# Hanna Official Denies Accusation Levelled Against Hanna, Humphrey

Washington—UPI—The president of George M. Humphrey's mining company insisted today that nickel dug by the firm for the strategic stockpile was the cheapest ever purchased by the government.

The company official, W. A. Marting, head of Hanna Mining Company, said the firm was proud of its performance.

Marting issued a point-by-point denial of accusations levelled against Hanna and Humphrey, its controlling stockholder, its former treasury secretary. The denial was in a statement to Sen. Stuart Symington's stockpile investigation subcommittee.

Marting sought to rebut charges by Symington and other Democrats that Hanna took advantage of its nickel monopoly and the government's desperate need for supplies during the Korean War to exact exorbitant profits.

**Claims 419 Per Cent Profit**

He testified after Symington read figures which, he said, showed that Hanna's nickel division, which handles the stockpile contract, grossed 135 per cent on cost and 419 per cent on invested capital of roughly \$3.6 million.

"These are the largest profits I've ever seen in my life and I have been in the executive branch for quite a while," Symington declared. The Missouri Democrat once headed the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and was Air Force secretary under former President Harry S. Truman.

In contrast to the nickel division's profits, according to Symington, Hanna's commercial iron ore operation yielded profits of 10 and 12 per cent against costs in the same years, 1954-61.

Symington made the statement during testimony by L. W. Spang, secretary of Hanna, who agreed to detail expenses paid by the company for a west coast expansion trip by two government stockpile officials.

Spang has said that it never crossed his mind that paying the officials' expenses might influence their judgment.

**Denies Destroying Records**

Marting also denied that Hanna destroyed any pertinent records after President Kennedy invited an investigation of the government's \$3.4 billion stockpile surpluses last Jan. 31.

Some records were destroyed, he testified, but this was done as part of a records management program begun Nov. 7, 1961.

## Pickets Called Off At 2 Aerojet Plants

Washington—UPI—Contract negotiations resumed today between the International Association of Machinists and Aerojet General Corp. after the union called off a strike at two Aerojet plants in California.

A joint announcement by the IAM and Aerojet Thursday night said a "preliminary understanding" had been reached in negotiations with the Federal Mediation Service, resulting in "immediate resumption" of work at all Aerojet facilities.

The announcement came shortly after a presidential commission urged the union to call off the strike in the national interest. In addition to the California strikes, the IAM was picketing at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Aerojet makes missile components.

Thursday's meeting between federal mediators, representatives of the company and of the IAM in Sacramento and Azusa, resulted in a joint statement which said:

"A preliminary understanding has been reached which will result in immediate resumption of work at all Aerojet operations."

"At the meeting in Washington today, it soon became apparent that unfortunate misunderstandings between the parties were the primary cause of the short work stoppage that has occurred."

"Negotiations will proceed in Washington to find an early settlement. In the interest of national defense and security, both parties agree that work will be resumed while remaining differences are being settled."

## Gilmore Found Guilty On Charge of Escape

A Jackson county circuit court jury yesterday returned a verdict of guilty against Jesse James Gilmore, 38, of the Veterans Administration domiciliary, who was charged with escape from official detention.

Gilmore was serving a 50-day county jail sentence for being drunk in a public place. He reportedly walked away from a work detail June 22. He was later arrested in Dunsmuir, Calif., and returned to Jackson county.

Gilmore had entered a plea of innocent to the charge by reasons of insanity.

## Advertising Firm Makes Medford Branch Office

The Medford office of Ryan Outdoor Advertising Inc., Dallas, Texas, has been made a branch office with an increase in personnel, according to D. L. Braddock, Stockton, Calif., vice president and general manager.

The local firm was formerly Foster and Kleiser Advertising. In July the district from Eugene to Turlock, Calif., was purchased by Ryan and the Medford office continued as the general office until recently when the Stockton, Calif., area was purchased.

Braddock headed the firm in Medford until Sept. 17 when the general offices were moved south. Andrew Hawver, formerly with the lease department of Foster and Kleiser, was made manager of the Medford district which has offices in Coos Bay, Eureka and Red Bluff.

Hawver, who has been in the advertising field for seven years, is a member of the board of directors of the Oregon Advertising Council.

The Medford office has increased its staff since becoming a branch office and now includes in addition to management staff, personnel in sales, construction and pictorial painters and poster hangers.

The office is at 311 South Front st. and is currently being remodeled, according to Hawver, enlarging the office space, redecorating the interior and painting the exterior of the building.

The company deals in outdoor advertising for national advertisers as well as services local accounts.

## Fractional Gains in Most Blue Chips Edge Stock Market Prices Into Higher Figures

## Attorney Indicted In Narcotics Ring

New York—UPI—A federal grand jury has indicted a prominent Massachusetts attorney and three others on charges of running a narcotics ring so powerful it could bribe diplomatic couriers - even ambassadors - to smuggle millions of dollars worth of drugs into the United States.

Joseph Sax, 58, well known Marblehead, Mass., lawyer was named as a "kingpin" of the "diplomat dope ring," which officials indicated was still operating.

Also named in the indictment were Joseph Massa, 50, a Grotton, Conn., contractor, and his father, Jean Ager, 60, currently living in Clermont-Ferrand, France. All except the elder Ager will plead to the indictment Oct. 11.

Sax was one-time attorney for former Dominican Republic playboy-diplomat Porfirio Rubirosa, and also for Bobo Rockefeller.

One of the key breaks in the case came in October, 1960, when federal agents seized Narciso Rosal, ambassador to the United States from Guatemala, at Idlewild Airport with 110 pounds of pure heroin.
