Small Worlds Around Us

Baby Porpoise Seldom Survives in Aquarium
Newspaper headlines read: "Italian Aquarium Loses Porpoise." Within the last couple of decades, and for the first time, man has been able to study the habits and personalities of the aquatic animal.

The ancient Greeks thought looked so pig-like they named it a "porpoise."

Our association with this animal has revealed some startling facts. Seldom does a week pass but what the press carries a news story of some peculiar, or amazing action on the part of these highly intelligent animals.

In many countries, as well as our own, the porpoise is being placed on exhibition. Admiring crowds peer through glass portholes, in man-made miniature little "oceans" called aquariums, at the actions and antics of these little brothers of the whales.

To have a baby porpoise born within the walls of one of these concrete and glass "seas," is an event widely publicized. To raise one of these babies to adulthood, under conditions present in this unporpoise-like environment, is close to being a miracle; it is seldom accomplished.

Seldom Survives
Even with the very best of care, and under constant attention by interested attendants, the baby porpoise seldom survives. As frequently happens, the human factor, trying to understand porpoise nature, attributes the youngster's death to parental carelessness, or outright murder on the part of the male porpoise.

Papa Porpoise is as fond of his offspring as is a human parent. There would seem to be other, and less obvious reasons why the baby seldom lives to become an adult, when in captivity. Future studies may reveal the real answer.

Observing the porpoise in its natural environment, the sea, observers have noticed a condition that always seemed to be present but is difficult to explain or understand. There is a foster mother association, rather common in porpoise society.

The baby's real mother, always present in sympathetic attendance, appears to have the help of another female.

This foster mother swims alongside the real mother and the baby and appears to perform some necessary function, that is not too clear to the human observer.

The babysitter female appears as watchful of the baby as does the real mother. She assists in the teaching; will even protect the youngster at the risk of her own life if necessary.

May Be Necessary
It would not be too surprising if she also offered encouragement and "advice" to the baby's real mother; she may be even more necessary to the welfare and health of the baby than we realize.

Could it possibly be that there is a highly organized society in the relationship of all the members of a porpoise herd? With animals as intelligent as the porpoise, such a condition is possible.

In spite of the very few baby porpoises so far raised in captivity, they continue to be "little strangers in our midst."
