WEEK IN CALIFORNIA Nixon Livens Up Campaign, to Fire Four Officials If Elected

Richard M. Nixon livens up an already lively gubernatorial campaign last week by promising to fire four high state officials if he is elected Nov. 6.

"It is high time," Nixon said, "to clear the dead wood out of Sacramento — to rid government of those men who never should have been given positions of public trust."

The "dead wood" he would fire are William Warner, director of the department of water resources; Hale Champion, director of finance; and Lionel Steinberg and Milton Natanson, members of the state board of agriculture.

Meanwhile, Gov. Edmund G. Brown denied what he said were statements by Nixon that he was "soft" on communism enforcement and narcotics laws. Brown made the reply in Washington, where he was attending the White House Conference on Narcotics.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Lavorante: Boxer Alejandro Lavorante won part of a battle with death and vigilant doctors said that if the handsome Argentine fighter could "weather another week" his chances for survival were good. Lavorante was in a Los Angeles hospital after being knocked unconscious by Johnny Riggins in an Olympic Auditorium fight. Lavorante still was in a coma seven days later.

Judges: The Mendocino County Grand Jury was asked to investigate two justice court judges who issued about three dozen warrants against public officials. Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk summoned the grand jury to investigate Judges Maurice Tindall and Glenn Evans. Mosk himself received one of the warrants, as did the district attorney of San Francisco. Behind the warrants was a political feud between one group supported by Judge Tindall and another faction including the district attorney and sheriff.

Powell: Dick Powell, one-time banjo playing singer who became a successful actor and

television producer, was being treated in Hollywood for cancer. He was hopeful that doctors can cure the disease. The 57-year-old television star said the cancer developed in his neck and chest.

Hardesty: Dr. Cecil Hardesty, San Diego county superintendent of schools, withdrew as a write-in candidate for state superintendent of public instruction. Hardesty was defeated in the June primary by Dr. Ralph Richardson of Los Angeles and Dr. Max Rafferty of La Canda. But he decided to re-enter the race two weeks ago when both candidates praised him in a

television debate. Last week, however, he said the minimum \$250,000 necessary for a successful campaign could not be raised in the limited time available. He declined to endorse either of the candidates and pledged to support whoever is elected.

Search: An underwater search for the body of one of three escaped convicts was discontinued after two days of extensive probing by two skin divers in the tricky currents off Alcatraz Island. The search was prompted by the discovery of a 14-inch piece of prison denim snagged by a fisherman's hook. The cloth

was identical to that worn by three inmates who escaped June 11.

Henning: John F. Henning, California state director of industrial relations, was selected as the new undersecretary of labor to replace Willard Wirtz, who moved up to secretary. Henning's nomination was approved by the Senate.

Schools: Thomas W. Braden, president of the state board of education, denounced the California public school system for its "casiness." Braden, publisher of the Oceanside Blade Tribune, said "So long as we continue a

school system which is less than demanding of our children's abilities, we ignore our nation's heritage and our nation's future." He spoke to state department of education staff members in Sacramento.

Executions: Four condemned murderers will go to their deaths on the same day, Nov. 16, in San Quentin's first quadruple execution. The death date was set for John Frank Vlahovich, 31, Joseph Rosoto, 39; Donald G. Franklin, 34; and John Lawrence Welch, 34. Two will enter the gas chamber at 10 a.m. The other two will follow at 1 p.m.

Polio: Northern Californians took Sabin oral vaccine as part of "K.O. Polio" day. It

was the largest one-day mass polio immunization in history. The vaccine was given via sugar cubes.



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Social Security Said Bargain for County Residents

How good a "bargain" is Social Security for the average Jackson county resident? How much is he likely to get back, after retirement, for every dollar he has been paying into the pension fund?

A study made by the Tax Foundation shows that, for those who have been enrolled under Social Security for a long time and are retired or are soon to be, it is a real bargain. Most of them will get back more than \$2 for every \$1 they put in. Future generations will not fare nearly as well.

Pension payments locally have already reached huge proportions. The Government's last report, released a few months ago, shows benefits to Medford residents and to others in Jackson county being paid at the rate of \$6,887,000 a year.

Fraction Contributed
Only a fraction of that amount, however, had been contributed to the pension fund in any one year by the retired and disabled workers who are sharing in it.

In analyzing the cost of Social Security, the Tax Foundation has figured out what it comes to for someone who is just starting to work.

Taking into account present tax rates and those scheduled for later, a 20-year-old man in Jackson county, going to work for the first time, will have contributed \$9,798 by the time he is ready for retirement, 45 years hence.

Total Contribution
By that time, with interest at 3 per cent, his contribution will amount to \$18,709. A like amount will be turned in by his employer.

After retiring, he will find that he and his wife, if they live a normal span of life, will collect a total of \$38,700 from the pension fund.

For the 330 young men of 20 in Jackson county's population, if they start work now and live the expected number of years, their payments will come to \$6,171,000, counting interest, and their maximum benefits, \$12,771,000.

For people who are now 65, Social Security has been the biggest bargain. They needed to make payments for relatively few years before they were eligible for pensions.
