

Medford, South Salem Clash In Grid Battle Here Tonight

"For Coach Mary Heater's Saxons, Friday night could be their moment of truth when they square off against the highly-touted Peapickers."

So wrote a Capital city sports scribe about the South Salem high football team. The Saxons tonight invade the wind cave of the Medford Black Tornado. Kickoff time is 8 p.m. For fans who follow and believe the gridiron polls, it will be a struggle of Oregon prep titans. For Medford is ranked No. 1 in all three and South Nos. 2 and 4 and 5. One Portland newspaper and a press wire service bill the Medford stadium joust as the feature prep attraction of the week end.

The Saxons, a team Williamette valley followers figured would not do much this season, come here riding a three-game winning streak. And, the Saxons, striving for their first grid triumph over Medford, advocate their toughest test so far this fall. Medford, also undefeated, and victor in two scrapes, likewise looks for stiffer competition than they have so far in 1961.

SHOT T. O'NEASE
O'nease, which possesses lots of muscle and has met at the tackle posts, will throw a shot T. O'nease at Medford. The Saxons utilize the talents of Dave Johnson, Roger Applegate and Mickey Wright in their ground assault — particularly those of Johnson. And, they have a passing threat in Gary Allen.

Medford will counter with its renowned multiple offense with the passing and running of Dan Miles and Mike Neathamer, the running of Jack Lowery, Mike Barnes, Mike Watkins, Frank Van Pelt, Tim Murray, and others and the catching of Lloyd Hammons, Gibb Mitchell and Lowery.

The schools have put teams against each other on four previous occasions. Medford has been victor by sizable scores.

Did Rest Help?
South Salem invades the Rogue valley metropolis after victories of 20 to 7 over North Salem, 27 to 7 over Klamath Falls and 27 to 8 over Bend. Medford has scored 27 to 0 triumphs over The Dalles and Marshfield.

One question for the Black Tornado is whether last week end's rest because of an open date has helped or hindered. Medford Mentor Fred Spiegelberg has termed his charges physically ready to meet the Saxons. However, he indicated some misgivings about the Tornado's mental state.

Spiegelberg last night said he planned to go ahead with previously announced plans and separate offensive and defensive platoons are to start. It will be the "go" team on offense and the "bandits" on defense. Only Jack Lowery, left halfback and left safety is ticketed to start both ways.

The last time the Cougars and Sun Devils tangled, in 1960, Arizona State won 24-21.

Ashlanders Skirmish At Yreka

Ashland—More stress on offense than an defense has been placed this week by the Ashland high football Grizzlies who travel to Yreka, Calif., for a game this evening.

The tussle will be at 7 p.m., standard time. Yreka is on daylight time.

Coach Marsh Jones has had his Grizzlies drilling to sharpen their plays. The Bruins have added a few offensive maneuvers and have changed a few patterns.

Defense has appeared to be coming around for the Ashlanders. Coach Jones termed it "pretty fair" at Prineville last week. It held up well after a mistake on the first scrimmage play of the game cost a touchdown.

Ends Crippled
Gale Tepper and Mike Cotton, a pair of ends, have been slowed by injuries and may play some against Yreka. But, John Yaple, converted from guard, and John Rhodes, got the starting calls. Tepper pulled a muscle against Redmond two weeks ago and Cotton suffered an ankle sprain in the Crook County game at Prineville.

Yreka will be favored. Shasta of Redding, Calif., defeated Ashland 42 to 7 in a season opener and the Redding club since has nicked Yreka 20 to 14.

The Miners also enter the fracas with the edge in experience. Ashland looms as an improving team. Jones reported that his halfbacks, Ron Boyce and Don Scholer, ran better at Prineville last week than in the two previous games.

The Texans, only unbeaten team in the league (3-0), face a tough test against the Chargers (2-2) at San Diego on Sunday while the champion Houston Oilers (2-1) entertain the Buffalo Bills (0-4).
