

Christian Doctrine Workshop Planned By Local Catholics

A two-day Confraternity of Christian Doctrine workshop, the first of its kind to be held in the Medford area, is being sponsored this week end by the Sacred Heart Parish unit of CCD.

All sessions of the school will be open to the public, with Catholic parishioners from Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland invited to attend.

All general and split sessions of the workshop will be held at St. Mary's High school on Black Oak dr., just off Barnett rd. A luncheon on Saturday will be served in the new Knights of Columbus hall, next to the high school. All religious services will be held in Sacred Heart church on South Oakdale ave. at Tenth st.

Purpose of the workshop is to impart a knowledge and understanding of the complete CCD program to those not yet acquainted with the organization. It will also aid and instruct those already active in some phase of Confraternity

as well as others desiring to take an active part now or later in one of the many fields of CCD endeavor.

Beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday, registrations for the two-day meet will be taken. The group will be welcomed by the Very Rev. Carl Mal, pastor of Sacred Heart parish and spiritual director of the local CCD unit. Greetings will also be extended by Arthur Becker, president of the Medford unit.

At 10 a.m., in the first general session, the Rev. William Stone of Milton-Freewater will give a review of the "History of CCD."

Split sessions will be held from 11 a.m. until noon and again from 1 to 1:30 p.m.

Classes and Speakers

These classes and speakers in charge include The Rev. John Ilg and Robert Howard, of Sacred Heart parish, both high school teachers; Sr. Francis Marion, SNJM, and Mrs. E. E. Ford, both of Sacred Heart unit of CCD, grade school teachers; Mrs. Donald Sweeney, Medford; St. Martha of Rome Society; Mrs. Arthur Becker and Mrs. John Laferriere, Medford; Mrs. Virginia Anderson of St. Rita parish, Portland, parent education; and Mrs. Clarence Lexow, Christ the King parish, Milwaukie, Apostles of Good Will.

Classes considering the work of the Fishers division of CCD will be directed by Mrs. Margaret McLean, representing the Eugene curia of the Legion of Mary, and conducting sessions on the functions of the executive board will be Hugh Friel of the Medford unit.

At 2 p.m. Saturday a final general session for the day will consider "Solidarity and CCD," with Miss Laura Batzer, St. Mary's High School, speaking. Sister Jean Marie, SSS, archdiocesan supervisor of the CCD, will summarize the day's work and answer questions from the audience.

Blessed Sacrament

Benediction of the blessed sacrament, in Sacred Heart church, at 3:30 p.m. will end the workshop program for Saturday.

Two general sessions will be held Sunday, the first at 1 p.m. when Father Ilg will present a pictorial review of CCD.

The general session beginning at 2 p.m. will be divided into three parts. The first, a demonstration of "What not to do with Religious Discussion Clubs," will be given by several couples who regularly participate in this particular phase of CCD. Confusion which may result from this illustration will be cleared up with the "do's" of discussion clubs by Mr. Becker who for several years has been the chairman of this program in Medford.

The second part of this final session of the workshop will be a summarization of the progress of CCD in 1962 by Sister Jean Marie.

Closing Remarks

Finally the Rev. Eunan Buckley, OFM, Cap., of Roseburg, will discuss the "Spiritual Formation of CCD Members." Closing remarks will be given by Father Mal. Formal closing of the workshop will take place at 4 p.m. with benediction of the blessed sacrament again in the church.

Arrangements for the workshop were made by members of the Sacred Heart unit of CCD with the assistance of Sister Jean Marie, and the cooperation of St. Mary's Sodality and the Young Sociality Workers. Co-chairmen of the event are Mr. and Mrs. Don Sweeney and Mrs. R. J. Batzer.

Set At Central

The annual Northwest School of Missions will begin Monday with Central Church of Christ, 1440 South Oakdale ave., acting as host churches for the other Churches of Christ and Christian Churches of the Rogue valley.

The School of Missions is a cooperative effort of Churches of Christ and Christian churches in the field of missions education. During a five-week period, six missionaries will speak at 36 host churches in Washington, Idaho, Oregon and northern California. The School of Missions will close with a three day Missionary conference at Eugene, in November.

James Mummert, Boise, Idaho, will be the first missionary speaker for the School of Missions in this area. He will be at Central Church of Christ Monday at 7:30 p.m.

Mrs. Mummert is associated with the Boise Christian Children's home, a foster home for homeless children. The home uses the cottage plan to provide a normal home environment for the children, and Mr. and Mrs. Mummert serve as house parents for one of these cottages. The home at present has ten buildings located on a seven acre tract and cares for about 50 children.

Prospective members of the church are invited to meet with the Session of Elders Sunday at 3 p.m. in the sanctuary. After a brief presentation of the life of the church, the elders will receive as members those who attend.

A Family Fellowship dinner will be held Wednesday, Oct. 3, at 6:30 p.m. at the church. After dinner, the Rev. and Mrs. John Adams, Roseburg, will speak on "The Christian Mission in Korea." They will show slides of their recent six-week tour of that country and its mission stations. Members and friends of the church are invited.

Promotion Day At St. Peter's

Sunday will be Promotion day at St. Peter's Lutheran church, 1020 East Main st., according to Robert D. In October, 1953, the Rev. Thomas McCamant conducted the first services. In April, 1954, 32 persons were received into the church as charter members.

Worship services and church school classes will meet in Hoover school, near the intersection of South Modoc rd. and Siskiyou blvd. until the new building is constructed. Services will be held at 11 a.m.

The church now has a membership of 186 members.

Following the resignation of Mr. McCamant in 1961, he was succeeded by the Rev. Robert W. Tull, the present minister.

Last month the church property was sold as a part of the plan that will lead to the construction of a new church at the corner of East Jackson st. and Berkeley Way.

Sunday interested persons will meet at 1:30 p.m. for "Operation Evacuation," the group effort that will move the church into the facilities it will use until the new building is built.

The Sunday 11 a.m. service will include recognition of the charter members, a rededication of the present membership, and the participation of several laymen. The first through sixth grade children of the Church School will attend the service with their parents.
