is significant that no male officers were in the women's jail at any other of these searches."

Called Occasionally — Chief Johnson said "presence of male officers at disrobing of female prisoners is not without precedent. On occasion, male jailers are called upon by the matrons to assist them in cases where unruly female prisoners have to be searched or their own safety."

The chief said the search uncovered no narcotics. Mrs. Zins was found guilty on the disorderly conduct charge Tuesday in Municipal Court and fined \$25, but posted an appeal bond.

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Grants Pass Group Recommends Two Annexation Areas

Grants Pass — The Grants Pass city planning commission last night recommended to city council that two single pieces of property be annexed to the city.

Petitions seeking annexation of the two single ownerships were accepted by the commission. One piece of property is on the east side of the city limits and the other is on the west side.

The planning commission also received a report on progress of petitions being circulated in the West Park area seeking annexation. Planners were told that 50 of the 54 required signatures have been obtained.

The area, which is south of Rogue river, has 81 property owners.

Petitions Received — Petitions to amend the new zoning ordinance also were received by the commission. Petitions seek to change requirements of the front and back yards for churches in apartment zones. The new zoning ordinance requires 30 feet, and the petitioners seek to change it to 20 feet.

The planning commission will hold a public hearing on the proposal at its next meeting.

At a meeting earlier this week, the Grants Pass off-street parking committee decided to invite Roseburg city officials to its next meeting to discuss ways Roseburg is handling its off-street parking problem.
