Sculpture Forms Off-Duty Hobby Of Commissioner

Pleasantville, N. Y.—UPI—When Ralph J. Menconi isn't functioning as Police Commissioner at this bustling town, a suburb of New York City, he's hard at work as one of the nation's top portrait sculptors.

Menconi, a much-decorated veteran of World War II who was graduated from Yale as a bachelor of fine arts in 1939, has won many commissions, including the authorized Alaskan Statehood medal, sculptures of labor leaders Samuel Gompers, William Green and Philip Murray for the AFL-CIO, and official medals and tablets for the Pittsburgh bi-centennial, New York Historical society, the San Juan, Puerto Rico, airport, the South Bend, Ind., public library and the Speer library at Princeton university.

He says the work relaxes him from the pressures of his duties as police commissioner and member of the town trustees.

Menconi's latest commission is designing and sculpting three series of high relief, finely carved commemorative historical medals. One set features the 34 presidents of the United States. Another honors each of the 50 states and the third celebrates the 58 individual signers of the Declaration of Independence—in all, about 140 individual medals.

"Even if I do one a month," Menconi estimated, "I won't be finished for the next 11 years."

Kennedy First
The first of these commemorative medals, already highly prized by collectors, was that of President Kennedy. When, shortly after his inauguration, the President went to Paris, for conferences with President DeGaulle and on to Vienna for a meeting with Premier Khrushchev, he took with him more than 1,000 of the commemorative medals to present as souvenirs.

Cast in bronze, silver and platinum, the medals are 1 1/4 inches in diameter, or slightly larger than a 50-cent piece. The President's face appears full front in high relief on one side. On the back is the Presidential seal.

In the state series, the historical societies of the various

states pick the individual to be represented on the face of each medal. The state seal is on the back. For the signers of the Declaration of Independence series, each medal bears a full bust of one of the signers. The reverse side portrays a reproduction of the signature.

Before starting his bas-relief sculpture of any portrait in the series, Menconi files to Englewood, Ohio, to confer with technicians at the Presidential Art medals company, which casts the medals. After a pose is agreed upon, Menconi returns to his Pleasantville studio, only a few blocks from his Police Commissioner's office in city hall.

Clay Beginning
"I start first with clay," he said. "The original is 10 inches in diameter, or a little more than half normal head size. Once this sculpture is finished—a job that usually takes up to three weeks—it is made into a plaster model which is sharpened and molded into bronze. Then a pantograph is used to reduce the mold to its proper dimensions for the medal and a dye is cut. The medals are stamped out by the dye on a special press."

Menconi, who received seven battle participation awards and the Bronze Star as a U.S. Army Major in Europe in World War II, devotes just as much time to his duties as one of Pleasantville's town trustees and its police commissioner.

"After wrestling with a tight budget, or tackling a problem of increasing parking space," says this artistic cop, "it's sometimes nice to get home to my studio and relax with the slower tempo of the past as it's reflected in the portraits of the men of history whom I study before I sculpture."

Hatfield Urges Wood for Schools

Hatfield said wood "has not been fully exploited by Oregon school authorities. Wood structures today are safe, durable, beautiful and economical."

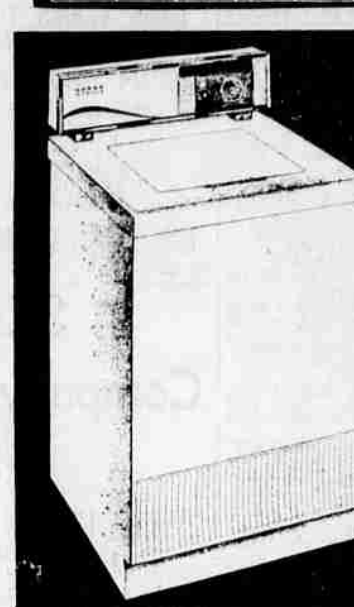
The governor, speaking to a Chamber of Commerce group, said "we cannot overlook the great new market for Oregon forest products throughout the

"All forecasts point to an increasing need for wood to provide homes..." he said. "If current import difficulties can be resolved, Oregon's timber industry has a very bright future."

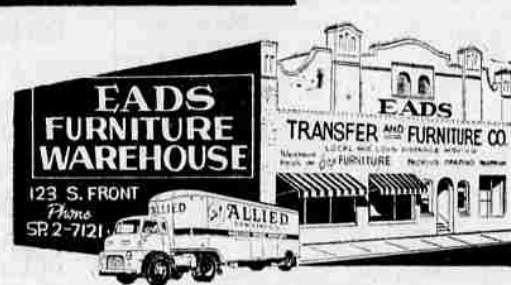
