

Two Candidates File For Mayor In Phoenix Vote

Phoenix — Two candidates have filed for the post of mayor of Phoenix which comes up for election in November, and two other candidates have filed for three positions on the city council here.

Running for mayor are the incumbent Faye Carver and a new candidate Darrell Paxson. In the council race, Eloise Reese is the only incumbent who has filed for re-election so far. The other candidate in the running is Clark Brown.

C. E. Knight, retiring councilman, is reported definitely not planning to seek re-election. Councilman Delbert Cook's plans have not been announced.

The Phoenix council met Monday night and accepted the low bid of Selby Chevrolet, Ashland, on a new police car. The bid, one of four submitted, was \$14,457.44. The new car will replace the existing city police car.

Another Rogue valley mayor who is seeking re-election this fall is Milton Steinmetz, mayor of Gold Hill. Steinmetz says he decided to run again because he felt he was "drafted into such action by the people" who circulated his nominating petition and obtained more than the required number of signatures to place his name on the ballot.

Steinmetz gave it some thought, however. The petition was ready for his signature early in September, but he declined to sign it. He considered the situation for nearly two weeks before signing on Sept. 26.

One of the considerations that led Steinmetz to make that decision was the fact that he is able, because of a unique position he occupies, to help the progress of the city and save its treasury money.

Steinmetz retired as a civilian engineer for the federal government four years ago, he explained. Since he is retired, it is possible for him to do many engineering jobs for the city on a donation basis. He feels that considerable expense has been spared the city on some sewer and street work. He has made an effort to study the city area on his own time and where possible bring maps up to date so that there will be accurate records of streets, and water and sewer lines.

Gold Hill's mayor also confirms the belief we expressed in this column Monday that mayors of small cities must put in quite a bit of work that goes unnoticed and unappreciated. When interviewed by our Gold Hill correspondent, Mary Kell, recently, Steinmetz expressed the opinion that many local citizens fail to realize the efforts he has made and the savings that the taxpayers gain when the city does not have to hire an engineer to do the work that he has donated.

First appointed to the Gold Hill City Council in 1951, he served in that capacity until 1955 when he was appointed mayor, following the death of Mayor Harry Smith. He completed that term as mayor, then stepped out one term, ran again in 1958 and was elected. He was re-elected mayor in 1960.

Governing Board Elects New Officers, Receives Reports

Eagle Point — New officers were elected to serve the 1962-63 fiscal year for the Eagle Point Scout-Community building's governing board at its semi annual meeting last week.

Elected to serve were Harry Hanscom, president; Ed Kimmel, vice-president; and Mrs. Jack (Mary Lou) Hall, secretary.

Elected to the executive committee besides the mayor, who is acting chairman, and Ted Hoffman, the city appointed council representative, were Mrs. Kenneth Vanice, Donald Geren, Keith Krambeal, Gordon Peck, Mrs. Bill Short, and Mrs. Elmer Harnish. Mrs. Keith Krambeal was appointed as a non voting member of the committee to serve as secretary.

In her report as calendar chairman, Mrs. David Kahl listed the various youth groups, adult committees of youth groups and adult organizations which used the building and the special meetings held over the past year in the building.

Several of the groups use the meeting place weekly, some monthly and others occasionally. Some of the groups using the building failed to clear through her first and therefore an accurate record was not possible.

In other action taken by the governing board it was voted to ask all of the youth organizations using the building to make a contribution toward the expenses of the building by March 1st.

The by-laws of the building ask each group to sponsor a money - making project for these expenses once each year. Only 3 groups have contributed so far.

Following a lengthy discussion on the condition of the building the group voted a motion to hire a janitor and voted to ask each regular group using the building to have a specified time to do extra cleaning work in the building.

All groups using the building will be reminded that they are to leave the building in as good as if not better condition than they found it upon arrival.

In keeping with this thought, a committee consisting of Keith Krambeal, Mrs. Jack Hall, Mrs. Bill Short, and Jack Hall was appointed by President Gordon Peck to prepare a check list of items that each group should check before leaving the building.

The executive committee reported that it had made plans to acquire the necessary cleaning equipment for the building and all groups using the building should be shown where these things can be located in the building.

The possibility of acquiring some recreation equipment such as a ping pong table, tumbling mat, boxing equipment or something along that line with money which had been appropriated for summer recreation funds by the Eagle Point city council and not used this summer was discussed.

The executive committee noted that before definite plans could be made the council would have to take action.

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District 6 Census Will Start Monday

Central Point — Census takers will embark Monday on the biennial nose count of all children in School District 6, Superintendent Charles A. Meyer announced today.
