Rogue Valley Duplicate Tournament Opens Today

Duplicate bridge devotees from several cities of this area will be in Medford this week end for the annual Rogue Valley Sectional tournament. The tournament is held alternately in Grants Pass and Medford, and always draws a large group of players. It is approved by the American Contract Bridge League.

Play will open tonight at 8 o'clock at Rogue Valley Country club. On the agenda are the first session of open pairs championship, and the Bartlett Pairs tournament. Interest is added to the tournament by naming the various events after pear varieties.

Saturday beginning at 1:30 p.m. the women's pairs championship, the men's pairs and the Comice pairs are slated. Saturday evening the final session of the open pairs will be played and the D'Anjou pairs play is scheduled.

Masters To Play
Sunday afternoon players who have acquired 20 master points in approved tournaments will be eligible for the master's pairs, and the other event will be the Bosc pairs play.

On the agenda Sunday evening are the team of four championship, and the Seckel pairs event.

buffet dinner between 6 and 7:30 p.m. at the clubhouse, and Sunday morning a complimentary breakfast will be served between 9:30 and 11 a.m.

Oregon Billiard Parlor Exclusively for Women

Portland, Ore. — When women started going to billiard parlors for a trim, the bastions of male privacy were reduced to two — the men's clubs and the pool hall.

The men's clubs are expensive and selective of membership. So, for the majority, there remained the pool hall.

Now that establishment also is shared with the gentler sex. A pool hall in Hillsboro, near here, caters exclusively to women.

Its name is the "Cue and Cushion," which is enough to make men recall nostalgically the less glamorous halls of old.

Once, the pool hall was a dark and safe sanctuary of softly clicking billiards and hardwood floors where a thousand cigars and cigarettes a day were unceremoniously ground out.

Use of the product is another prime consideration in the special bargain separation. Additional suggested rules for shoppers included: Resistance to any high pressure sales pitch, unless the item is needed and favorably priced. Take time to compare, before starting and while shopping; and be alert to changes in price, and ready to buy, or hold-back, based on know-how.

Speaker Says Small World No Place for Prejudices

In this era of fast, super-sonic flight, there is no place for racial or national prejudices, according to John Linn, Medford radio and television personality who talked at a meeting of the Friends of the Library of Jackson county at the Medford library Monday evening.

Persons who cannot accept the "one world" concept are challenged today by the fact that no person is more than 11 hours flying time from the most distant point, the speaker pointed out.

Using both a globe and a flat surface map to illustrate his talk, Mr. Linn demonstrated the false mental image the average person develops concerning the relation of size and location of the various world land masses.

He discussed the common usage of the terms "up," meaning north and "down" meaning south. Mr. Linn believes this usage develops in studying flat surface maps in elementary school.

Jerry Martin, program chairman and teacher at the Hoover school, introduced the speaker.
