Hustling Team To Be Foe Of Tornado This Friday

A slot T formation team which hustles like mad will provide the rivalry this Friday night for the Medford High School Black Tornado.

The opponent is the South Salem aggregation which will come here carrying a 3-0 record and ranking second and fourth behind Medford's No. 1 rating in the polls.

Kickoff will be at 8 p.m. for Medford's second home game of the season.

Saxon attack reported is based on running with Dave Johnson, 185, a big threat at left halfback. But, the Salemites have their ground game backed by the throwing of lefty Gary Allen, 160, quarterback.

A pair of hefty tackles help make the offense go. On the left side there's Howard Phillips, 214, a senior who was a regular last year. On the right is the Spencer Powell, a 217 junior.

Powell, George Yielding, 225, and David Avison, 228, are bulwarks of the basic five-man defensive line. The Saxons also have another hefty in Doyle Yielding, 211, brother of George.

Gang tackling has been a defensive quality of the Saxons.

While there are some returning regulars, most of the South Salem starters are gridders who have moved up after being reserves last year.

South started its campaign with a 20 to 0 surprise win over North Salem. Since then the Saxons have defeated Klamath Falls 27 to 7 and Bend 27 to 6. Medford rested last week end after defeating the Dalles 25 to 0 and Marshfield 27 to 0.

South has substantially a senior ball club.

A clarification in seating arrangement plans for the South Salem game was announced today. There will be no adult seating in the east stand.

The stand will be for students. Medford Senior high students will occupy the east stand from the South tunnel on north. Visiting students will sit just south of the south tunnel. Junior high students are to occupy the extreme south end of the stand.

For grade school students bleachers will be available at the southeast corner of the field.

The brand new west side stand is entirely reserved. Sections are reserved at the extreme north and south ends. Actual seats are reserved in the remainder of the stand.

Defending champion Dexter Daniels, Winter Haven, Fla., was ousted in Tuesday's first round of match play by David Rose, Cleveland, Ohio, 2-1.

Rose was runnerup in 1960 in the tourney for golfers 55 years and older.

The longest match Tuesday went to Franklin G. Clement, Chicago, who nipped former champion Tom Robbins, Pinehurst, N.C., 1 up on 21 holes.

The fastest victory went to H. G. Adkins, Newport News, Va., who downed Willard McConnell, Wilmington, Del. 5-4.

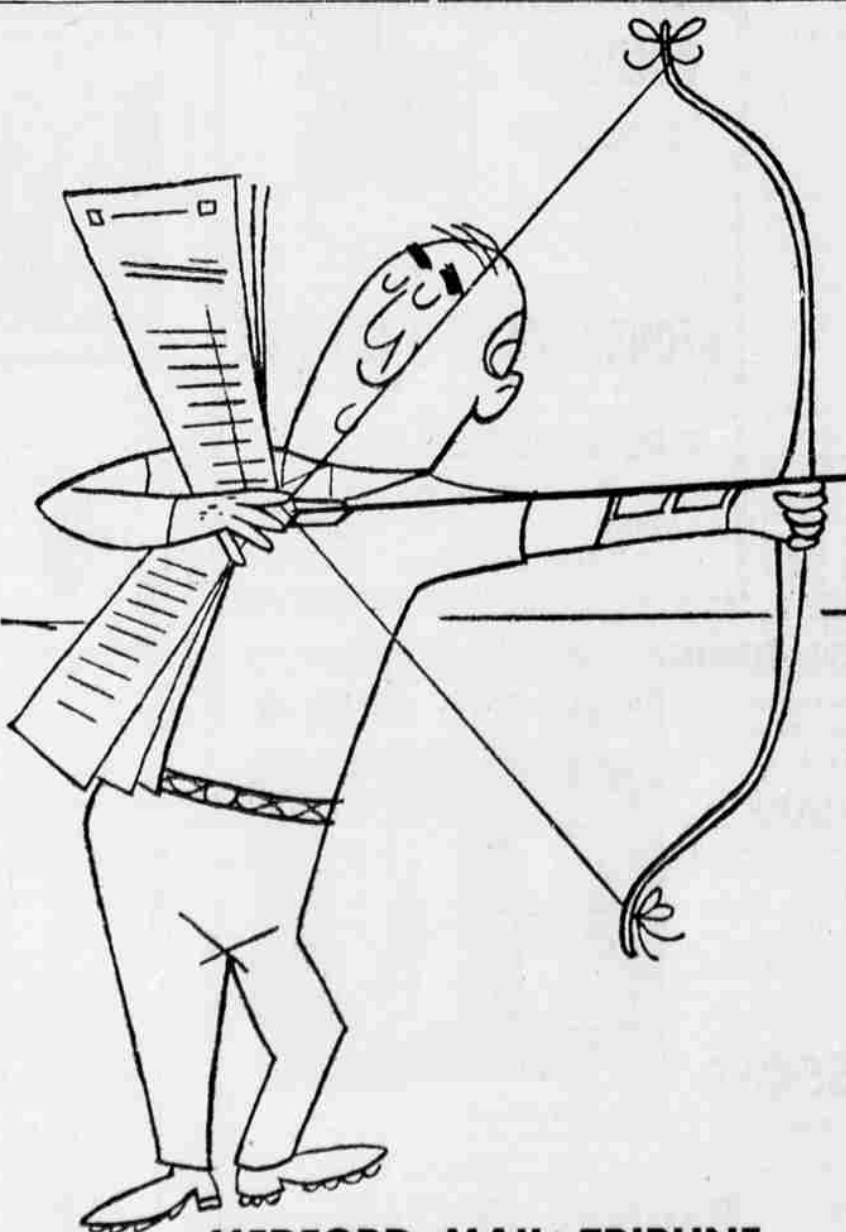
